

A MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

At two o'clock a Message from His Excellency the Governor was delivered by W. F. Rennie, Esq., the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immmediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency the Governor in the Council Chamber.

And being returned to the Assembly Room.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that, when in attendance on His Excellency in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both branches of the Legislature, of which, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy, and which he read to the House, as follows,—

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

It affords me much gratification to meet the Legislature of Newfoundland, for the first time since my assumption of the Government of this ancient Colony.

In calling you together for the despatch of public business, I desire to express to you my deep sense of the responsibility of my position, and to assure you of my earnest intention to perform the duties of my office in strict accordance with constitutional principles.

Arriving near the end of summer, I have not yet had an opportunity of acquiring an extensive knowledge of the Colony from personal observation. I have, however, visited the greater portion of the peninsula of Avalon, and wish to express my acknowledgment of the hearty and loyal reception given to me, as the representative of Her Majesty, at those places visited by me.

Although I am not in a position to congratulate you upon a condition of general prosperity, I feel gratified in being able to state that the year, which has just closed, has witnessed a marked improvement in the results of the staple industries of the Colony, as compared with those of immediately preceding years. The seal fishery was conducted on a scale smaller than that of former years. A short catch, with low prices for its products, made the result unremunerative to those engaged in its prosecution.

The Codfishery on the coasts of the Island and of Labrador was below the average, but this deficiency was largely compensated by good prices.

The prosecution of the Bank Fishery was again attended with marked success, and there is no doubt that there will be a further increase during the coming season in the outfit for this now important branch of our fisheries.

The Salmon Fishery was fairly successful, but the herring fishery on the coast of Labrador was a failure.

The Lobster Fishery was prosecuted on an increased scale and with much success. This industry now furnishes a large item in the export trade of the Colony.

The large measure of success which attended Agricultural opperations has contributed in a great degree to the general improvement in the condition of the people.

It is satisfactory to note that the expenditure authorised by the Legislature, towards the close of last session, for the purchase of seed potatoes for distribution among the neccessitous, was productive of most beneficial results.

It is also gratigying to find that the inducements to the clearing and cultivation of the soil, afforded by the bounties provided under the Agricultural Act of the session of 1886, have led to a large amount of profitable labor in that direction, and the development of an active public interest in this most valuable pursuit.

Mining operations, which for some years past had been radually declining, have recently received a strong impetus from a large advance in the price of copper.

With a view to the extension of the area of useful and remunerative employment during the winter months, my Government, in November last, assumed the responsibility of offering an increase upon the drawback or bounty, provided by the recent Act for the encouragement of shipbuilding, to apply to vessels of a certain class to be built during the present season. I am informed that a stimulus was thereby imparted to this most important industry, and at the same time a considerable amount of wages was earned by many who otherwise would have been destitute. I rely with confidence upon your legislative confirmation of the action of the Government in this matter.

The assent given by Her Majesty to the Act of last Session in relation to the sale of bait fishes was accompanied by an opinion that it should not come into effect during the fishing season of the year 1887. I accordingly issued a proclamation fixing the second day of January for the commencement of its operation. The necessary measures for the efficient enforcement of the provisions of the Act will be adopted by the Government.

A new contract has been entered into for the performance of the Coastal Steam Service and also for a winter service between St. John's and Halifax, to take effect from May next.

The boats, now in course of construction, will be as regards size, speed and accommodation, much superior to those that have hitherto been employed in the Coastal service, and this impovement in efficiency has been effected with a large saving upon the present cost.

In this connection it would appear that the time is opportune for dealing with the question of the further improvement in the means of communication, by the employment of steamers in the bays, or at least in those in which connections with the railway can be made.

During the past year an addition was made to our system of telegraph communication, by its extension to the district of Fogo.

The work of construction of the Placentia Railway is progressing satisfactorily, as regards efficiency, cost and rapidity of execution.
It is hoped that in the early part of the summer a connection sufficient for the commencement of operation will be made with or near
to Placentia. It will be neccessary during the present session tomake some legislative provision for operating the line.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

The Revenue for the past year has been somewhat short of the estimates.

The expenditure in connection with the public service has been conducted with due regard to economy and efficiency, and the accounts, with the usual estimates for the present year, will be laid before you. I feel assured that you will make adequate provision for the requirements of the various departments of Government.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

Her Majesty's Government and the Government of the United States having agreed upon the appointment of a Joint Commission to deal with questions in dispute between the two nations in relation to the fisheries on the coasts of British North America and other matters, with a view to a settlement, upon some mutually satisfactory basis, of these and other cognate questions, the Commissioners met at Washington in the month of November, and have not yet coucluded their labors.

The Attorney General was appointed to proceed to Washington to confer with and assist the British Plenipotentiaries upon those points, especially relating to the circumstances and interests of this Colony. I expect very soon to be in a position to inform you of the result of the deliberations of the Conference.

The opening of the International Exhibition at Barcelona has been postponed till the 8th of April next. The neccessary preparations for the suitable representation of the Colony at this Exhibition are in progress.

In compliance with your joint address of last session, my predecessor appointed a Commission to inquire into the constitution and working of Fishery departments in other countries. I am informed that the Commission have devoted much care and industry to the duties entrusted to them. I have no doubt that their report will be a useful guide to the adoption of intelligent action in the direction of the preservation and development of our fisheries.

The litigation between the Colony and the Newfoundland Railway Company and their bond-holders, resulting from the failure to carry out the contract for the construction and operation of the line, has, so far, reached a decision of the Judical Committee of the Privy Council, to the effect that a proportionate part of the entire subsidy under the contract is payable in respect of so much of the line as has been completed and operated; but that the Colony is entitled to counter-claim, or set off its claim for damages for non-performance of the contract, which claim is to be the subject of further inquiry.

You will be again asked to deal with the question of the management of the local affairs of the town of St. John's, and a measure will be introduced for that purpose.

We have reason to be thankful for the immunity which the Colony has enjoyed from any epidemic disease or other public calamity.

The absense of serious crime and the general good conduct of our people continue to afford matter for congratulation.

In leaving you to the discharge of those duties which especially devolve upon you, I am sure that you will join with me in the prayer that your labors may be directed by Divine guidance to the promotion of the best interests of the Colony and its people.

cy the Governor, on opening the present session of the Legislature, presented the report, which he handed in at the Clerk's table, where it was read, as follows:—

To His Excellency Henry Arthur Blake, Esquire,
Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of
St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:-

We, the Commons House of Assembly of Newfoundland, in Legislative Session convened, in tendering to your Excellency our thanks for the gracious Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present session of the Legislature, are pleased to welcome your Excellency, as the constitutional representative of Her Majesty, in the Government of the Colony, and to assure you of our earnest desire to co-operate with you in the promotion of its best interests.

We may assure your Excellency that those manifestations of personal good will to yourself, and loyalty to the throne, which already have been accorded to your Excellency in those places which you have visited, are but an expression of the sentiments of the people of the whole colony.

We share with your Excellency in the feeling of gratification at the general improvement in the condition of the people, which has taken place during the past year.

We notice with regret the continued decline and unproductiveness of the seal fishery as shown by the results of the past season.

It is gratifying to find that good prices largely compensated for the short returns from the codfishery on the coast of the Island and Labrador, and the continued success and increasing outfit of the bank fishery, give assurance of the further development in the future of that important branch of our fisheries. We note with satisfaction the growing importance and value of the Lobster fishery, and the success attending the operations of that enterprise during the past season.

It is most gratifying to notice the development of an active and practical interest in agricultural pursuits, and also to find that recent legislation has had an encouraging effect in that direction. The large benefits which resulted from the purchase and distribution of seed potatoes, authorized by the legislature during last session, cannot have failed to impress upon the people the great necessity for further reliance upon the cultivation of the soil.

The stimulus given to mining industries by the recent advance in the price of copper opens a hopeful prospect of the extension of the field of labor in that important enterprise.

We are pleased to find that the action of the government in offering an increased bounty for the present season upon ship-building has accomplished the two-fold result of assisting a valuable industry and of creating the means of employment for many who would otherwise have been left destitute. We shall be glad to confirm the action of the government in this relation.

We are pleased with the assurance that the necessary steps will be taken for the efficient enforcement of the Act of last session, in relation to the sale and export of bait fishes, and we look with confidence for beneficial results from the operation of that measure.

We welcome the information contained in your Excellency's Speech, in relation to the much needed improvement in the Coastal Steam Service, effected under the new contract, and we shall give our most careful attention to the suggestion relating to the employment of steamers in the bays as a further extension of the benefits of this most valuable service. We consider that an important advantage has also been secured by the provision which has been made for the Halifax winter service.

The extension of the Telegraph system by the connection recently made with Fogo, increases the facilities of northern communication, and will be appreciated by all who are interested in that important portion of the island.

The satisfactory progress in the work of the Placentia railway, and the promise of an early opening of the line for traffic afford matter for much gratification. We shall give our best attention to the legislation necessary to provide for the working of the line.

We confidently hope that the short revenue of the last year will be followed by increased importations and a corresponding improvement in the revenue for the present year. We shall make due provision for the various requirements of the public service.

We await with great interest the result of the conference at Washington, between the plenipotentiaries of the Imperial Government and of the United States, in relation to disputed questions in connection with the fisheries and other matters. We approve of the action of the Government in sending a representative to Washington in the interests of the colony.

We are pleased to learn that arrangements are being made for the suitable representation of the colony at the approaching International Exhibition at Barcelona.

We regard, as of the utmost importance, the inquiries into the subject of the constitution and working of fisheries departments in other countries, which have been instituted by the formation of a committee, and we appreciate the labor which they have so far devoted to that subject. We concur with your Excellency in the belief that the report of the committee cannot fail to be suggestive of wise and beneficent action in the future in connection with the preservation and development of our fisheries.

We thank your Excellency for the information contained in your Excellency's speech in relation to the litigation between the colony and the Railway Company, arising out of the non-performance of their contract.

We trust that as the outcome of our deliberations concerning the management of the local affairs of the town of St. John's, some comprehensive and satisfactory measure will be enacted, dealing with this important subject.

We concur with your Excellency in an expression of thankfulness tor the immunity from epidemic disease or other public calamity which the colony has enjoyed during the past year; and we observe with great satisfaction the peace and good order which have marked the conduct of our people.

We unite with your Excellency in the hope that our efforts for the promotion of the welfare of the colony and its people may be assisted by Divine guidance.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:-

We, the Commons House of Assembly of Newfoundland, in Legislative Session convened, in tendering to your Excellency our thanks for the gracious Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present session of the Legislature, are pleased to welcome your Excellency, as the constitutional representative of Her Majesty, in the Government of the Colony, and to assure you of our earnest desire to co-operate with you in the promotion of its best interests.

We may assure your Excellency that those manifestations of personal good will to yourself, and loyalty to the throne, which already have been accorded to your Excellency in those places which you have visited, are but an expression of the sentiments of the people of the whole colony.

We share with your Excellency in the feeling of gratification at the general improvement in the condition of the people, which has taken place during the past year.

We notice with regret the continued decline and unproductiveness of the seal fishery as shown by the results of the past season.

It is gratifying to find that good prices largely compensated for the short returns from the codfishery on the coast of the Island and Labrador, and the continued success and increasing outfit of the bank fishery, give assurance of the further development in the future of that important branch of our fisheries.

We note with satisfaction the growing importance and value of the Lobster fishery, and the success attending the operations of that enterprise during the past season.

It is most gratifying to notice the development of an active and practical interest in agricultural pursuits, and also to find that recent legislation has had an encouraging effect in that direction. The large benefits which resulted from the purchase and distribution of seed potatoes, authorized by the legislature during last session, cannot have failed to impress upon the people the great necessity for further reliance upon the cultivation of the soil.

The stimulus given to mining industries by the recent advance in the price of copper opens a hopeful prospect of the extension of the field of labor in that important enterprise.

We are pleased to find that the action of the government in offering an increased bounty for the present season upon ship-building has accomplished the two-fold result of assisting a valuable industry and of creating the means of employment for many who would otherwise have been left destitute. We shall be glad to confirm the action of the government in this relation.

We are pleased with the assurance that the necessary steps will be taken for the efficient enforcement of the Act of last session, in relation to the sale and export of bait fishes, and we look with confidence for beneficial results from the operation of that measure.

We welcome the information contained in your Excellency's Speech, in relation to the much needed improvement in the Coastal Steam Service, effected under the new contract, and we shall give our most careful attention to the suggestion relating to the employment of steamers in the bays as a further extension of the benefits of this most valuable service. We consider that an important advantage has also been secured by the provision which has been made for the Halifax winter service.

The extension of the Telegraph system by the connection recently made with Fogo, increases the facilities of northern communication, and will be appreciated by all who are interested in that important portion of the island.

The satisfactory progress in the work of the Placentia railway, and the promise of an early opening of the line for traffic afford matter for much gratification. We shall give our best attention to the legislation necessary to provide for the working of the line.

We confidently hope that the short revenue of the last year will be followed by increased importations and a corresponding improvement in the revenue for the present year. We shall make due provision for the various requirements of the public service.

We await with great interest the result of the conference at Washington, between the plenipotentiaries of the Imperial Government and of the United States, in relation to disputed questions in

connection with the fisheries and other matters. We approve of the action of the Government in sending a representative to Washington in the interests of the colony.

We are pleased to learn that arrangements are being made for the suitable representation of the colony at the approaching International Exhibition at Barcelona.

We regard, as of the utmost importance, the inquiries into the subject of the constitution and working of fisheries departments in other countries, which have been instituted by the formation of a committee, and we appreciate the labor which they have so far devoted to that subject. We concur with your Excellency in the belief that the report of the committee cannot fail to be suggestive of wise and beneficent action in the future in connection with the preservation and development of our fisheries.

We thank your Excellency for the information contained in your Excellency's speech in relation to the litigation between the colony and the Railway Company, arising out of the non-performance of their contract.

We trust that as the outcome of our deliberations concerning the management of the local affairs of the town of St. John's, some comprehensive and satisfactory measure will be enacted, dealing with this important subject.

We concur with your Excellency in an expression of thankfulness for the immunity from epidemic disease or other public calamity which the colony has enjoyed during the past year; and we observe with great satisfaction the peace and good order which have marked the conduct of our people.

We unite with your Excellency in the hope that our efforts for the promotion of the welfare of the colony and its people may be assisted by Divine guidance. On motion that the Report be adopted, Mr. Bond moved, seconded by Mr. Morine, that the tenth paragraph of the Address be stricken out, and the following be substituted in lieu thereof:

We notice your Excellency's intimation that the Government propose adopting measures for enforcing the provisions of the Act passed last Session, respecting Bait Fishes. Whilst we entertain decided opinions as to the necessity of protecting and preserving bait fishes, we feel that the course which has been taken in this direction, is of such a speculative character as to cause grave doubts as to its being in any way effective towards accomplishing the object apparently in view. The Act will certainly operate to the serious pecuniary loss of a large number of fishermen heretofore engaged in the bait traffic, and owning considerable property which, by the provisions of the Bait Act, is rendered comparatively valueless. We, therefore, regret that no provision has been made for affording compensation to those who have been and will be sufferers to a large amount by the rigid enforcement of the Act. We are, also, constrained to conclude, from instructions already issued by the Government, and from the Act itself, that, whilst our people will be debarred from engaging in the trade, it may be carried on with impunity by the fishermen of the Dominion of Canada. Had a law been enacted by which the wholesale and wanton destruction of bait fishes would be prevented, at those seasons of the year which the natural habits of these fish point to as a close time, and under which the privileges of procuring bait fishes conferred upon foreign vessels would be confined to those purchasing the same in our harbours, a lucrative trade would be preserved to a large number of people on the one hand, and upon the other they would be permitted to engage in the prosecution of the more important codfishery more constantly than they have hitherto; and there would have been no excuse for threatened retaliatory measures by a Foreign and heretofore friendly Power. Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I am glad to be able to release you from the duties of a protracted session.

I congratulate you on your acceptance of the Treaty and modus vivendi, agreed upon by the Plenipotentiaries appointed by Her Ma-

jesty the Queen and the President of the United States, as an equitable and honourable arrangement of the fishery disputes pending between the two nations.

Your ready agreement to the concessions made on behalf of this Colony, is a proof of your loyal anxiety to co-operate with Her Majesty's Government in the interests of good neighborhood and friendly intercourse with the closely allied people of the United States.

I trust that the Treaty may lead to the development and improvement of commercial relations between the United States and British North America, in the benefits of which this Colony will participate.

The Act relating to the Municipal affairs of St. John's, is a measure fraught with important results for the people of this city. The complete control of the Sewerage, lighting, cleansing and other matters, by a specially elected Municipal Council, will, I hope, result in the improvement of the city, and an increase in the happiness and comfort of its inhabitants.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I thank you for the supplies that you have voted for the public service. They shall be applied to the various purposes for which they are intended and with due regard to economy.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly.

I observe with pleasure that the enquiry instituted with by the Government into the working of fishery departments in other countries, has led to the adoption of practical legislation by you, in the direction of the care and cultivation of the fisheries of the Colony. The policy that you have adopted promises valuable results in the future.

I am further gratified by the evidence, afforded by several measures passed by you, of your active interest in the encouragement

of the cultivation of the soil, the protection of sheep, and the general advancement of agricultural pursuits.

At the next meeting of the Legislature I hope to be in a position to congratulate you upon a successful fishing season, and an expanding revenue.

In the meantime, I ask you to accept the assurance of my best wishes for your happiness, and the welfare and prosperity of the Colony.
