THURSDAY, February 20th, 1902.

THE General Assembly having, by several Proclamations of His Excellency the Governor hereto prefixed, been prorogued until this day, the members thereof met in the Assembly Room :

At three of the clock in the afternoon a message from His Excellency the Governor, was delivered by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber. Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency the Governor in the Council Chamber, and, having returned to the Assembly Room.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that, when in attendance on His Excellency the Governor in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had been pleased to make a gracious Speech to both branches of the Legislature, of which, for greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, and which he read to the House, as follows :

“ Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly :

I greet you most cordially on the occasion of your assembling for the discharge of those high duties confided to you by the public, and I assure you that I shall follow your deliberations with deep concern, and with an earnest desire that they may result in promoting the best interests and prosperity of this Colony.

I am glad to be able to congratulate you on the large measure of success that has attended the avocations of our people during the past year. The returns from

our staple industries—the Seal and Cod Fisheries—while not quite equal to those of the previous year, which was an exceptionally prosperous one, were, on the whole, satisfactory, and the prices obtained have greatly stimulated the general business of the colony. The Whale Fishery, which for some years was entirely abandoned, is now being vigorously prosecuted by two local companies, and with marked success. It has appeared to my Ministers that some Legislation is necessary in order to govern the prosecution of this industry, and a measure will be introduced for that purpose.

The Mining and Lumbering industries have afforded remunerative employment to a large number of operatives. I am pleased to learn that there has been a very considerable expansion of those interests within the past few months, thus extending the field of labour, and increasing the earning power of the working man.

Good harvests rewarded those who devote their attention to the cultivation of the soil; therefore, in reviewing the result of the general business of the colony, we find abundant reason for mutual congratulation and thankfulness.

It affords me pleasure to be able to state that the financial obligations of the Colony to the Contractor, under the Railway Act of 1901, have been fully discharged; that the Railway system is now the property of the Government of the Colony; and that the lands, transferred to the Railway Contractor by the Contract of 1898, and other extensive areas held in reserve pending his selection, are now available to all those who may be desirous of investing in them. As those lands will be transferred to applicants, subject to the conditions of the Act passed by you last session, they can only be retained by holders of leases upon the payment of fees, which will largely augment the revenues of the Colony. It is important to further note in this connection that all lands held by private parties, and included in the grants issued in 1898 to the Contractor, have been transferred to the Government, and are now released from his claim; and that whereas no provision was made in the grants then issued for a right of way for general purposes along the rivers and lakes, that right has now been secured to the public.

The Government Telegraph Lines were taken over from the Contractor in October, and placed under the control of the Post Office Department. My Ministers hoped to have been able to arrange with the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, for the erection of a Government line between St. John's and Whitbourne, thus completing the connection of the Government system of Telegraphs, but I regret to state that the Company have expressed their inability to meet this desire.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

It is satisfactory to observe that the anticipations of my Government respecting the financial result of the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1901, have been fully realized. The accounts to be furnished you will show a surplus of revenue over

expenditure. The accounts of the present fiscal year to date indicate that a very careful regard is being observed to keep the expenditure within the estimates.

The estimates for the coming year have been prepared, and will be laid before you at an early date, and I can rely on your readiness to make all necessary provision for the public service.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly :

I take this opportunity of referring to the loyalty and devotion manifested by the people of this Colony towards the person and throne of His Majesty the King, on the occasion of the recent visit of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, now the Prince and Princess of Wales, to these shores, and I rejoice with you in the eulogium that your reception of Their Royal Highnesses evoked throughout Great Britain. His Majesty the King and Their Royal Highnesses were graciously pleased to convey, through me, to the people of Newfoundland, expressions of their high appreciation of that reception, and I have already caused the despatches to be published ; but, in order that there may be a permanent record thereof, copies will be presented to your Honourable Houses.

Despatches received from the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for Colonies, upon other important matters, will also be furnished for your information and guidance.

In compliance with the desire of His Majesty's Government, my Ministers will propose for your acceptance a temporary Bill for giving effect to the Treaties between Great Britain and France in relation to fishing industries on a portion of the coasts of this colony. The proposals made by the delegates from my Government to the Conference held in London last year on the question of the Treaty Shore, have received the fullest consideration, and it is to be earnestly hoped that means may be devised to remove any necessity in the future for your consideration of such a measure.

My Ministers, fully appreciating the vast importance to the country of the development of its coal and timber areas, and the working of its iron deposits, have had under consideration a scheme to encourage the introduction of capital in that direction, and they hope to be able to submit the same to the Legislature before the close of the present Session.

During recess the question of Cold Storage in connection with our fisheries, has engaged the careful consideration of my Ministers, and in order to enable the fishermen to maintain a supply of bait at all seasons, an appropriation will be made to encourage the establishment of cold storage at convenient points along the coast.

Among the measures that will be brought before you will be an amendment to the Employers' Liability Act, and a Bill to protect persons employed on railways.

A Bill in reference to the Municipal affairs of this town will also engage your attention.

In now leaving you to your deliberations, I pray that Divine Providence may guide you to wise conclusions. ”

On motion of Mr. Clift, seconded by Mr. Scott, it was

Resolved,—That a Select Committee be appointed to prepare an Address in Reply to the gracious Speech wherewith His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to open the present Session of the Legislature.

Ordered accordingly, and that the committee consist of Messrs. Clift, Scott, F. Morris, Gear, Chaplin and Mackay.

Hon. the Premier gave notice that he would, on to-morrow, ask leave to introduce a Bill to continue for a further period the French Treaties Act.

Mr. Morine gave notice that he would, on to-morrow, ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary that all correspondence between the Government and the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. in relation to the erection of a telegraph line between St. John's and Whitbourne, be laid on the table of this House ;

To ask the Hon. the Minister of Finance and Customs to lay upon the table of this House, a statement showing the revenue and expenditure, respectively, to the 30th of June, 1900 and 1901, respectively, and the value of imports and exports, respectively, for same periods ;

To ask the Minister of Agriculture and Mines to lay upon the table of this House a statement with the names and areas of all grants, licenses or leases issued, or applications for timber lands, approved in the calendar year 1900-1901 ;

To ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary to lay upon the table of this House all correspondence between His Majesty's Government and the Government of this Colony in relation to (1) The renewal of the *Modus Vivendi*; (2) The approaching coronation of His Majesty.

It was moved and seconded that when the House rises, it adjourn till Tuesday next, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

The House then adjourned accordingly.

TUESDAY, February 25, 1902.

The House met at four o'clock, pursuant to adjournment.

Pursuant to notice and on motion of Hon. the Premier, the Bill to extend for a further period the French Treaties Act, was introduced and read a first time, and it was ordered that it be read a second time on to-morrow.

Mr. Clift, on behalf of the Select Committee appointed to draft an Address in Reply to His Excellency's Speech, presented the report of said committee, as follows:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

The report was, on motion, received and read, and it being moved that it be adopted, no objection being raised, it was ordered accordingly.

The Hon. the Premier announced to the House that His Excellency the Governor would receive Mr. Speaker and the House, with the Address of Thanks, at Government House at noon to-morrow.

Pursuant to notice, and on motion of the Hon. Minister of Justice, the Bills to amend the Patent, Education, and Employers' Liability Acts, were introduced and read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time on to-morrow.

Pursuant to notice, and on motion of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the Bill for the Preservation of Deer was introduced and read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time on to-morrow.

Pursuant to the order, and on motion, the Bill to continue for a further period the Newfoundland French Treaties Act, was read a second time, and ordered to be referred to committee of the whole House on to-morrow.

Mr. Morine gave notice of questions :—

To ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary if a Postmaster General has been appointed ; and, if not, why not, and if an appointment will be made at an early date ; also, for a statement of all payments to Acting Postmaster General as salary or compensation ;

To ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary to lay upon the table of the House a copy of all correspondence in relation to the establishment of a training ship in this Colony ;

To ask the Minister of Marine and Fisheries if a Commission in relation to the Game Laws has been appointed ; if so, when, and the names of the members thereof ; also, for a statement of expenses, if any, in connection therewith ; also, for a statement of Game License fees from 1st Jan., 1901, to date, and payments therefrom.

It was moved and seconded that, when the House rises, it adjourn till to-morrow at half-past eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

The House then adjourned accordingly.

THURSDAY, February 27, 1902.

The House met at 11.30 o'clock in the forenoon, pursuant to adjournment.

The Speaker informed the House that in accordance with the intimation received yesterday, His Excellency the Governor would receive the Address of Thanks at noon to-day.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House proceeded to Government House, and being returned to the Assembly Room, Mr. Speaker informed the House that His Excellency had received the Address of Thanks, and had been pleased to reply thereto as follows :—

I thank you for your Address.

Whereas,—The Honourable Member for Bonavista, Mr. A. B. Morine, has, in his place, denounced as grossly incorrect and slanderous a report in the *Telegram* newspaper of the 9th inst., which purports to be the official report of a speech made in this House by the Minister of Finance and Customs, the Hon. E. M. Jackman, and the latter has declared, from his place in this House, that the said report is substantially correct, and that he is prepared to prove the truth of the charges therein ;

And whereas,—The said report represents the said Minister as having made charges against the said member for Bonavista to the following effect :

(1) That in London, in 1900, while the Winter Government was in power, Mr. Morine was a party to an arrangement with Lewis Miller that machinery for the latter's mills was to be admitted to this Colony free of Customs duty ; and

(2) That Mr. Morine, with a pledge in his pocket that he was to be Premier of this Colony, entered into an arrangement with the said Lewis Miller, at the time aforesaid, that he, the said Alfred B. Morine was to be made the standing solicitor of the said Lewis Miller on an annual retaining fee ; and

(3) That when in London, at the time and under the circumstances referred to, it was the policy of the said Alfred B. Morine to become the solicitor, not only of the Reid Co., but also of any other large companies that he could secure ;

And Whereas,—The Hon. member for Bonavista has denounced these charges as false and scandalous in every particular, and declared that in this respect he has been defamed by the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs ;

Resolved,—That this House resolve itself into a committee of Privilege to consider (1), of the charge that the said report is a false and garbled representation of the speech actually delivered by the said Minister ; and (2), of the charges as alleged by the said Hon. Minister as against the said Hon. member for Bonavista ; and (3), that evidence be taken on oath ; and (4), that the evidence and finding of the committee be reported to this House.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Johnson took the chair of committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported from the committee that they had considered the matter to them referred, and begged leave to report the following :—

The committee of privilege has considered the matter to them referred and the evidence submitted in connection therewith ; the committee is of opinion that the report of the speech of the Minister of Finance and Customs published in the official reports in the *Evening Telegram* of the 9th instant, is in the main and substantially a correct report of the speech of the Minister of Finance and Customs in this House. The committee is unable to decide upon the charge made therein by the Minister of Finance and Customs against the leader of the opposition, inasmuch as Mr. Morine has categorically denied the said charge before the committee, and on the other hand the Minister of Finance and Customs has declared that Messrs. Lewis Miller and R. G. Reid, now absent from the colony, are necessary and material witnesses to substantiate the charge, and, further, that he is prepared to prove the truth of his allegations to the satisfaction of this committee when an opportunity is afforded him to do so.

The motion, on being put, was negatived by the same vote as on the preceding division.

Mr. Gear gave notice that he would, on to-morrow, move the House into committee of the whole on certain resolutions respecting the harbor of Grand Bank.

Mr. Johnson presented a petition from residents of Newtown, B.B., on the subject of a bridge; and it was ordered that it be received and referred to the Department of Public Works.

Pursuant to notice, and on motion of Hon. the Premier, the rules of the House were suspended in relation to all Bills now before, or to come before, the House.

Pursuant to order, and on motion, the Bill respecting the disposal of Bog Lands was read a second time, and ordered to be referred to committee of the whole House on to-morrow.

It was moved and seconded that, when the House rises, it adjourn till to-morrow at four o'clock in the afternoon.

The House then adjourned accordingly.

FRIDAY, April 11, 1902.

Pursuant to notice, and leave granted, this Bill was now read a first and second time, referred to committee of the whole and adopted, read a third time and passed, and ordered to be engrossed, being entitled as above, and sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their concurrence in its provisions.

Pursuant to order, and on motion, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Supply.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Knight took the chair of committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that they had passed certain resolutions, which were read a first and second time, and are as follows :—

Also that out of the sum of \$25,000.00 voted for the construction and repairs of roads as set forth in the schedule to this Act, the sum of \$5,000 shall be transferred to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, to be expended for the construction, operation and repair of any wharves, piers, launchways or ferries, and like public services in this Colony. Should the said sum of \$5,000 be not requir-

ed for the purpose stated, the balance shall pass to the credit of the account for "construction and repair of roads."

The said resolution was read a first and second time and agreed to.

Pursuant to order, and on motion, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Ways and Means.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Knight took the chair of committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The Chairman reported that they had passed certain resolutions, which were read a first time, as follows:—

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Knight took the chair of committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported from the committee that they had passed certain resolutions thereto, and recommending the introduction of a Bill to give effect to said resolutions.

Ordered that this report be received, and the said Bill read a first time presently.

The Loan Bill was now read a first and second time, referred to committee of the whole and adopted without amendment, read a third time and passed,

and ordered to be engrossed, being entitled "An Act to authorize the raising of a sum of money by loan for the public service of this Colony," and to be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their concurrence in its provisions.

The Hon. Premier gave notice that he would, presently, ask leave to introduce a Bill, entitled "An Act to provide for the reduction of duties on certain Portuguese products."

The said Bill was then introduced, read a first and second time, referred to committee of the whole and adopted without amendment, read a third time and passed, and ordered to be engrossed, being entitled as above, and to be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their concurrence in its provisions.

The said amendments being taken into consideration, and Hon. the Premier having explained that they were effected in the Council Chamber at the desire of the Government and without any idea of infringing upon the privileges of the Assembly, they were, on motion of Hon. the Premier, read a first and second time and concurred in, and it was ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council informing them of the concurrence of the House therein, for the reason that the one was necessary owing to the subsequent passing of the Loan Bill, and the other necessary to carry out the intention of the House of Assembly.

Hon. the Minister of Finance and Customs gave notice that he would, presently, ask leave to introduce a Bill, entitled "An Act to amend 56 Vic., Cap. 11, entitled 'An Act to Incorporate the Placentia Water Company.'"

Pursuant to notice, and leave granted, the said Bill was introduced and read a first and second time, referred to committee of the whole and adopted, read a third time and passed, and ordered to be engrossed, being entitled as above, and that it be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their concurrence in its provisions.

It was now moved by the Hon the Premier, that the order this day made by this House, whereby it agreed to the amendment sent down from the Council, in and upon the Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the management and control of the Harbor of Grand Bank," be declared null and void and be rescinded, because the same was agreed to by this House by a mistake, in that the House omitted to notice that the said amendment was in breach of its privileges.

It passed unanimously, and was ordered accordingly.

On motion, the said amendment was read a first time, when Hon. the Premier moved that it be not concurred in, but that this House disagree from the said amendment, which is *ultra vires* of the Council and a breach of the privilege of this House.

It passed unanimously, and it was ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council that this House does not agree to the said amendment, and that the same is *ultra vires* of the Council and a breach of the privileges of this House.

It was moved and seconded that, when the House rises, it adjourn till Monday next at four o'clock in the afternoon.

The House then adjourned accordingly.

MONDAY, April 21, 1902.

Pursuant to notice, and leave granted, and on motion of the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs, the House now resolved itself into committee of the whole.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Knight took the chair of committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported from the committee that they had passed the resolutions with some amendment, and recommended the enactment of a Bill in conformity therewith.

Ordered that this report be received, and the Bill introduced, which being done, it was read a first and second time, referred to committee of the whole and adopted, read a third time and passed, and ordered to be engrossed, being entitled “An Act respecting duties on Foreign Built Shipping,” and to be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their concurrence in its provisions.

Hon. Mr. Morris, from the select committee to which was referred the petition of A. W. Harvey and others on the subject of the Dry Dock Arbitration, presented the report of the said committee, informing the House that the petitioners had re-

quested to be permitted to withdraw the said petition as they purposed appealing to His Majesty the King by Petition of Right ; and recommended that the request be complied with.

On motion, the said report was adopted, and it was ordered that the petitioners be permitted to withdraw their petition.

26.—An Act to Provide for the Fulfilment of the Terms of a Convention between the United Kingdom and the United States of America relative to the Disposal of Real and Personal Property ;

27.—An Act to amend 56 Vic., Cap 11, entitled An Act to Incorporate the Placentia Water Company ;

28.—An Act for the Management of the Town of St. John's and its Municipal Affairs ;

29.—An Act respecting the Registration of Deeds.

His Excellency was then pleased to make the following speech to both branches of the Legislature :—

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly :

In releasing you from further attendance, I would convey to you my acknowledgement of the assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the discharge of your duties in the Session now about to close.

Especially do I desire to record my appreciation of the cordiality with which your Honourable Houses, without distinction of parties, have supported my Government in the renewal of the Newfoundland French Treaties Act.

Among the measures just passed, the amendment of the Employers' Liability Act will be regarded with special interest by the labouring population.

The sum which you have granted for the establishment of Cold Storage for bait in the various fishing centres, should prove of advantage to the fishermen of this colony, and they will, no doubt, be eager to avail themselves of this provision.

Your liberal addition to the vote for Education manifests the warm interest which you have taken in this important work, and it cannot fail to be received with satisfaction by all those who are engaged in promoting the cause.

The Municipal Act, a measure of high importance, will, I may confidently anticipate, result in the accomplishment of reforms which are so much needed.

The Act to regulate the Whaling Industry should have the effect of securing the permanence of the enterprise, and of preventing the pollution of the coastal waters.

My Ministers had hoped to have been able to complete their scheme for the encouragement of the iron and coal industry before the Legislature closed, but difficulty has been experienced in acquiring the necessary statistics, and it has been deemed expedient, therefore, to delay the introduction of legislation thereon until next session.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I thank you for the supplies you have granted for the public service. They shall be disbursed with due regard to economy and efficient administration.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

The efforts of my Ministers to secure a reduction of the duty levied on Newfoundland codfish entering the Portuguese markets so as to equalize the rate of such duty with that paid by Norway under most favoured nation treatment, have not proved unfruitful, and the measure to which I have just given my assent will, I trust, enable His Majesty's Government to conclude the desired convention.

It is satisfactory to observe that the result of the seal fishery has not fallen very far short of the expectations which were formed respecting that important industry. I hope that this encouraging opening of the current season will actively stimulate trade, and that in your several avocations you will realize a full measure of success.

After which the Honourable the President of the Legislative Council, by command of His Excellency the Governor, said:—

It is with profound regret that I have to inform you of the demise of Her late Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria.

Her Majesty expired at Osborne House at 6.30 in the afternoon of the 22nd instant, to the great affliction of the Royal Family and of all classes of Her Majesty's subjects.

His present Majesty was this day proclaimed King Edward the Seventh, with all the us ua fomalities.

The following Proclamation for proclaiming His Most Gracious Majesty King Edward th Seventh was yesterday approved by His Majesty the King in Council. You will take immediate steps for issuing it within your Government. (Proclamation begins.)

Whereas it hath pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy Our late Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria of Blessed and Glorious Memory, by whose decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and all other Her late Majesty's Dominions, is solely and rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince Albert Edward We (insert the description of the persons making the Proclamation) therefore Do now hereby with one full voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart, Publish and Proclaim That The High and Mighty Prince Alber Edward is now by the Death of Our Late Sovereign of Happy and Glorious Memory become ou

only lawful and rightful Liege Lord Edward the Seventh by the Grace of God, King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, Supreme Lord in and over the———(Here insert the description of the Possession or Colony where the Proclamation is made), To whom We do acknowledge all faith and constant obedience with all hearty and humble affection, beseeching God by Whom Kings and Queens do reign to bless the Royal Prince Edward the Seventh with long and happy years to reign over us. (Proclamation ends.)

You will observe that the form of this Proclamation requires you to associate yourself in issuing it with other persons and you should select those whose position appears to you to render them most suitable.

The Colonial Offices Act of 1830, provides that no Patent, Warrant, Commission or other authority for the exercise of any office or employment in His Majesty's Colonies or Possessions, shall become void until eighteen months after the demise of the Crown.

A Proclamation requiring all persons so holding office to proceed in the Performance and Execution of their Duties and to hold their offices during His Majesty's pleasure was approved by His Majesty the King in Council yesterday and will be forwarded by next mail.

His Majesty has also ordered the preparation of a Warrant for His Signature which will authorise you to make use of the Public Seal now in use until another shall be prepared and transmitted to you.

A Royal Salute of 21 guns should, if possible, be fired at noon after the Proclamation of His Majesty's accession has been made.

SIR,

You are doubtless aware that a Committee was, in February last, appointed by His Majesty the King to consider the best means of giving effect to the desire which is so universally felt, that a memorial of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Imperial and not local in its character, should be erected in London as the metropolis and centre of the Empire over which she ruled for more than sixty years. The recommendation of the Committee was in favour of a memorial of a strictly personal and monumental kind, in which a statue of Her late Majesty should form the most prominent feature; and the King expressed his approval of this proposal and of the site in front of Buckingham Palace which has been selected. The general idea of the scheme is to place in front of the Palace a group or groups of statuary, of which the statue of Queen Victoria will form the central figure, and, if funds admit, to form an imposing architectural and processional approach to the main group of statuary and to the Palace, with statues at intervals representative of the Colonies and Dependencies of the Empire.

2. To carry this scheme into effect in a manner worthy of its object, ample funds are required, and a largely attended meeting was held at the Mansion House on the 26th March last, for the purpose of calling public attention to the subject and of inviting subscriptions. I am convinced that the Colonies of the Empire, which always occupied a most prominent position in her late Majesty's interest and sympathies, will desire to contribute to a memorial which appeals so strongly to every class and to every race of those who were Her subjects. I desire therefore that you will take such steps as you may think best calculated to promote this object, either by bringing the matter to the notice of your Ministers, or in such other way as you think best, and I trust that I may be able to announce a response from the Colonies which will be an evidence to the world at large of the feelings of devotion with which they regard the memory of Queen Victoria.

3. In making this request, I do not forget that many Colonies will desire to have their local memorial, but I am led to believe that they will also wish to be distinctly and separately represented in the commemorative monument, which is intended to perpetuate in the heart of the Empire the glories of Her late Majesty's reign, and the loving esteem in which she was held throughout Her dominions.

With reference to my Circular despatch of the 26th of January last, forwarding copies of my telegram of the 24th January and certain other documents issued in consequence of the death of Her late Majesty the Queen, I have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of your Government, a copy of "the Demise of the Crown Act, 1901," which has recently passed through Parliament and received the Royal Assent.

2. It will be observed that it provides that the holding of any Office under the Crown, whether within or without His Majesty's dominions, shall not be affected, nor shall any fresh appointment thereto be rendered necessary by the demise of the Crown.

3. I have been advised that a person holding a Dormant Commission to administer the Government of a Colony in the absence of the Governor is the holder of an office within the terms of this Act.

The Committee of Council have had under consideration a communication received by them from His Excellency the Governor of yesterday's date, covering a despatch received from the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the subject of the renewal of the Modus Vivendi, and have unanimously resolved that in view of the difficulties that continue to engross the attention of His Majesty's Government in South Africa, and of the inability of this Colony to contribute to a solution of those difficulties in the same manner as some of the other Colonies have done, they will undertake to secure the re-enactment of the temporary Bill for giving effect to the Treaties between Great Britain and France in relation to Fishery rights on the coasts of this Colony.

The Committee desire that His Excellency the Governor be moved to transmit a copy of this Minute to His Majesty's Government by cable.

SIR,

It has become my duty to inform you that the Coronation of His Most Gracious Majesty King Edward VII has been fixed to take place on the 26th June, 1902.

2. It is His Majesty's desire that the self-governing Colonies of the Empire should be represented on this occasion by their leading statesmen; and I have accordingly to request you to be so good as to convey to the Premier of Newfoundland an invitation on the part of His Majesty's Government to visit this country in June next. It is not anticipated that the duration of the actual ceremonies in connection with the Coronation will extend beyond a few days; but it would probably be convenient to Sir R. Bond to arrive in England a few days beforehand, and His Majesty's Government hope, therefore, that he will consider himself their guest for a fortnight from the date of his arrival. It would be an additional satisfaction to them if Sir R. Bond should be accompanied by some lady member of his family.

It will be readily understood that on an occasion like this, it is necessary that all arrangements should be made some months in advance; and without, therefore, desiring to press for an immediate answer, His Majesty's Government would be glad to learn, at Sir R. Bond's early convenience, whether it will be in his power to accept their invitation.
