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PROCLAMATION.

A. BANNERMAN, Governor. (L. S.) By His Excellency SIR ALEXANDER BANNERMAN, Knight, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, by certain Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the Fourteenth day of February, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-seven, in the Twentieth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, hath given and granted unto me full power and authority to summon and call General Assemblies of the Freeholders and Householders within this Island: And whereas Writs in due form have been issued for a General Election of Members of the General Assembly of the Island, under which Members have been elected and returned to serve in the said General Assembly:

I do, therefore, by these Presents, further summon and call the Members of the said General Assembly, so elected, to assemble and meet in the Town of Saint John's, in the said Island, for the despatch of business, on Monday the Thirteenth day of this present month; and of which all persons concerned therein are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at the Government House at St. John's aforesaid, the Third day of May, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-one, and in the Twenty-fourth Year of Her Majesty's Reign.

At Two of the Clock P. M., His Excellency the Governor having arrived at the Council Chamber, and being seated on the Throne, the Hon. at Council Chamber. the President of the Council commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, attendant on the Council, to go to the Commons House of Assembly and inform the Members thereof that it is His Excellency's pleasure that they do forthwith attend at the Bar of this House; and they being come thereto, the Hon. the President said:

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen of the Assembly:

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor to acquaint you that His Excellency does not think fit to declare the causes for which he has summoned the Legislature until there be a Speaker of the House of Assembly. It is therefore His Excellency's pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, do forthwith repair to your Chamber, and there choose a fit person to be your Speaker, and that you present the person whom you shall have so chosen to His Excellency in this House for his approbation.

House of Assembly withdraws.

The House of Assembly then withdrew.

And, after some time, having again appeared at the Bar of this House,

The Honorable Mr. Hoyles said:

The House of Assembly, in obedience to Your Excellency's command, have proceeded to the election of a Speaker, and I have the honor to present to Your Excellency Frederick B. T. Carter, Esquire, Member for the District of Trinity, whom they have chosen to fill that office.

His Excellency the Governor then said:

Mr. Carter—In full assurance of your ability, discretion and zeal, I entirely approve of the choice which the Assembly have made, and do confirm and allow you to be their Speaker.

The Speaker of the Assembly then said:

May it please Your Excellency:

Your Excellency having been pleased to approve of the choice the House of Assembly have made of me to be their Speaker, it becomes my duty, as such, in the name of the Representatives of Her Majesty's loyal subjects the people of Newfoundland, to demand that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, that they and their servants may be free from arrest, and that, whenever Her Majesty's service and the interests of the Colony may require it, I, as their Speaker, may have free access to Your Excellency's person.

His Excellency then said:

I assure you that I extend to you, in the most ample manner, all the

privileges which have at any time been enjoyed by your predecessors in office as Speaker of the Assembly.

His Excellency was then pleased to open the present Session by the following gracious Speech to both Houses:

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I avail myself of the earliest opportunity of assembling you after the speech. recent General Election.

It would have afforded me infinite satisfaction to have announced to you that British subjects in Newfoundland had been allowed to exercise the undoubted right which they possess to vote for such persons as they might think were the fittest to represent their interests in the House of Assembly.

I am sorry to say that this has not been the case: serious riots and disturbances have occurred in several Districts—property to a considerable amount has been destroyed in Harbor Grace, and no polling took place there, the rioters having had their sway, notwithstanding that the authorities, at their own request, had a military force sent in aid of the civil power.

In St. John's, also, on the day of Nomination, outrages of a very serious character occurred, occasioning, as I hear, the use of fire-arms, and several persons were unfortunately wounded.

In the District of Harbor Main, I lament to say, more distressing events have occurred. In that District there were four Candidates, all of the same religious persuasion; and there, also, fire-arms were resorted to, and I grieve to say that one man was killed and others severely wounded.

As these occurrences are all, at present, the subject of judicial inquiry, I shall abstain from further comment; but I have to assure you that the Government is determined that all these most calamitous events, and the causes which gave rise to them, shall undergo the strictest investigation, with a view that, if possible, some of the perpetrators of these outrages may be discovered, and a repetition of them prevented—that the people of

this Colony shall be informed on the subject, and that the events which have taken place shall be fully and fairly represented to Her Majesty's Government, to be laid before the Imperial Parliament, I being instructed, as all Governors are, to communicate information on every event of importance which may occur in any of the Queen's Colonies forming integral parts of the British Empire.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

There are some cases arising out of the late General Election, relative to Special Returns, which it will be your province to decide on.

You are aware that last year's Revenue Bill expires on the 20th of May, and I apprehend there is no one will say that this important Colony can be left without a Revenue, which shall be appropriated with a strict regard to economy.

It is the intention of the Government, therefore, to introduce a short Bill to sanction a continuance, for one year, of the present Revenue Bill, without alteration or modification, so that time shall be given for a revision of the whole financial condition of this Colony; for I believe the public are most anxious that such should take place, and the honorable gentleman now leader of the Government will explain to you the course which he proposes to pursue.

On referring to documents laid before the Imperial Parliament, and ordered by the House of Commons to be printed, on the 24th of May, 1855, I find that the debt of this Colony was represented to the Colonial Minister, by Delegates appointed by the House of Assembly, to have been, about the beginning of the preceding year, £120,000; and these gentlemen, in a letter to the then and present Colonial Minister, state their opinions in the following words, viz:

"This is a state of things which, we humbly submit, clearly proves that there is just cause of complaint, and necessity for reform in our institutions. With free trade and free institutions, this Colony, ofter a few years, would not know such an affliction as pauperism; and the Colonial Debt, with the exercise of proper economy, would not be felt as a burthen by the people. They could then afford to bear increased taxation, if that were necessary, to sustain the credit of the Government, or to promote the improvement of the country."

Facts and figures have proved that their opinions were erroneous, and

that the present financial state of the Colony requires serious consideration. Those "few years" have fast passed away since free institutions were granted—Newfoundland being included, by the assent of its Legislature, in the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States of America;—to make up for the deficiency in the Revenue consequent thereon, additional taxation was laid on dutiable articles, which were then stated to be mostly the luxuries of life, but which (in my opinion, in a Colony like this) were the necessaries of life; and the debt of the Colony is now £180,000. But the affliction of pauperism, instead of now being unknown, has greatly increased, the demoralizing effects of which have been strongly denounced in various influential quarters.

In regard, however, to the Reciprocity Treaty, that is a question upon which I wish to be clearly understood; for although Newfoundland ceded, by that Treaty, very great fishery privileges to American citizens, I, for one, should be sorry indeed to see any Government here departing from any course of policy or principle which their predecessors had entered into by Treaty with the United States of America, and which was sanctioned by the Legislature.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

You will be disappointed to hear that I am not enabled to give you information on the Fishery question, a subject which you and the people take so deep an interest in. I observe that several gentlemen residing in England, and largely connected with Newfoundland, applied at the Colonial Office for information, and they were acquainted by the Duke of Newcastle that he was not in a position to give them, in an imperfect state, the information which they required. I can only at present, for my own part, repeat what I said before, that I am under no alarm that any of the maritime or territorial rights of Newfoundland have undergone any modification, or that any part of those rights which the people of this Colony possess, under existing treaties, has been, or will be, ceded to any foreign power.

I may be asked, why such delay? I can only answer that I believe the stipulations contained in the proposed new Convention were some time ago agreed to by both nations; but I believe also it was equally agreed on that

some understanding should take place that a suitable marine police, or protective force, should be supplied for the fishermen of both nations, under such rules and regulations as may be considered necessary and determined on, in order that the stipulations in existing Treaties may be faithfully carried into effect; and this course, as far as I know, has been adopted wherever extensive fisheries are carried on, and their limits defined by treaty, usage, or legislative enactment.

The aspect of political affairs in Europe has been such as must have occupied the attention and time of the Foreign Affairs Departments in both nations, and diverted their attention from many other matters,among others the Newfoundland Fisheries.

I am sure you must all deeply deplore the lamentable events which have taken place in the neighboring Great Republic, and which forebode the horrors of civil war and loss of human life. The people in this Colony ought to be grateful to the Almighty for the blessings hitherto bestowed upon them, -and I can only hope that peace and harmony may prevail among them.

The House of Assembly having withdrawn, His Excellency was pleased to retire.

A copy of His Excellency's Speech having been left with the President, it was read by the Clerk, and, on motion of the Honorable Mr. McLea,

The Address is as follows:

To His Excellency Sir Alexander Bannerman, Knight, Gobernor, &c., &c.

Address

May it please Your Excellency:

We, the Legislative Council in Session convened, desire to thank Your Excellency for the gracious Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present Session of the Legislature after the recent General Election.

We cannot but concur with Your Excellency in lamenting that in the election of Members as Representatives in the General Assembly, there should have been any obstruction to the free exercise of that privilege to which all British subjects have an undoubted right, to vote for such persons as they may consider best qualified to represent their interests in the House of Assembly; and we regret to learn that serious riots and disturbances have unhappily occurred in some of the Electoral Districts, attended with the destruction of property in some places, and melancholy loss of life and wounding in others; and, while we lament these unfortunate calamities, we are glad to find that the Government is determined that the events and causes which gave rise to them shall undergo that investigation which justice requires.

We fully rec'procate the views expressed by Your Excellency with reference to the Revenue, and we have no doubt but the Legislature will speedily introduce a Bill to prevent any loss of Revenue to the Colony.

We regret that from many circumstances our public debt has been increased to £180,000, yet we entertain a belief that by a prudential management offinancial matters, and a due regard to economy in the public expenditure, the resources of the Colony will be found sufficient to answer its requirements.

His Excellency Sir Alexander Bannerman, Knight, Governor.

We regret to find that pauperism has augmented, notwithstanding its demoralizing effects have been strongly, and, we may venture to add, justly denounced in various influential quarters; and we confidently hope that the Legislature, by a judicious arrangement, may succeed in lessening to some extent this increasing evil so burthensome upon the public Revenue.

With reference to the Reciprocity Treaty existing between this Country and the United States of America, we entirely agree with Your Excellency, and fully appreciate the sentiments expressed by Your Excellency on this subject; and we feel persuaded that the Government here will not depart from any course of policy or principle which their predecessors have entered into by treaty with the United States, and sanctioned by the Legislature.

We regret that Your Excellency has not yet been put in possession of the desired information upon the Fishery question, and are quite prepared to ascribe the delay to those causes adverted to by Your Excellency. We, however, assure Your Excellency that we confidently rely on the deep interest always manifested by the Imperial Government in the prosperity of this important dependency, and that in the negotiations which are now progressing none of the maritime or territorial rights which the people of this Island possess under existing Treaties will be ceded to any foreign power. At the same time, we are gratified to find that in the negotiations now pending a measure is being perfected in the contemplated establishment of a suitable marine police, under certain rules and regulations, in order that the stipulations of existing Treaties may be fully carried out.

We assure Your Excellency that we do deeply deplore the lamentable events which have taken place in the neighboring Republic, and sincerely trust that God in his infinite mercy will avert the horrors of civil war, and consequent loss of human life; and we agree with Your Excellency that the people of this Island ought to be grateful to the Almighty for the blessings hitherto bestowed upon them, and trust with Your Excellency that peace and harmony may prevail throughout the Colony.

A. BANNERMAN, Governor.

A discussion arose in the Legislature, the Session before last, relative to the Norway Fisheries, and the apprehension of a large competition of Norway Codfish in the markets of Spain, &c., which would greatly interfere with, and be prejudicial to the Newfoundland Fisheries; particularly as it was alleged the Norway Codfish were cured in a very superior way to the Codfish of this Colony.

Message and Documents from His Excellency the Governor lail on the table.

The Governor applied to the Board of Trade for information, and herewith sends to the Legislative Council an extract from the Consul General's Report on the Trade of Norway, which cannot fail to be interesting to every one who takes an interest in the Fisheries, showing as it does the manner in which the industrious Norwegians prosecute that important branch of Trade, their knowledge of the seasons when fish frequent their coast, and the care which is taken by their Government that they shall have a Maritime Police.

The Stock fish, described in the enclosed abstract, is a very inferior one to the Cod; it is dried in the sun until it is as hard as a stick, and it is easily portable, and carried by mules into the interior of Spain.

The Governor expects very soon to receive some of the Norway dried Cod, and it is certainly very desirable that the Newfoundland Fishermen should take every pains in the curing of their fish, for it is quite evident the best cured fish must always secure the highest price in the markets; and, in confirmation of this the enclosed extract will show what has taken place in Norway from the inferior mode in which Herrings are cured there.

There might not have been any necessity for Gazetting him, but thought the mover ought to be pleased to have been Gazetted in such good company. If, however, the honorable gentleman feared that he would lose caste with his political friends for having been Gazetted by the present Government, it is in his power to resign, and the Government would, no doubt, easily find an honorable gentleman to fill his place,

United States, a great part of the Admiral's Squadron are on the Coast of America protecting British interests of great magnitude, which might be involved by any departure from the policy laid down by Her Majesty for the guidance of her subjects during the civil war.

I have only again to add, in regard to the Fishery question, that I have no reason to alter my opinion relative to our maritime and territorial rights, and it will afford me much satisfaction when I am enabled officially to lay before you the documents which have so long been expected.

To Wis Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's Address. Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

May it Please Your Grace,-

We, the Legislative Council of Newfoundland in Session convened, beg leave to solicit the attention of Her Majesty's Government to the great importance to this Colony, and the general interests of British Commerce, of direct communication by Steam with Great Britain and the American States.

We are prompted to this step, at the present moment, by intelligence which has just reached us through the Press, to the effect that Her Majesty's

First Session Eighth General Assembly, 24th and 25th Victoria.

Government proposed to discontinue their subsidy to the Atlantic Royal Mail Steam Navigation Company; and we fear that the result of this proceeding would be to terminate the only means of direct connection by Steam with both countries which we have recently enjoyed.

In a commercial view we feel that the advantages conferred upon the Colony by the visits of the Steamers of this line have been large and manifold.

From the facilities they have afforded of intercourse with both Continents, the various operations of trade have been materially assisted, and benefits have hence arisen which we should never have known in the former disconnected position of the Island.

Our whole system of trade has now become adjusted to the influences of this new agency to such a degree that we cannot contemplate the possibility of its withdrawal without serious apprehension of the results to our commercial and, indirectly, to our general interests.

To secure this acquisition the people of Newfoundland have deemed no expenditure or sacrifice on their part too great.

The acquisition of direct Steam was the paramount consideration which induced our Legislature to grant a charter involving large concessions and responsibility to the New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph Company, for the establishment of their Line of Telegraph hence to New York, in the hope of obtaining for St. John's the status of a port of call for steamers bound East and West, this port being the most advantageous link of union between Europe and America.

Her Majesty's Government have already experienced the value of this line, as the most rapid medium for the transmission of intelligence from both sides of the Atlantic.

The national importance of conserving it must therefore be manifest; but perhaps could not be more forcibly exemplified than by the character of the information it conveys during the present crisis in the United States.

We are not unmindful of causes of dissatisfaction in failures of the Atlantic Royal Mail Steam Navigation Company to fulfil the terms of their contract, nor of the indulgences extended towards them by Her

Majesty's Government. But in view of the vast interests involved in their enterprise, and of the many difficulties which seem to have encompassed it from its inception, we would respectfully pray Her Majesty's Government to grant to this Company the further time needful to them to furnish such Steamships as their contract requires, and to allow the Government service to be performed meanwhile by the boats at present on the line.

The Prince Albert, Adriatic and Parana have given great satisfaction to our commercial public; and we would in conclusion respectfully assure Her Majesty's Government that their acquiescence in the prayer of this Address will be hailed with abiding gratitude by the people of the Colony.

The Council sent down such account, which embraced, besides the salaries of their Officers, &c., the sum of £200 sessional stipend of the President, and for twelve Members of Council (the President not included) £42 each.

The House of Assembly, after some days, sent up for the concurrence of the Council the Bill to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature for the past and present Sessions, and accompanying it the following message:

Mr. President:

The House of Assembly acquaint the Legislative Council that they have passed a Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature," to which they request the assent of the Council.

principle of sessional allowance to Members, in the same manner as Members of the House of Assembly of this Colony receive the same, and as Members of both Houses in the neighboring Colonies, yet that, relying upon the propriety and justice of their claim, and desiring not to imperil the Bill to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature, by the loss of which the Officers of both Houses would be injuriously affected, they accede to the proposition of the House of Assembly to refer the question of pay for the present and future Sessions to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and to abide by his decision thereon."

Both branches of the Legislature having agreed to refer this vexed and long-pending question to the decision of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and to be bound thereby, the Legislative Council most respectfully submit the following facts as entitling its President and Members to be paid sessional allowances at least equal in amount with the same received by the Speaker and Members of the House of Assembly.

They say that the claim of the Legislative Council for such allowance is as strong, if not stronger than that of the House of Assembly, because

Firstly—The Council performs the like duties and devotes the same period of time, and incurs equal responsibility in legislation with the other branch, without at the same time participating in the distribution of executive and subordinate offices, and the lucrative appointments which Members of the Assembly enjoy. The President of the Council performs the same relative duties as the Speaker, occupies the higher position, and is also President of the Executive Council, without remuneration.

Secondly—The Members of Council are persons chosen chiefly from the mercantile and partly from the professional classes, whose time is a very important consideration in their business.

The foregoing reasons have induced the neighboring Colonies, and nearly all other British Provinces, to accede to the claims of their several Legislative Councils to be paid in the same manner as the House of Assembly, and the Council cannot see any reason that that of Newfoundland should be an exception.

In this Colony this claim is no late assertion of a right. In the year 1840 the Assembly passed the following Resolution:

His Excellency Sir Alexander Hannerman, Knight, Governor.

"The right of each branch of the Legislature to audit and determine the Contingent Expenses necessary for the proper transaction of the affairs of that branch cannot be denied, questioned, or disputed, by any other branch of the Legislature."

In the Amalgamated Legislature, consisting of House and Council, the Members of Council were paid.

In the year 1853, under the late irresponsible form of Government, when the Members of the Council were chiefly largely paid Executive Officers, and shortly before the introduction of the responsible system, the Council passed a Resolution sent to the Assembly expressive of their intention to claim sessional allowance in fature. In the year 1856, after the establishment of Responsible Government, the Council, in reporting their Contingencies, urged upon the Assembly the recognition of their claim to pay, in the following terms:

"Your Committee would observe that the former Council placed upon record their opinion that its Members were entitled to receive compensation for their legislative services. In the justice of that opinion this Committee coincide, and they feel that their right to such remuneration from the public purse is indisputably stronger in consequence of the greater responsibility of their position under Parliamentary Government, and the very large increase in the amount of their labors and in the frequency of their attendances. Nevertheless they forego, for the present, in consideration of the existing pressure upon the finances of the Colony, recommending the claim of this branch of the Legislature for sessional pay to the adoption of the House."

In the Session of 1859 the Council reported in their Contingencies the sessional allowances claimed for its President and Members.

The House of Assembly refused their assent.

The Council informed the House by message that they would suspend action on the Bill to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature until the several allowances for the President and Members of the Council were added to it.

The Bill to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature was thus lost.

First Session Eighth General Assembly, 21th and 25th Victoria.

In the Session of 1860 the same thing occurred, and the determination of the Council reiterated.

In the Second Session of 1861 the mode of reference and decision mentioned in the first part of this Case was agreed upon, to prevent a continuance of the confusion and embarrassment produced by the House of Assembly in not affording a ready assent to a measure for which there was not alone the precedent of their own body, but that of the Sister Colonies, in relation to both branches of the Legislature.

The only reasons the Assembly urges are, (firstly) the fact that its Members are put to expense in effecting their return to the House. The Council say that is a reason the law could not recognize—that that was never the pretence under which Members of the Assembly received it. It is paid sessionally as a sessional remuneration, not as an indemnification for expense. That expense is various; in some cases nothing; in other cases, of severe contest, considerable; and the prizes of success are such as do not, to anything like the same extent, fall to the lot of the Council.

Secondly, that the Legislative Council corresponds relatively to the House of Lords, and that the Members of the House of Lords are not paid. Were this plea of any avail, both branches of the Legislature should be unpaid, as neither the Lords nor Commons are paid in England.

If there were any force in these reasons the other Colonies would not have failed to avail of them.

His Excellency the Governor, in the Session of 1859, said that the question was one well worthy of consideration; and in 1860, in referring in his Speech at the close of the Session to the same subject, said: "I have only to say, if inconvenience shall now arise from the loss of the Contingency Bill, the responsibility of that inconvenience does not rest with me."

The Council, by their last report, acting in a spirit of great moderation, and considering the circumstances of the Colony and the heavy additional expense of two Sessions of the Legislature for this year, waived all claim for sessional stipend for the past time, even for the first Session of this year, while the Members of the Assembly claimed and took their allowances as for the full sittings.

The House of Assembly again, however, refused to pass the claim of the

Council, but made the proposition of a reference to the decision of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, to which the Council, feeling the justice and propriety of the demand, assented.

Under these circumstances the Council, while waiving any claim for former Sessions, submit that for the present and all other future Sessions the President and Members of their Chamber are entitled to an allowance at least equal to that received by the Speaker and Members of the Assembly, and the Council confidently leave the determination of the question to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Ordered—That the same be engrossed, and that Honorable Messrs. Kent, Pinsent, Stabb and Morris, be a Deputation to wait on His Excellency the Governor, requesting that he may be pleased to transmit the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

The next important branch of industry is the Fisheries, which employ, during several months of the year, about 60,000 fishermen, and a capital of four to five millions of dollars.

The Cod fisheries are classed in three principal grounds or districts, and are carried on off the coast of the Provinces of Romsdal, Norland, and Finmark, from about the middle of January to the end of March; they employ from between 20 to 22,000 fishermen, and from 4,000 to 4,500 boats, and the annual catch averages 20 millions of fish, 20,000 barrels of Cod Liver Oil, and as much Roe, which may together be valued at about one million of dollars. The Spring Herring Fisheries commence about the end of December and continue until about the middle of March, and are carried on along the line of coast between Stavemger and Bergen. About 20,000 men and 5,000 boats are engaged in them, and as many as 80,000 nets are used. The total produce is computed at about 600,000 barrels. The Summer and Autumn Herring Fisheries are carried on along the whole of the West Coast of Norway, but principally between Bergen and Drontheim, and the catch can be averaged at about 100,000 barrels annually.

In order to avoid disputes among the fishermen the Government has of late years established a "Maritime Police," with exclusive jurisdiction over the fishing grounds; they accompany the fishermen in their boats, and are invested with very large powers, having authority to treat summarily all disputes and offences connected with the fisheries. The produce of the fisheries in 1856 and 1857 has not been so abundant as in the preceding years, especially with respect to Herrings, in the export of which a considerable decrease will be apparent when compared with 1855.

The principal markets for the Norwegian Herrings still continue to be Sweden and

the Baltic; in the latter place, however, the Norwegian merchants encounter a powerful competitor in the Scotch trader, whose Herrings, on account of the great care taken in the sorting and packing, are always preferred; the Norwegian Herring has, in consequence, fallen into such discredit that the Consular Agents in the different Baltic ports have lately addressed their Government on the subject, and the attention of the Herring dealers has been seriously called to it. I would here mention that the Mackerel Fishery has of late years become less and less productive; the same may be said of the Salmon Fisheries. The freshwater fish have likewise decreased in such a degree as to induce the Government to take measures to arrest the evil, and various attempts have been made to supply the deficiency. Establishments have been newly formed in different parts of the country, where successful experiments have been made to multiply the fish by artificial means. The Whaling Expeditions from Norway have been on the increase, 20 to 30 vessels leaving the country annually in search of Whales and Seals; and, although I am in possession of no certain information as to the productiveness of this hazardous branch of trade, yet the yearly increase of the capital employed in it encourages the belief in its profitableness.

Before quitting the subject of the fisheries, I would remark that the attempts made of late years by the Norwegians to find a market for their fish in the New World have not been very successful; and, from the slow increase of their exports to the Brazils and the West Indies, it does not appear likely to become an important outlet for their produce. Attempts have been made to introduce their Clip fish into Havannah; but the price is so much higher than that imported from Canada and the United States that it is not likely to become much in request, as at present the consumption of the Norwegian fish is almost exclusively confined to the wealthy classes.
