THURSDAY, 17th FEBRUARY, 1887.

THE General Assembly having, by several Proclamations of His Excellency the Governor, hereto prefixed, been prorogued until this day, the members thereof met in the Assembly Room.

By virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal of this Island, to the Honorables Edward D. Shea, President of the Legislative Council, and Robert Thorbourne, member of the Executive Council, which is as follows:—

SIR G. W. DESVŒUX, Governor. [L. S.] VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

To ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETING:

KNOW YE that We have appointed, and by these presents do constitute and appoint, the Honorables E. D. SHEA, President of the Legislative Council, and ROBERT THORBURN, member of the Executive

Council of the Island of Newfoundland, to be Commissioners, they or either of them to administer the oath of allegiance to the Honorable Maurice Fenelon, appointed by Commission from Our Governor of Our said Island, to be a member, (provisionally), of Our Legislative Council of Our said Island; and also, the undermentioned persons, elected to serve in the General Assembly of Our said Island for the Districts, or divisions of Districts, set opposite their names, respectively:—

WILLIAM J. S. DONNELLY: Placentia and St. Mary's,

ALFRED A. PENNEY: Carbonear,

MICHAEL T. KNIGHT: Twillingate,

ALFRED B. MORINE: Bonavista,

THOMAS J. McC. MURPHY: St. John's East,

Giving to them and either of them, Our said Commissioners, full power and authority to perform the matters hereinbefore mentioned, ratifying and confirming all whatsoever they or either of them do and perform in this behalf, and thereof they, or either of them, are to make due return under their hands and seals to Our Governor of Our said Island with these Presents annexed.

The said Commissioners came between the hours of Twelve and One o'clock, on the Seventeenth inst., into the Council Chamber, Richard B. Holden, Esq., Clerk of the General Assembly, as in duty bound, attending, when the Honorable W. J. S. Donnelly, returned member for the District of Placentia and St. Mary's, Alfred A. Penney, Esq., returned member for the District of Carbonear, Michael T. Knight, Esq., returned member for the District of Twillingate, Alfred B. Morine, Esq., returned member for the District of Bonavista, and Thomas J. M'C. Murphy, Esq., returned member for the District of St. John's East, took and subscribed the oath of allegiance, in presence of the said Commissioners.

And the said Honorables William J. S. Donnelly, Alfred A. Penney, Michael T. Knight, Esq., Thomas J. M'C. Murphy, Esq., and Alfred B. Morine, Esq., took their seats for the said several Districts.

At Two o'clock p. m., Wm. F. Rennie, Esq., the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, being announced, informed the House that the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Governor, who was unable from illness to attend the opening of the Legislature, desired the immediate attendance of this House in the Chamber of the Legislative Council.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House attended the Commissioners in the Council Chamber, when the Commission, appointing the Honorables E. D. Shea, President of the Legislative Council, Charles R. Ayre, and A. W. Harvey, was read by the Clerk of the Council.

The House being returned to the Assembly room, and Mr. Speaker in the Chair, informed the House that, when in attendance in the Council Chamber, the Honorable E. D. Shea, one of the said Commissioners appointed as aforesaid, read the Speech of His Excellency to both branches of the Legislature, of which, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy, and which he read to the House, as follows:—



Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly :

I have much pleasure in meeting you again in session, and an especially glad that, at a time of unusal moment, the affairs of the Colony will have the advantage of your combined attention.

I regret that I am unable to offer you congratulations upon a condition of public prosperity.

The staple industries of the Colony have, during the past year, been attended with very unfavorable results, which have seriously affected our population.

The seal fishery was only partially successful, and the diminished produce sold at very low prices.

The herring and salmon fisheries were also exceptionally unproductive.

As regards our most important industry—the codfishery—the results have been equally unfavorable. Along the Northern Coasts of the Island it has been an almost complete failure, and on the Labrador Coast the quantity of produce has been fully one-third below the average; and though the reduction thus occasioned in the amount of our exports has probably been largely compensated by the good fortune which attended the fishermen on the Banks, and on the Western Coast, the advantage hence derivable has been neutralized by the extreme depression of prices produced by the bounty-supported competition of foreigners.

Agricultural operations, though in some districts the potato crop was a failure from disease, have, on the whole, been attended with a fair measure of success,

The mining industry has, during the year, shewn a substantial increase of activity, and gives indications of further development in the near future.

Though there was thus not an entire absence of promising features in the record of our industrial pursuits, their general results were such as to render evident that, a large proportion of the population of the Eastern and Northern Coasts of the Island had failed to secure the means of subsistence for the coming winter, and that in the absence of remedial measures, severe and wide-spread destitution was inevitable.

In devising such measures, my Government was guided by a desire to avoid, wherever possible, the evils of gratuitous relief, and has confined the necessary expenditure, as far as practicible, to wages for labour on works of public utility.

The details of this expenditure will, in due course, be laid before you, from which you will find that my Government has had special regard to the recommendations of the recent joint address of your Honorable Houses, for the construction of new lines of roads in agricultural districts. It may thus be hoped that one result of this outlay will be increased attention on the part of our people to the cultivation of the soil.

In inviting you to confirm the action of my Government, taken under these circumstances, I take the opportunity of expressing the hope that that action will not be regarded as implying either a duty or an intention on their part to undertake similar relief-works in future, except under the pressure of an equally serious emergency. The resources of the (olony are unable to bear the frequent repetition of such a strain; and it is only by greater providence on the part of the people, during times of comparative abundance, that we can hope to escape very serious calamities in the not distant future. I would, therefore, earnestly urge upon all persons of influence in the community to inculcate this virtue to the utmost of their ability, and by all means within their reach.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I regret to inform you that, owing to the causes already referred to, the Customs' Revenue has fallen below the estimate. I rely upon you to make such provision as the circumstances render expedient.

The public accounts for the past, and the estimates for the coming year, will, in due course, be laid before you.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I am glad to be able to announce that during the past summer, a convention was concluded between Her Majesty and the Government of Spain, by which the tariff inequalities were removed, that have hitherto affected our fishery products in the markets of that country.

The Colony has been invited to take part in an international exhibition of fish, and fish products, to take place at Barcelona in the Autumn of the present year, and the Government has intimated their acceptance of this invitation. I confidently hope that this concurrence of favourable influences will tend to the improvement and extension of commercial relations between the Kingdom of Spain and this Colony.

I have further to announce that a proposition has been made by Her Majesty's Government for the participation of this Colony in a conference of Colonial Representatives, which it is intended to hold early this year in London, for the purpose of consultation upon matters of general interest, including questions relating to the defences, postal, and telegraphic arrangements, and other important subjects. I trust that my Government may be in a position to respond to this invitation, and that the Colony may derive benefit from the proposed deliberations.

The period provided by the contract with the Newfoundland Railway Company, for the completion of the line to Hall's Bay, having terminated in May last, the failure of the ompany to construct by far the larger portion of this Line, has raised the question as to the liability of the Colony to continue payment of subsidy, and that question is now the subject of litigation between the Government and the Company.

The contract with the Allan Company for the Ocean Mail Service,

being terminable by either party upon twelve months' notice, to be given in the month of January in any year, my Government, deeming it expedient to continue the service on the present basis, have given notice to the Company of the termination of the contract in January of next year.

The occasion appears to be opportune for dealing at the same time with the Coastal Steam Service, with a view to its establishment on an improved footing for the future; and my Government is, therefore, giving to this subject its careful consideration.

The question of the management of local affairs of the town of St. John's, including the improvement of its sewerage, appears to be now ripe for final disposition, and I do not doubt that the proposals which may be made to you will receive that attention which the importance of the subject deserves.

I had earnestly hoped to be able to inform you of Her Majesty's gracious allowance and confirmation of the Bill for the preservation of Bait fishes, which was passed unanimously last Session by both of your Honorable Houses, and was generally regarded as the sole available means of relieving the trade of the Colony from its existing depression.

It is, therefore, with profound regret that I announce the receipt, a few days ago, of a telegraphic message from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, conveying the intimation of the inability of Her Majesty's Government to allow the Bill for this year, owing to the near approach of the fishing season, and to the fact thah foreign capital has already been expended in connection with the season's operations.

The promised despatch, which is to give further explanation of the grounds of this decision, has not yet arrived. But my Ministers, inferring from the above message that a similar measure will be permitted to take effect after the coming season, will forthwith submit to you another Bill with the same objects.

If their view should prove correct, I trust that there is reason for

hoping that the Colony will enjoy greatly improve prospects in 1888. But as the delay of a whole year which will cause very serious loss to the Colony, has been presumably occasioned out of consideration for Imperial interests, my Ministers contemplate representations to Her Majesty's Government, such as they hope will have the effect of securing that the whole weight of the burthen shall not be borne by this small community.

In conclusion, I have to note with gratitude to the Almighty that the country has, during the year, been entirely free from dangerous epidemic disease, and that the conduct of our people, notwithstanding their severe trials, has, on the whole, shown a remarkable absence of serious crime.

In now inviting you to commence your deliberations, I earnestly trust that our united efforts may, under the Divine blessings, result in advantage to the Colony and its people.

The Hon. the Premier moved, seconded by the Hon. ATTORNEY GENERAL, the following Resolution,—

Whereas the Legislature has been informed by His Excellency the Governor, in the Speech with which His Excellency has been pleased to open the present session, that the Act which was passed last session, for the protection of the Bait fisheries of the Colony, had not received the assent of Her Majesty, and,

Whereas, it is deemed of urgent and paramount importance, that, a measure to the same effect should be, without delay, introduced and enacted, in the hope that the same may receive the assent of Her Majesty, and that the consideration of His Excellency's Speech be deferred until after the introduction and enactment of the measure referred to.

That leave be given to introduce the Bill, forthwith.

And the question being put thereon, passed in the affirmative, and,

Ordered, -Accordingly.

The Hon. the PREMIER, on leave granted, presented a Bill to regulate the exportation and sale of Herring, Caplin, Squid and other Bait fishes, which was read a first time.

Ordered,-That the said Bill be read a second time to-morrow.

The Hon. the PREMIER gave notice that, he will on to-morrow, move for the Suspension of the Rules of this House in respect of the Bill for the regulation of the exportation and sale of Herring, Caplin, Squid and other Bait fishes.

Ordered,—That the House at its rising, do adjourn until half-past three of the clock, each day, unless otherwise ordered.

Ordered,-That the House at its rising, do adjourn until to-

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow at half-past three of the clock.

FRIDAY 18th FEBRUARY, 1887.

The Hon. the PREMIER gave notice that, he will on to-morrow, move the adoption of a dutiful address to Her Gracious Majesty the Queen, on the occasion of this the Jubilee year of Her Majesty's reign.

Ordered,—That the Rules of the House be suspended in reference to the Bill for prohibiting the exportation and sale of Bait.

Pursuant to the order of the day, the Bill entitled, "An Act to regulate the exportation and sale of Herring, Caplin, Squid and other Bait fishes," was read a second time, and on motion of the Hon. the Premier,

The House went into Committee of the Whole, on the said Bill.

The Hon. Mr. SPEAKER left the chair.

Mr. Godden took the chair of the Committee.

Hon. Mr. SPEAKER resumed the chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that, they had considered the Bill to them referred, and had passed the same without amendment.

Ordered,-That the said report be received.

Ordered,—That the said Bill be engrossed and read a third time to-morrow.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the House into Committee of the Whole, on the following Resolutions:—

WHEREAS, Her Majesty Queen Victoria did, by Letters Patent, dated the 28th March, 1876, make provision for constituting the office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies,

And whereas, Her Majesty did by Royal Sign, Manual and Signet, commission and appoint His Excellency Sir G. W. DesVœux, K.C.M.G., to the said office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief.

And whereas, by the said Letters Patent, it is provided that in the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence of the Governor out of the Colony, all and every the powers therein granted to himshall be vested in the person appointed under Her Majesty's Sign, Manual and Signet, to administer the Government of this Colony.

And whereas, His Excellency Sir G. W. Des Vœux did by proclamation dated the 17th day February, declare that he was unable personally to meet the Legislative Council and House of Assembly upon their coming together for the business of the session, and to declare in person the causes of their being summoned.

And whereas, because of incapacity in the Governor as aforesaid the duty of meeting the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, and of declaring the causes of calling them together devolved upon the officer appointed to administer the Government of this Colony to wit: the Hon. Sir F. B. T. Carter, K.C.M.G.

And whereas, neither the said Governor nor the officer appointed to administer the Government of the Colony has met the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, and declared the causes of calling them together.

And whereas, no Proclamation declaring the General Assembly of this Colony open for the dispatch of business has been issued.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of the representatives of the electoral districts of this Colony here assembled, that the General Assembly or Legislature of this Colony is not now in session according to Law, and that it is incompetent and ultra vires for the said representatives to proceed with the business of Legislation until the General Assembly or Legislature shall be legally in session for that purpose.

Resolved,—That the foregoing resolution be communicated to His Excellency tha Governor by the Hon. Sir Ambrose Shea, K. C. M. G. and the Hon. Robert Thorburn.

The Hon. the PREMIER gave notice that, he will on to-morrow, of move the adoption of an address to the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in relation to the Bill for the regulation of the exportation and sale of Bait fishes.

Ordered,—That the House at its rising, do adjourn until tomorrow.

Then the House adjourned until tc-morrow at half-past three of the clock.

SATURDAY, 19th FEBRUARY, 1887.

The Hon. the Speaker ordered Mr. Morine's notice of motion to be excided from the Journals as being in derogation of the dignity and privileges of the House and as tending to invalidate the proceedings of both branches of the Legislature.

The Hon. the PREMIER moved, seconded by Sir A. SHEA,

Resolved,—That the following Address be presented to Her Most Gracious Majesty, on the occasion of the Jubilee year of Her Majesty's reign:

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY,-

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loving subjects, the Commons House of Assembly of Newfoundland, in Session convened, beg to approach Your Majesty, on this auspicious occasion, the Jubilee year of Your reign, and to express our feelings of profound gratitude to Almighty God, who has, in His infinite goodness and wisdom, seen fit so long to spare Your Majesty to rule over a happy, united and loyal people.

Representing, in our legislative capacity, the oldest of Your Majesty's Colonial possessions, we feel a special honour and pleasure at being permitted to join in the congratulations of the vast Empire

under the beneficent sway of Your Majesty, the people of which cannot fail to be drawn closer together, by one common bond of loyalty and devotion—the spontaneous outcome of an event of world-wide interest and celebrity.

To the Right Honorable Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies,—

SIR,-

We, Her Majesty's loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Newfoundland, in session convened, have had under consideration the subject of our coast fisheries of foreign fishermen and their in relation to the operations competition in our markets. The history of this important matter was exhaustively examined in an address from branches of our Legislature to the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies in May last. This address accompanied a Bill passed in the last session to control the sale of Bait to foreigners and set forth the reasons for the adoption of that measure, and with such completeness and force as to claim its confirmation by Her Majesty's Government for whose sanction it had been reserved.

The Council and House of Assembly had not contemplated the possibility of successful opposition to their views in this case. The measure was the outcome of a state of things which placed all our interests in a perilous position. We accordingly passed the Bait Act as a measure of self-preservation, and this was so clearly shown in the address that accompanied it, that we saw no room for doubt of the cordial concurrence of Her Majesty's Government in this endeavour to guard the integrity of our trade and the well-being of our population.

It was, therefore, with feelings of profound disappointment and regret that we learned from His Excellency's speech at the opening of the present session of the Legislature, and from your despatch to him of the 3rd instant, that Her Majesty will not be advised to give her sanction to this Bill.

This announcement awakened a public sentiment that has had its expression in the immediate passage of another similar Bill which took precedence of all other business in the Legislature, and will be transmitted immediately for the approval of Her Majesty's Government. We most earnestly trust that the result of this renewed effort in support of our rights may not be another disappointment with its rui lous consequence.

When we learn from your despatch that the main reason for the refusal of our Bill is that its present adoption would "inflict grave loss on the French fishermen," we cannot forbear from the expression of our surprise at this apparent disregard of the sufferings of our fishermen, and of the British interests which are thus made subservient to the purposes of foreigners. The people of this Colony have the right in our fisheries, and foreigners have not; and we cannot see those rights surrendered, in defiance of our appeals, without expressing our deep sense of the injustice to which our people are thus called on to submit.

Your Despatch sets forth that further information is required to enable Her Majesty's Government to appreciate the true character and bearings of our Bait Bill. The address of the Legislature already referred to, in possession of Her Majesty's Government, is pregnant with facts in justification of that measure, and appears to us to exhaust the whole subject. But while we fail to see any want of completeness in the evidence already supplied, every desire is felt to satisfy any further reasonable requirements in this respect.

It would further appear from your despatch that, in support of the objections to the measure, much importance is given to the fact that the Bait Traffic has been long recognised and has only of late been resisted. We thought the reasons for this change of view had been fully explained in the representations recently made to Her Majesty's Government. The traffic was permitted so long as the bounty-assisted fisheries of France found a market in that country for their produce. But within the last three years the great increase in their fisheries has

gone far beyond the requirements of their home markets; and we find them meeting us in Spain, Italy, and other European countries, and with the bounty equal to sixty per cent. of the value of the fish, they are fast supplanting us; the reduced value of our staple industry from this cause already representing a fairly estimated sum of £250,000 per annum, under conditions that menace us with a still more serious decline. In these facts our change of view of the Bait traffic is but too well warranted, and we have abundant reason for the application of the remedy provided in the Bait Act. In furnishing our rivals with bait, we promote the evils we have to contend with, and our only course is to terminate this suicidal traffic.

We are but too conscious that, from the causes referred to, the condition of our trade awakens a sense of great anxiety at the present moment; while we have full trust in the future, if only permitted by Her Majesty's Government do legislate as we see fit for the protection of what belongs to us. We regret we cannot safely accept your view of waiting to test by further experience the question how much longer and to what further extent our trade will bear up against the adverse influences that now prevail. Our ability to sustain ourselves against undue competition would be no argument for obliging us to contribute to its continuance, while the perils of such an experiment are too obvious to warrant its acceptance.

Her Majesty's Government, in proposing that they should be the judges of the effect of our measures on our local interests, are not, we humbly submit, in a position to discharge that duty with safety or advantage. When it is suggested that, as regards our Bait Act, a consultation with the French may lead to a remedy being found in some other direction for the admitted evils, this proposal would appear to have originated with a want of knowledge of the situation. A free supply of Bait to the French from our coasts means the effacement of our British trade and the exodus of our population, and forbids all thought of possible equivalents. We, moreover, must decline, respectfully, to accept the view that the French, or any other Foreign Power, had a status or consultative claim in the control or dispositions.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

We, the Commons House of Assembly of Newfoundland, in Legislative Session convened, while thanking your Excellency for the gracious Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present session of the Legislature, deeply 1 ment the cause of Your Excellency's inability to meet us personally in session, at a time of such moment in the affairs of the Colony.

We share in your Excellency's regret that the results of our staple industries, the cod, herring, seal and salmon fisheries, having been exceptionally unproductive in respect of quantity and value, cannot form subjects of congratulation, and we recognize, with Your Excellency, that the depression of prices in our most important industry—the cod fishery—has been produced by the bounty-supported competition of foreigners.

Mining operations have been, we are glad to learn from Your Excellency, fairly active and successful, and though agricultural produces, with the exception of the potato crop, have been remunerative, we earnestly hope that these industries will, during the present year, be attended with an increasing measure of success.

We are gratified to know that the measures devised by Your Government, to secure the means of subsistence for the large proportion of the population of the eastern and northern coasts of the Island, doomed, in the absence of remedial measures, to destitution, were directed, as far as practicable, to provide wages for labour or works of public utility, such as the construction of new lines of roads in agricultural districts, by which attention to cultivation of the soil will be encouraged and facilitated.

While promising to confirm the action of Your Government, taken under these circumstances of extreme exigency, we concur with Your Excellency in the expression of the hope that similar relief works will not be expected in the future, unless circumstances, which we hardly dare to contemplate, may necessitate them.

We recognize the dangerous pressure which such an expenditure threatens, and rely on the intelligence and good sense of our population to husband their resources in years of plenty to meet the times of need.

We are sorry to be informed that the Revenue of the past year has fallen below the estimate, and we beg to assure Your Excellency that we shall endeavour to make due provision for the requirements of the public service for the current year.

We are glad to be informed that a convention has been concluded between Her Majesty and the Government of Spain, removing the tariff inequalities affecting the exportation of our staple to the markets of that country, and that Your Government has accepted the invitation to take part in an International Exhibition of Fish Products, to be held in Barcelona in the present year, and we have no doubt that the commercial relations of the Kingdom of Spain and this Colony will be thereby improved and extended.

With Your Excellency we also confidently hope that this Island will derive benefit from the deliberations of the Conference of Colonial Representatives in London, in which we are invited to participate.

We note that the liability of the Colony for the subsidy to the Newfoundland Railway Company is in litigation between the Government and the Company, owing to the failure of the Company to perform its contract, and, in the interests of the Colony, we trust for a speedy solution of the question.

It is satisfactory to know that Your Excellency's Government, deeming the Ocean Mail Service on its present basis in expedient, have notified the Messrs. Allen that the contract must terminate next January, and that regarding the occasion as opportune for improving the Coastal Steam Service, are giving the subject their careful consideration.

We beg to assure Your Excellency that the question of the management of its local affairs by the town of St. John's, including an improved system of sewerage, will receive the earnest attention of this House.

We profoundly deplore the intelligence which it has been Your Excellency's painful task to announce, that Her Majesty has not been advised to allow the Bill for the preservation of our Bait-fishes, which was unanimously passed last Session by both Houses of the Legislature, and was, and is, justly regarded as the only possible remedy for the depression of our Colonial trade. Although we do not recognize that the investment of foreign capital in fisheries, mainly dependent for their existence on our bait supply, should receive consideration, precedent to that of our own commerce, struggling against the unfair bounty-fed competition of foreign nations, still we appreciate the delicacy of Her Majesty's Government upon the subject of sufficient notice to foreign capitalists, and therefore we have, concurrently with the other Branch of the Legislature, re-considered and re-enacted the Bill to which Your Excellency refers; and hope that the grounds for disallowing it being now removed, Your Excellency will be enabled, before the close of this Session, to announce to this General Assembly that it has received Her Majesty's most gracious sanction. connection we desire to express our grateful appreciation of Your Excellency's sympathy with the interests of the people over whom you are called to rule, and more especially of the zeal and energy which you have been pleased to employ with Her Majesty's Government on our behalf, and we join with Your Excellency in the expression of the hope that Your Ministers' representations to Her Majesty's Government will relieve this comparatively small community from a part of the burthen of the heavy loss resulting from the delay occasioned by the postponement of Colonial to high Imperial interests.

We unite with Your Excellency in gratitude to Providence for our immunity from dangerous epidemic disease, and for the remarkable absence of serious crime during the past year, and in the earnest trust that, with the Divine blessing, our united efforts will result in advantage to the people of this Colony.

On motion that the Report be adopted, Mr. Bond moved, seconded by Mr. Morine, that the following amendments to the Address of Thanks do pass:

"We are deeply pained to hear from Your Excellency that, along the Eastern and Northern coasts of the Island, the cod-fishery was almost a complete failure, and that a large portion of the population thereof had failed to secure the means of subsistence for the coming winter. This unfortunate condition of the people would seem to have demanded a remedy which the Legislature should have been called upon to devise; and we are of opinion that it should have been assembled to concert a suitable scheme for meeting the calamity so vividly portrayed by Your Excellency, when, it may be reasonably presumed, such measures would have been adopted as were best calculated to meet the exigency, with a due regard to a judicious expenditure upon works of utility.

We do not regard the Joint Address, to which Your Excellency refers, as in any way authorizing or excusing a lavish expenditure of the public monies under the head of relief-works. At the time of the passing of that Address, the cod-fishery had not been commenced, and the calamitous result to which Your Excellency refers was not known or imagined. The Address, therefore, was not intended to meet the emergency referred to, but was passed with an entirely different object in view; and we respectfully submit that, in the hands of Your Executive, the Joint Address has been perverted to carry out party schemes, and for purposes never contemplated by this House.

We realize that the immense outlay of money, and particularly upon the so-called Placentia Branch Railway, was not, as ostensibly set forth, for the purpose of relieving distress, for Your Excellency does not allege such to have existed in the Southern and Western districts, and we deeply deplore the ignoring, by the Government, of the legitimate claims of the Northern districts, especially as regards Railway extension.

We hope that measures will at once be adopted to carry out the extension of the Railway to the Northern Districts, where it is so much needed, to enable the people of the Colony to avail of now dormant resources.

We notice that the liability of the Colony for the subsidy claimed by the Newfoundland Railway Co. for that part of the Railway now constructed and in operation, has been made the subject of litigation by the refusal of Your Government to pay the subsidy, and we deeply regret the fact that the good name of this Colony has thereby been jeopardised. We feel that an amicable arrangement should have been made between the Government and the Railway Company, and we hope that no time will be lost in bringing this about. It is only by coming to some such agreement that we can reasonably hope to see the Railway to Hall's Bay and the Carbonear Branch proceeded with; and we feel that it is unfair to delay to the districts of Trinity, Bonavista, Fogo, Twillingate, St. Barbe, Bay St. George, Burgeo and LaPoile, and Fortune Bay, Carbonear and Bav-de-Verds, the extension of those facilities which are enjoyed by other parts of the Island, and for which they are each called upon to pay.

We are glad to learn from Your Excellency that mining operations have substantially increased, and give indications of development in future. The enthusiastic labor of Murray, Howley, and others, have shown Newfoundland to be possessed of great deposits of copper, coal, and other minerals; and we feel assured that when means of speedy communication and easy transportation have been provided, the development of these resources will materially benefit the whole people of this Colony. And in view of the numbers who are likely to be engaged in the prosecution of this industry. we shall be glad to give prompt attention to the placing of measures on the Statute-Book which will afford to operative miners protection from injury to life and limb whilst engaged in their avocations. It is also pleasing to hear from Your Excellency that the labors of the agriculturist have, upon the whole, been well rewarded. We regret, however, to observe, upon perusal of a Despatch recently sent by Your Excellency to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that you have been misinformed as to the agricultural capabilities of this Colony. In that Despatch you stated that "wheat, barley, maize, apples, etc., cannot, unless under exceptional circumstances, be brought to maturity here, while oats frequently fail to ripen, and have to be cut as fodder for cattle." Your Excellency also compares our lands unfavorably with those of Manitoba and the Western United States, and you express the opinion that farming operations cannot, "in any appreciable degree, hinder the rapid decay of wealth that would result from continuously unremunerative fisheries." We beg to assure Your Excellency that, even upon the Peninsula of Avalon, it is possible to ripen wheat, barley, oats, apples, etc., with fair success, and that they are ripened with ease upon the fertile lands of the main part of the Island. Our proximity to European markets make one acre of fertile land here worth many in Manitoba or the Western States; and we have every reason to believe that the Island possesses agricultural resources sufficient, were they properly developed, to maintain its whole population. We deeply regret that Your Excellency should have been informed to the contrary, and that such damaging statements should have been published to the world. We are fully alive to the necessity of restrictive legislation for the preservation of the Bait Fishes upon our Coasts, especially when considered in connection with the encouragement giving to the fishing industry by the Governments of the United States and France in large bounties and protective duties. We are, however, conscious of the solicitude of Her Majesty's Government for the welfare and sustentation of our fishing interests, and we regret that disallowed Bait Bill of last Session should have been re-introduced before the House was made aware of the reasons which influenced Her Majesty's Government in advising Her Majesty to withhold her assent to that Bill.

We are of opinion that more mature consideration of the subject would have enabled the Legislature to have enacted a Law within our power to carry into execution, sufficiently restrictive in its operation, and which would have readily met with the approval of Her Majesty's Government. We hope that, should Her Majesty be advised to assent to the Bill which has been passed by the Legislature during the present session, ample provisions will be made for the indemnity of the large number of people whose sole support hitherto has been derived from the trade carried on by them in the taking and sale of Bait Fishes."

The Select Committee, appointed during the last Session to consider and report upon the Bill, entitled "An Act to provide for the Sewerage of the Town of St. John's, and for other purposes," and to whom power was given, by resolution of the House, to continue their labors during recess, and to initiate and carry out certain works, specifically set forth in the said resolution, beg to submit the following Report:—

The Committee have, during the recess, applied themselves mainly to the work of collecting the necessary data and information for devising and preparing an improved system of sewerage and cleansing for the town of St. John's.

They have further acted upon the powers conferred upon them so far as to procure the importation of a considerable quantity of sewer pipes and other material, suitable for the commencement of the work, and capable of being adapted to any plan that may be finally adopted, with which operations may be commenced as soon as considered desirable.

The work of collecting and preparing the data and information referred to has been carried on under the direction and supervision of Mr. Burchell, the Government Engineer.

His report, which is herewith appended, presents the result of the labors of the season, as regards facts ascertained and collected, and his opinions and recommendations in relation to the several important, practical and scientific questions affecting the general scheme under consideration. The Committee deem it unnecessary to offer any observations in relation to the various subjects dealt with in Mr. Burchell's Report-They would, however, take this opportunity of inviting special attention to the great industry, fidelity, and ability, which are conspicuous in the Report itself, and in the performance of the work, of which that Report is a synopsis.

It may be stated generally that the result of the work so far done has been to put the Legislature in possession of sufficient data to enable them to proceed to the intelligent consideration of this important subject in all its most essential features.

Appended to Mr. Burchell's Report is a statement of the expenditures incurred under the authority of the Committee.

That having regard to the large interests involved in the Bill now before the House, affecting, as it assumes to do, much existing legislation in respect of the election of members of the House of Assembly, the necessary amendment of which legislation is not provided for in this Bill, and,

Having regard to the fact that matters which should be the subjects of separate enactments, are conjoined in this Bill.

Therefore,—This House is of opinion that, the questions—(1) Of voting at Elections,—(2) Of corrupt practices at elections, and,—(3) Of the trial of controverted elections; whilst considered in conjunction each with the others, should be made the subject of separate enactments, and that the whole subject matter of, and embracing these several questions, should be relegated to the consideration of a Select Committee of the House.

That, for these reasons, it is not expedient now, to proceed with the second reading of this Bill.

And whereas, it is evident that the prosperity of this Colony de-

pends, in a large degree, upon preventing the exodus of its artizan and labouring classes, which can only be done by encouraging and sustaining the various labor, giving industries suited to this Colony, and by keeping within the Colony a large amount of money, annually sent abroad for the manufacturies and products of other countries, and this can be done by so adjusting the Tariff, that while yielding all necessary revenue, it will shield the industries of this Country from the destructive competition of foreigners, and by keeping Newfound-land for the Newfoundlanders.

And whereas, the present Tariff of this Colony, (1) by reason of its many specific rates, bears unequally upon classes, (2) taxes necessaries heavily and luxuries lightly, and (3) places the struggling industries of this Colony at the mercy of foreign manufacturers.

Be it resolved, that a thorough re-adjustment of the Tariff is necessary, and that this House hereby pledges its best efforts to the task of framing a tariff, (1) which shall bear with equity upon all classes, (2) which shall fall upon the rich and poor alike, in proportion to their means, and (3) which shall encourage home industries as far as may be possible by means of a Tariff wisely levied.

Whereas, the Revenues of the Colony are principally derived from those engaged in the fisheries, and,

Whereas, an increase in the number of the Headland and Harbor Lights, would materially contribute to the convenience and safety of the fishermen of this Colony in their hazardous occupations.

Resolved,—That an Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor, praying that a sufficient sum of money be provided for the erection of Light Houses, on said points of Newfoundland and Labrador, as may be directed by His Excellency the Governor-in-Council, and this House will make provision for the same.

The House of Assembly having had under consideration the petition of James Fitzgerald, of Fogo, and others, upon the subject of the extension of Telegraph Communication to Fogo, respectfully request that Your Excellency will be pleased to take the same into consideration, and make such order thereon as may appear reasonable, and this House will make provision for the same.

Works of Art, viz :- Engravings, Paintings, Statuary, not intended for sale.

Resolved,—There shall be a drawback allowed upon Tobacco manufactured in this Colony when such Tobacco shall be exported from this Colony at the rate of fourteen cents per pound of such Tobacco exported as aforesaid: Provided, that such drawback shall not be allowed upon any quantity of Tobacco so exported at any one time less than five hundred pounds. No drawback shall be allowed or payable on Tobacco Stems exported from this Colony.

Resolved,—The Duties payable upon Leaf Tobacco imported into this Colony and its Dependencies, where the duty set forth in any entry shall amount to two hundred dollars, may be secured to Her Majesty by bond in the same manner as duties payable upon other goods may be now so secured, and subject in every respect to the same regulations.

Resolved,—There shall be allowed to any printer a drawback to the amount of any duties that may have been paid on any paper actually printed upon in this Colony, upon the production of affidavits satisfactory to the Receiver General, setting forth the amount of duties which have been paid thereon, and that the said paper has been actually and bona fide printed upon in this Colony.

Resolved,—There shall be allowed a drawback upon Biscuit manufactured in this Colony from flour imported on which duty has been paid at the Customs when such biscuit shall be exported from this Colony at the rate of seventeen cents per hundred weight of such biscuit exported as aforesaid: Provided that such drawback shall not be allowed upon any quantity of biscuit so exported at any one time less than one hundred bags.

Resolved,—The duty hereinbefore provided to be levied upon fish is subject to the following proviso, namely: Provided that the Governor may by proclamation published in the Royal Gazette remit as he may deem equitable the whole or any part of the duty imposed on fish imported into this Colony or its Dependencies from countries, making such changes or reductions in their tariff of duties with respect to fish, the produce of fish, or other articles exported from this Colony and its Dependencies to such countries.

Resolved,—It shall not be lawful for any importer of dried fish to warehouse the same in any of the ports of this Colony and its Dependencies without the payment of the duty hereinbefore provided of one dollar and fifty cents on every quintal so warehoused, and the provisions of any act of this Colony with regard to the warehousing

of goods on the first entry thereof, or to the allowance of drawbacks upon exportation, shall not in either case apply or be construed to apply to such fish.

Mr. Emerson, from the Joint Select Committee, appointed to consider the proposed arrangement of the Treaties between Great Britain and France on the Newfoundland Fisheries, presented the Report of the said Committee, which was received and read as follows:—

The Joint Select Committee appointed by the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly to consider the Arrangement proposed to be entered into by the Government of Great Britain and France relative to the Treaties between the two countries on the subject of the Newfoundland Fisheries, beg to report:

That they gave, during the last Session of the Legislature, their most earnest consideration to the matter to them referred.

That they arrived at the conclusion that several of the stipulations contained in the arrangement would be most detrimental to the interests of this Colony.

That they had prepared certain Resolutions as herein contained, which would have been presented during the last Session of the Legislature as a Report, but that communications were made to the Committee on behalf of the Colonial Office, requesting them to await the arrival of His Excellency the Governor and Mr. Pennell, delegate, who would meet the Committee and more freely explain the views of the Imperial authorities.

That this Committee accordingly acceded to this request, and had several interviews with Mr. Pennel, whereat very free discussion and interchange of opinions took place, as will be seen from a Report of these conferences submitted herewith.

These led, in the end, to a very clear understanding on both sides of the points which this Colony could never yield—the one of greatest importance being contained in the 16th clause of the Arrangement, which provided for a permanent and unlimited supply of bait to the French.

The impossibility of the Colony assenting to this proposition being made perfectly clear to the representatives of the Imperial authorities, it was pressed on the Committee that they should not shut the door to further negotiations for the time being, by making their final Report, but should ask to be allowed to sit during the recess of the Legislature to receive communications from His Excellency the Governor touching the Imperial policy upon the subject matter to them referred, which it was suggested might lead to satisfactory results.

The Committee reported to the Legislature in this sense, and leave was granted to carry out their suggestion, and the Committee was strengthened by the appointment of additional members.

Contrary to the intention evidenced by the request on the one side and acquiescence on the other, in this suggestion, no such communication has been received; and an application to His Excellency for information whether the Committee might expect to receive any such communication has not resulted in a response leading the Committee to suppose that any proposition will be submitted to them.

The Committee, as at present constituted, therefore beg to confirm. the following Resolutions of last Session, and submit them, together with the foregoing, as their Report:

Whereas,—Her Majesty's Government have recognized, in the most solemn manner, the jurisdiction of the Government of this Colony over the Coastal Fisheries and the territory of Newfoundland and its Dependencies; and have acknowledged that the said Fisheries and territory cannot be alienated except with the consent of the Local Legislature, and have, by the Despatch accompanying the Arrangement of 1885, made between France and Great Britain, concerning that part of our coasts whereon the French have certain fishery privileges, further recognized as essential to the validity of the said Arrangement its ratification by our Local Legislature;

And whereas,—The Arrangement would place the French in possession of the principal harbors on the coast between Cape Ray and Cape John, to the practical exclusion of British fishermen from any of the fishing privileges of that Coast;

And whereas,—The said Arrangement gives jurisdiction to Commanders of French cruisers in matters criminal as well as civil, to the disregarding of those principles and procedures to which, as British subjects, we are accustomed and entitled in Tribunals of Justice;

And whereas,—The French Fisheries on our coasts are sustained and stimulated by an enormous bounty from the French Government to French fishermen, and our people are in consequence unduly burdened in their competition in foreign markets, to the almost complete exclusion of their fish products from the said markets;

And whereas,—This proposed Arrangement seeks to assert, perpetuate, and legalize a claim to the purchasing of Bait by the French in all the parts of this Colony, without any reservation of power on the part of the Colony to restrict them by Local Legislation;

And whereas,—The great decline of late years of the inshore fishery of this Colony has necessitated the turning of our attention to the Bank Fishery and the economizing of the supply of bait fishes, in which ample proof of a marked decadence has been shewn within the past few years;

And whereas,—The power of restricting the supply of Bait on our coasts to nations competing with our people in an industry which is the staple support of the Colony is vital to the commercial existence of this country, which relies principally on its fisheries for the maintenance of its population;

And whereas,—No acceptable equivalent is ceded to this Colony for those large and important concessions proposed to be made by us to the French by this Arrangement.

Be it therefore resolved,—That for the reasons hereinbefore set forth, and by virtue of that Constitutional Right, which has been so often and so clearly admitted by Her Majesty's Government to exist in the Legislature of this Colony,

We do consider it our bounden duty, in the interests of Her Majesty's Loyal Subjects in Newfoundland and elsewhere, to respectfully decline to assent to the Arrangement now proposed for our ratification.

Hon. ATTORNEY GENERAL, pursuant to order, moved the adoption of the report of the Joint Committee of the Legislature, on the subject of the proposed arrangement with the French, and of the following Resolutions, embodying the terms of the said Report:—

Whereas,—Her Majesty's Government have recognized, in the most solemn manner, the jurisdiction of the Government of this Colony over the Coastal Fisheries and territory of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, and have acknowledged that the said Fisheries and territory cannot be alienated except with the consent of the Local Legislature, and have, by the Despatch accompanying the Arrangement of 1885, made between France and Great Britain, concerning that part of our Coasts whereon the French have certain fishery privileges, further recognized as essential to the validity of the said Arrangements its ratification by our Local Legislature;

And whereas,—The Arrangement would place the French in possession of the principal harbors on the coast between Cape Ray and Cape John, to the practical exclusion of British fishermen from any of the fishing privileges of that Coast;

And whereas,—The said Arrangement gives jurisdiction to Commanders of French cruisers in matters criminal as well as civil, to the disregarding of those principles and procedures to which, as British subjects, we are accustomed and entitled in Tribunals of Justice;

And whereas,-The French Fisheries on our coasts are sustained

and stimulated by an enormous bounty from the French Government to French fishermen, and our people are, in consequence, unduly burdened in their competition in Foreign Markets, to the almost complete exclusion of their fish products from the said markets;

And whereas.—This proposed Arrangement seeks to assert, perpetuate and legalize a claim to the purchasing of But by the French in all the parts of this Colony, without any reservation of power on the part of the Colony to restrict them by local legislation;

And whereas,—The great decline of late years of the Inshore Fishery of this Colony has necessitated the turning of our attention to the Bank Fishery, and the economizing of the supply of Bait-fishes, in which ample proof of a marked decadence has been shewn within the past few years;

And whereas,—The power of restricting the supply of Bait on our Coasts to nations competing with our people in an industry which is the staple support of the Colony is vital to the commercial existence of this country, which relies principally on its Fisheries for the maintenance of its population;

And whereas,—No acceptable equivalent is ceded to this Colony for those large and important concessions proposed to be made by us to the French by this Arrangement.

Be it therefore resolved,—That for the reasons hereinbefore set forth, and by virtue of that Constitutional Right, which has been so often and so clearly admitted by Her Majesty's Government to exist in the Legislature of this Colony, we do consider it our bounden duty, in the interests of Her Majesty's Loyal Subjects in Newfoundland and elsewhere, to respectfully decline to assent to the Arrangement now proposed for our ratification.

And whereas,—During the year 1886, the Governor in Council, upon the authority of the said Address, proceeded with the work of opening and constructing several important Lines of Road of the character and for the objects indicated by the said Address;

And whereas,—During the Autumn of the year 1886, certain expenditures upon various Public Works in several of the districts of the Colony were entered upon by the Governor in Council, upon Executive Responsibility, for the purpose of affording remunerative employment for the relief of distress caused by failure of the fisheries in those districts and at Labrador;

And whereas,—Owing to a deficient revenue during the year 1886, and other causes, there was a deficit upon the current account of revenue and expenditure on the 31st December, 1886; it is necessary to make provision for re-imbursing the Treasury for the advances made on account of the said several expenditures, and to meet the said deficit upon the said current account, amounting in all to the sum of \$478,794.06.

And whereas,—Among the said works so entered upon was the construction of a Road leading from the Harbor Grace Ju action of the Newfoundland Railway to Placentia, which work has been carried on upon such a plan as to admit of its being adapted to, and used for, the

construction of a Line of Railway from the said Harbor Grace Junction to Placentia;

And whereas,—It is considered that the construction of such a Line of Railway would be a work of great public utility, and it is desirable to make provision for its being proceeded with.

Resolved,—1. That it is the opinion of this Committee that the Government should be authorized to appropriate, from the amount remaining to the credit of the Fishery Award, the sum of \$254,652.49, to the liquidation of the amount of the said deficit upon current account; and the sum of \$14,502.18, for the purposes set forth in subsection 6.

- 2. That the sum of \$800,000 be raised by loan upon the credit of the Colony, and appropriated as follows:—
- (1) The sum of \$194,315.13, to the re-imbursement of the Treasury for the amounts so expended as aforesaid upon the said Agricultural Roads and Public Works, to 31st December, 1886.
- (2) The sum of \$140,365.16, to re-imburse the Treasury for the expenditure upon the said Roads and Public Works, from the 31st December last to the 15th day of April last.
- (3) The sum of \$16,204.58, to Chairman of the Board of Works, to cover over expenditures upon certain Main Lines, Roads and Public Works, during the year 1886, and up to the 15th day of April, 1887.
- (4) The sum of \$29,826.44, to re-imburse the Treasury for the amount expended upon the said Road from Harbor Grace Junction to Placentia, to the 31st Dec., 1886, and the further sum of \$53,547.83, for expenditure upon said Road to the 26th of April last.
- (5) The sum of \$17,800, to the payment of outstanding claims, on account of said several Roads and Public Works.
 - (6) The sum of \$28,740.86, towards the completion of the fol-

lowing works, viz:—the Line of Road from Broad Cove to Freshwater Road, called the Thorburn Road; the Road from Witless Bay to Holyrood; the Road from Channel to Codroy; the extension of the telegraph system to Fogo; the opening of the Tickle at Twillingate; the construction of the Breakwater at Bonavista.

- (7) The sum of \$320,000, to the construction and completion of the said Line of Railway from the said Harbor Grace Junction to Placentia, and the cost of Surveys, purchase of right of way, and all other necessary expenses incidental to the completion of said Line of Railway, and all necessary appurtenances, and the opening of the same for traffic.
- 3. That the sum of \$17,320.80, at the credit of the Dry Dock Act, be transferred to the credit of the Colony.
- 4. That such Bills as may be necessary for raising the said loans, and for providing for the construction of the said Line of Railway, be introduced for enactment by the House.

A MESSAGE FROM THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

The Acting Master-in-Chancery to the Legislative Council brought down the following written Message:

MR. SPEAKER,-

The Legislative Council acquaint the House of Assembly that they have passed the Bill sent up, entitled, "An Act to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature," without amendment.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

Ordered,—That the said Message do lie upon the table.

Mr. March gave notice that he would move for the appointment of a Select Committee of this House, to consider the expediency of the

Nomination and Appointment of Members of Road Boards in the several Districts of this Colony, and sections thereof, by the Electoral Vote of the said Districts, and sections thereof, and that such Committee have power to sit out of Session.

Mr. Morris gave notice that, on an early day next Session, he would move the following preamble and Resolution:—

Whereas, leases of some of the most valuable properties in the city of St. John's, more especially properties owned by absentee Landlords—Landlords who bear no proper proportion of the taxation of the country—will shortly expire;

And whereas, it is the opinion of the tenants of said landlords, that renewal leases can only be obtained upon terms practically prohibitive;

And whereas, the Select Committee appointed in 1883, by this House, to consider and report upon the question of Land Tenure in St. John's, and other cognate questions, by their report strengthen and confirm the opinion of the said tenants;

And whereas, it is the opinion of said tenants that, at the time of the making of the said leases, undue advantage was taken of them by landlords, to exact unfair and unjust terms, more especially by requiring tenants to pay the taxes both of landlord and tenant;

And whereas, it is the opinion of said tenants that the lands leased to them were, in many cases, acquired by said landlords improperly and illegally;

And whereas, the tenants under the unjust and inequitable covenants contained in their leases were required to expend large sums of money upon buildings, erections and improvements, whereby the lands of the said landlords were made of great value, nothwithstanding that an exorbitant ground rent was exacted;

And whereas, very serious encroachments have been made upon .

the harbor of St. John's in many instances by said landlords, whereby the area of said harbor has been contracted fully one-sixth of the total area, to the great detriment and disadvantage of the people of this colony;

And whereas, it is the province of this Legislature to enquire into the grievances of the people of the Colony, and, if the same are well founded, to remedy the same.

Be it therefore resolved,—That this Legislature pledges its best efforts at an early day, during the next Session of Parliament, to closely enquire into the whole question of Land Tenure in the city of St. John's, and introduce such legislation as will meet with the exigencies of the case.

At two o'clock a message from His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, was delivered by W. F. Rennie, Esq., the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency the Administrator in the Council Chamber.

And the Hon. the SPEAKER, at the Bar of the Council, addressed. His Excellency, as follows:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

The House of Assembly of Newfoundland have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the Expenses of the Public Services.

In the name of the House of Assembly I present to Your Excellency the following Bills, which His Excellency, in Her Majesty's name, was pleased to assent to:—

An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares and Merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies.

An Act for granting to Her Majesty a Sum of Money for constructing and Repairing Roads, Streets and Bridges, and other Public Works within this Colony, and to make provision for the protection and preservation of the same.

An Act to Consolidate and Amend the Acts for the Encouragement of Education.

An Act to provide for the better preservation of Sheep, and for other purposes.

An Act to prevent Spirituous or Fermented Liquors being brought on board Her Majesty's Ships without the consent of the Commander thereof.

An Act to extend and regulate the Liability of Employers to make compensation for personal injuries suffered by workmen in their services.

An Act respecting Contracts and Agreements as between Landlord and Tenant.

An Act to provide for the preservation of Copies of Books printed in Newfoundland, and for the Registration of such Books.

An Act for the Protection of the Post Office, and to punish offences committed in relation to the Post Office.

An Act to amend the Act Forty-five Victoria, Chapter six, entitled "An Act to Consolidate the Laws relating to the Customs."

An Act to amend Title XXVI, Chapter 93, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled, "Of a Marine Court of Enquiry."

An Act to amend Title 25, Cap. 92, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled "Of the Currency."

An Act to amend the Law respecting the Election of Members of the General Assembly. An Act for the Prevention of Corrupt and Illegal Practices at Elections.

An Act to make provision for the Trial of Controverted Elections.

An Act to amend the Act Forty-seven Victoria, Cap. 8, relating to the Coast Fisheries.

An Act to Regulate the Culling of Cod-fish.

An Act to Regulate the Taking of and Right of Property in Seals.

An Act for the Encouragement of Shipbuilding, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend and consolidate the Acts relating to the General Water Company.

An Act to enable the Harbor Grace Water Company to extend the Capital Stock of the said Company, and for other purposes.

An Act respecting Railways and Railway Companies in this Colony.

An Act to make provssion for the Construction of a Line of Railway from the Harbor Grace Junction of the Newfoundland Railway to Placentia, and for other purposes.

An Act to authorize the raising of a Sum of Money for the Public Service of this Colony.

An Act to indemnify HisExcellency the Governor of Newfoundland for certain sums of Money advanced by him from the Colonial Treasury for the Services of the Colony.

An Act for granting to Her Majesty a Sum of Money for defraying the expenses of the Civil Government of this Colony, for the year ending the Thirty-first day of December, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-seven, and for other purposes. An Act to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature.

After which His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech: —

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

In the absence of His Excellency, Sir WILLIAM DES VŒUX, it devolves upon me, on the completion of your legislative duties, to terminate a protracted Session, and thus relieve you from further attendance.

I gladly acknowledge the assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the business of this Session, and you may retire from it with a feeling of confidence that your labours will be productive, in many important particulars, of substantial advantage to the community.

It affords matter for much gratification that Her Majesty has been pleased to assent to the Act which you passed at the opening of the Session, for the restriction of the supply of Bait Fishes to foreign fishermen. The Colony is thus enabled to apply what has been considered the best practical remedy for an evil which had already become most disastrous and far reaching in its effects upon the material welfare of our people.

The proceedings of the Colonial Conference, which was held in London during last month, have naturally been viewed with deep interest to the people of these Dependencies of the British Crown; and its results will assuredly establish, on an improved basis, the integrity of the Empire. We must all highly appreciate the honour of precedence accorded to the representatives of Newfoundland, as the oldest Colony, on that interesting occasion.

We have to regret that the Seal fishery of this year has yielded

but an indifferent return for the capital and labour invested in this branch of our industries.

The alteration of the law relating to the exercise of the electoral franchise, will, doubtless, be attended with those salutary results which have marked its application in other countries possessing representative institutions.

The construction of a branch line of Railway to connect with Placentia the line now in operation, is a work of great public importance. I confidently trust that the facilities of this new and improved means of communication between the eastern and western portions of the Colony, will confer large benefits upon commerce, while appreciably promoting the convenience of the travelling public, and that lumbering and mining operations, will derive from this agency, a new and invigorating impetus.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I thank you for the readiness with which you have provided for the expenditure rendered necessary during the past autumn and winter, and which were undertaken on the responsibility of the Government.

I have, also, to acknowledge the liberality with which you have adopted those measures in relation to the Revenue, which are essential to the sustainment of the public credit, as well as the provision made for the service of the present year.

Those appropriations shall be applied with due regard to economy and efficiency.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I notice, with pleasure, the provision you have made for the permanent increase of the grants in support of Education, a just recognition of the necessities of our growing population in connection with this important public question.

The attention you have bestowed upon various matters affecting the prosecution and protection of the fishery industries of the Colony, cannot but be regarded with much general satisfaction.

I desire, in conclusion, to convey to you my sincere wishes for your welfare and prosperity.

After which the Hon. the President said,-

GENTLEMEN,-

It is the pleasure of His Excellency the Administrator, that this General Assembly be prorogued, until Thursday the Fourteenth day of July next.

And this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued, until Thursday the Fourteenth day of July, to be then and here holden.
