JOURNAL OF THE PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

THIRD SESSION

OF THE

SIXTEENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY of NEWFOUNDLAND.

Thursday, February 25.

THE General Assembly having, by several Proclamations of His Excellency the Governor, been prorogued until this day, the members thereof met in the Assembly Room.

At two o'clock a message from His Excellency was delivered by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber.

Then Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency in the Council Chamber; and, being returned to the Assembly Room, Mr. Speaker informed the House that, when in attendance upon His Excellency in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had been pleased to make a speech to both branches of the Legislature, of which, to prevent mistakes, he had procured a copy, which he read to the House as follows:—

"Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

You will, I feel sure, with all Her Majesty's loyal subjects throughout her vast Empire, warmly sympathize with our Gracious Queen and the members of the Royal Family in their sad bereavement through the untimely death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, taken from their midst at a moment when they and the whole nation had joined in the hope that a long life of happiness and utility awaited him.

At the commencement of your legislative duties I congratulate you upon the favourable aspect of the colony's position.

The year that has passed since I last convened the Legislature for the despatch of business has been replete with blessings for which we owe to the Giver of All Good our reverent acknowledgment.

We have every reason to be thankful for the success which attended our fisheries, for the result of our harvest, and the decrease of poverty, as well as for the improved condition of the public health and the absence of commercial disaster.

In reviewing the events of the past twelve months, we have first to take cognizance of the exceptionally good seal-fishery. That of the previous season was considered to be above the average; but it will be seen that the export of the products of this fishery during 1891 exceeded that of the former year by more than one-half. This was followed by a shore cod-fishery above the average, and the most abundant catch of cod on Labrador that has been realized for very many years. Ready markets and good prices contributed largely to enhance the value of the returns. There is also a marked improvement to be noticed in connection with our mining industry. The export of copper ore and iron pyrites was largely in excess of that of the previous year, and valuable deposits of asbestos and gypsum have been worked with energy and success.

In connection with this, I may observe that the geological survey during the past season has established beyond question what has hitherto been a matter of conjecture, namely, the existence of considerable deposits of coal and iron ores in the vicinity of Grand Lake. I cannot, therefore, too strongly emphasize the importance of this discovery and the desirability of your taking such action as may be considered necessary to turn the same to the advantage of the colony.

It is gratifying to find that the amendment in the Crown Lands Act, regarding the granting of mineral land, which was passed last session, has led to an increased demand for mining locations.

Although last winter was not a favourable one for lumbering operations, the business done in the export of timber was in excess of that of the previous year. This industry has become an important

auxiliary to our commerce, and I am pleased to be able to state that there is evidence of its still greater development.

The amount of deposits in our Savings Bank shews a large increase over 1890, and it is a matter for congratulation that, since the passing of the Act to provide for the appropriation of the profits of that institution, it has been found possible to apply the sum of \$300,000 towards the liquidation of the public debt of the colony.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

The Customs revenue for the year 1891 was in excess of the estimate. The estimates for the coming year and the public accounts will be laid before you at an early date, and I feel assured that you will make due provision for the requirements of the public service.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

The difference existing between Her Majesty's Government and that of France, respecting the Treaty Shore of this Island, has not yet been adjusted, but it is hoped that the negotiations still in progress, as well as whatever legislation you may deem necessary after receiving the report of the delegates sent by you to England in reference to this matter, may result in the establishment of the position which seems to my Government so just and reasonable.

The negotiations opened with the Administration at Washington for a treaty of reciprocal trade between this Colony and the United States, to which I adverted in my speech on the opening of the Legislature last year, are still in abeyance awaiting ratification by Her Majesty's Government.

As a necessary sequence to the conduct of the Government of the Dominion of Canada in imposing duty upon the fishery products of this Colony entering Canadian ports, that clause in the Revenue Act, introduced in the year 1885, which provides for the imposition of an additional duty on goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this Colony and its dependencies has, by virtue of the said action of our neighbours, come into operation. It is to be hoped that a more favourable disposition on the part of the Canadian Government may remove the occasion for a continuance of these additional duties.

I am glad to be able to announce that the work on the railway towards Hall's Bay is progressing satisfactorily. About sixty-five

miles have been completed, and it is to be expected that by the end of the present year the important settlement of Gambo, in Bonavista Bay, will be brought into railway communication with the capital. My Government have invited tenders for three steamers to ply upon the great northern bays, so as to bring all the important settlements in those bays into close communication with the railway.

It is considered advisable that a survey for a line of railway to the West Coast, via Grand Lake, should be undertaken next summer, so that tenders may be invited for the construction of the line at an early day, and you will be invited to make an appropriation for that purpose.

A census of the population of the colony, for which you made provision last session, has been completed, and an abstract of the returns will be laid before you immediately.

The sum of \$20,000 voted by the Legislature last session for the improvement of education has been distributed as a bonus to teachers. This recognition of the valuable services of a most deserving class of public officials it is hoped will stimulate them to greater effort in their important calling.

The colony has been invited to take part in the World's Columbian Exposition to be held in the city of Chicago in 1893. If Newfoundland is to be represented, it is imperative that a suitable appropriation be made for that purpose, which subject may be advantageously considered in connection with the provision to be made for the local exhibition to be held here next autumn.

In conclusion, I would express the hope that, under the inspiration of the increased prosperity to which I have briefly referred, your deliberations may be harmonious, and that the dictates of prudence and patriotism may lead to the adoption of measures calculated to promote the still greater advancement of the colony."

On motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, it was ordered that the rules of this House be suspended to admit of the immediate consideration of an address of condolence with Her Majesty upon the death of the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale.

It was moved by the Hon. Colonial Secretary, seconded by Mr. Greene, that an address be presented to Her Majesty, as follows:—

"To Her Most Gracious Majesty VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, Gc.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,-

We, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Commons House of Assembly of the Colony of Newfoundland, in Legislative session convened, desire to unite in the universal expression of cordial sympathy with your Majesty in the great sorrow occasioned by the untimely decease of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale.

A few weeks ago all your Majesty's loyal subjects were looking forward with joy to the bright prospects that were unfolding before His Royal Highness; suddenly the dark shadow of death intervened, and the nation's joy is turned into mourning.

As part of the great Empire over which your Majesty exercises benign rule, we reverently lay our tribute of affectionate regard upon the hallowed grave of the youthful prince, and pray that the great Ruler of the Universe, and Supreme Consoler, may bestow full consolation in the sore bereavement which your Majesty and the Prince and Princess of Wales have been called on to endure:"

And it was ordered accordingly.

It was ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council requesting its concurrence in the terms of the said address of condolence.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that the Council concurs in the said address of condolence, with an amendment including the Legislative Council therein.

It was moved and seconded, and it was ordered, that an address be presented to His Excellency the Governor requesting that he be pleased to forward to Her Majesty the said joint address of condolence.

It was moved by Mr. Whiteley and seconded by Dr. Tait, that an address of thanks be presented to His Excellency the Governor in reply to the gracious speech with which he has been pleased to open the present session of the Legislature, and that a select committee be appointed to draft such address in reply.

Ordered accordingly, and that the following gentlemen be such committee: Mr. Whiteley, Dr. Tait. Messrs. Clift, Murray and Carty.

Mr. Rothwell gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the appointment of a select committee on the printing, reporting, and contingencies of this House.

Mr. Morison gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move an address to His Excellency the Governor requesting him to furnish this House with copy of all correspondence between him and Her Majesty's Government and between him and the Governor-General of Canada in relation (1) to the imposition of a tax upon Canadian vessels for licenses for taking or purchasing bait fishes in the year 1890; (2) to the withholding from Canadian vessels and fishermen of licenses to take or purchase bait-fishes during the year 1891; and (3) in relation to the imposition of extra duties upon importation of goods from Canada under section 13 of the Revenue Act of 1891;

Also that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary whether any correspondence has taken place between the Government and the Government of Canada on the subject of obtaining the opinion of H. M. Privy Council in relation to the withholding from Canadian vessels and fishermen of licenses to take or purchase bait-fishes; and, if any such correspondence has taken place, to ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay a copy of same on the table of this House;

Also that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay on the table copy of all correspondence which has taken place between the Government and the Provincial Government of Nova Scotia upon the subject of withholding from Canadian or Nova Scotian vessels or fishermen of licenses to take or purchase bait-fishes;

Also that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary if any despatch has been received through His Excellency the Governor from Her Majesty's Government in relation to the Acts passed in the last session of the Legislature; and, if so, to lay on the table of this House copy of such despatch or despatches.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary what payments have been made to Messrs. Reid & Middleton, railway contractors, under their contract up to the present time.

Mr. Carty gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay on the table of the House the report of Sir

Robert J. Pinsent and the evidence taken before him as to the losses sustained by the inhabitants of St. George's Bay during the years 1889, 1890 and 1891 by reason of the interference of French naval officers and seamen.

Mr. Greene gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary for a detailed statement of the amount of licenses and fines received by the Game Preservation Society for 1891;

Also that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Chairman of the Board of Works for a detailed statement of the expenditure in 1891 on main lines, district of Ferryland.

Mr. Morison gave notice that he will ask the Chairman of the Contingency Committee to lay on the table of the House a statement shewing the amount expended by each member of the Assembly for telegraph messages during the sessions of 1890 and 1891;

Also that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill to amend the Act 53 Vic., Cap. 5;

Also a Bill to provide for woman suffrage on the question of the restriction of the sale of intoxicating liquors.

Mr. Thompson gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill in reference to the prosecution of the seal fishery.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until Monday next, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Monday, February 29, 1892.

The Hon. Colonial Secretary informed the House that the Government had received last night telegraphic information of a melancholy disaster in Trinity Bay, whereby several lives are known to have been lost, and it was expected that further details would show the loss to be greater than at present reported. He stated that the Government had despatched the steamer *Labrador*, with a medical gentleman, to the assistance of the people who were cast away on the ice; that the dinner proposed for this evening at Government House had been de-

ferred; that His Excellency had expressed deep sympathy with the sufferers, and had proposed the starting of a subscription for the benefit of those bereaved. The Hon. Colonial Secretary then moved that the House do now adjourn until Thursday next, as an expression of sympathy. It was seconded by Mr. Morison, and was ordered accordingly.

Then the House adjourned until Thursday next, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Thursday, March 3, 1892.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received a message from His Excellency the Governor with the following telegrams, which he desired to communicate to the House:

(1) "Her Majesty commands me to inform you that she has heard with much regret intelligence of disaster to fishing fleet, and to express her sympathy with injured sailors and relations of those who have lost their lives. Be good enough to send full particulars for Queen's information.

KNUTSFORD.

(2) I desire to express my deep sympathy with families of unfortunate fishermen who have lost their lives. Accept from me ten pounds for families. Will be paid to the Union Bank of Newfoundland to relief fund.

KNUTSFORD."

Mr. Whiteley, from the select committee appointed to draft an address to His Excellency the Governor, in reply to the gracious speech with which His Excellency opened the present session, presented the report of the said committee and draft address annexed.

Ordered that said report be received.

Pursuant to order, the said address was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Whiteley gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the suspension of the rules of the House in reference to the address of thanks in reply to His Excellency's speech.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. Rothwell moved the appointment of a select committee on reporting, printing, and contingencies.

Ordered that the following gentlemen be such committee: Mr. Rothwell, Mr. Greene, Mr. Murray, Mr. Webber, Mr. Dawe, Mr. Duff, and Mr. Rolls.

Ordered that Mr. Morison's notice of motion for an address to His Excellency (which notice was given on the 25th ult.,) stand over.

In reply to Mr. Morison, the Hon. Colonial Secretary laid on the table copy of telegram, Nov. 23, 1891, Premier Fielding to Premier Whiteway, and of reply.

In reply to Mr. Greene, the Hon. Colonial Secretary laid on the table an account of licenses and fines under Game Preservation Act for the year 1891.

On motion of Mr. Thompson, and pursuant to order, a Bill in reference to the prosecution of the seal fishery was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same be read a second time to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Morris, and pursuant to order, a Bill to amend Title 15, Chapter 54, of the Consolidated Statutes, was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Shea gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Colonial Secretary if there has been any correspondence between the Imperial and Local Governments respecting a Commission proposed to be sent to Newfoundland to acquire certain financial information in view of a contemplated loan to the colony on guarantee of interest by the Imperial Government; and, if so, if he will place a copy of such correspondence on the table.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until to-morrow at four of the clock, p.m.

Friday, March 4, 1892.

Pursuant to order of the day, the address of thanks was read a second time.

On motion of Mr. Whiteley, pursuant to notice, it was ordered that the rules of the House be suspended in relation to the address of thanks.

Pursuant to order, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on address of thanks.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Studdy took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman from the said committee reported that they had considered the matter to them referred, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that such report be received and that the said committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Morison, and pursuant to order, the following Bills were read a first time:—

Bill to amend 53 Vic., cap. 5;

Bill to permit women to vote on liquor questions.

Ordered that said bills be read a second time to-morrow.

Ordered that the following be deferred:-

Second reading of Bill relating to the seal-fishery;

Second reading of Bill relating to patents;

Notice of Mr. Morison of question to chairman of committee on contingencies.

On motion of Mr. Morison, pursuant to notice, it was ordered that an address to His Excellency the Governor do pass in conformity to Mr. Morison's notice for address given on the 25th February last.

Mr. Morison gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Financial Secretary to lay on the table a statement in detail of the expenditure of the sum of \$20,000 voted by the Legislature last session for the improvement of education, and distributed among the teachers;

Also, that he will ask the Financial Secretary to lay on the table a statement in detail of the expense of executing the commission to enquire into the operation of the Bait Act presided over by Judge Bennett;

Also, that he will ask the Financial Secretary to lay on the table a statement in detail of the amount expended to date out of the vote passed at last session of the Legislature for an industrial exhibition;

Also, that he will ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay on the table a copy of all correspondence on the subject of the recent outbreak of diphtheria at Greenspond.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until Monday next, at four of the clock, p.m.

Monday, March 7, 1892.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on address of thanks.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Studdy took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman from the said committee reported that they had considered the said address, and had passed the same without amendment.

Ordered that said report be received.

On motion that the said report be adopted, it was moved in amendment by Mr. Morison, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the following words be added at the end of paragraph nine of the address (that is to say, following the words "necessary provision for the public service"):—

"In view of the fact that the Customs Revenue of the past year "was in excess of the estimate, we trust that the duties now imposed on the necessaries of life may be proportionately reduced during the present session;" and, the question being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment five, namely: Mr. Morison, Mr. Greene, Mr. Carty, Mr. Rolls and Mr. Munn; and against the amendment eighteen, namely: Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Financial Secretary, Mr. Thompson, Mr. Geran, Mr. Webber, Mr. Duff,

Mr. Whiteley, Mr. Dawe, Mr. Clift, Mr. Hallaren, Mr. F. Morris, Mr. Rothwell, Mr. Woodford, Mr. Fox, and Mr. Murray.

So it passed in the negative, and it was ordered accordingly.

It was moved by Mr. Morison, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the eleventh paragraph of the address (which ends with the words "Her Majesty's Government") be left out, and the following words inserted:

"We learn with surprise that Her Majesty's Government have been asked to ratify a treaty for reciprocal trade alleged to have been negotiated between this colony and the United States of America. In view of the fact that the negotiation of such a treaty has never been authorized or ratified by the Legislature, and that we have not been informed as to the terms of the alleged treaty or of the position of the negotiations, we cannot recognize the submission to Her Majesty's Government for ratification as in any manner binding on the colony. As the representative branch of the Legislature to which are specially entrusted the interests of the people, we earnestly protest against the usurpation of our constitutional functions, and we respectfully request that your Excellency will be pleased to bring this departure from constitutional practice and our opinions in relation thereto under the notice of Her Majesty's Government."

On the question being put that the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative eighteen, and for the negative five, the names being the same as in the last division, and it was ordered accordingly.

It was moved by Mr. Morison, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the twelfth paragraph of the address (which ends with the words "its present attitude towards this colony") be left out and the following words inserted:

"We learn with regret that the Government of the Dominion of "Canada have imposed duties upon the fishery products of this colony "imported into Canada, and that the clauses of our Revenue Act providing for additional duties upon certain Canadian products, on account of the said action on their part, have come into operation. "We await with much anxiety further information as to the causes which have brought about this most unsatisfactory condition of affairs."

On the question being put that the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative eighteen, and for the negative five; the names being the same as in the last division; and it was ordered accordingly.

The original motion that the said address be adopted was then put, and it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered accordingly.

The said address was then read a third time, and it was further ordered that the same do pass, and be presented to His Excellency the Governor by the whole House.

And the House having sat after twelve of the clock, midnight,

Tuesday, March 8, 1892.

It was ordered that the several matters on the order paper be deferred until after the presentation of the address of thanks.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until four of the clock this day, in the afternoon.

Tuesday, March 8, 1892.

On motion of the Hon. Colonial Secretary, it was ordered that the order of the day be proceeded with.

On motion of Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Rolls, it was ordered that the Bill relating to the seal-fishery be now read a second time.

The said Bill was then read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Morison, and pursuant to order, the Bill to amend the law relating to patents was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House to-morrow.

With the assent of the House, it was ordered that second reading of Bill to amend 53 Vic., Cap. 5, and of Women Suffrage Bill relating to liquor questions, be deferred.

The Hon. E. P. Morris gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill to incorporate the St. John's Electric Tramway Company.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Wednesday, March 9, 1892.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, and had adopted a resolution that the same be referred to a select committee.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted.

On the question being put by Mr. Speaker "that the House do now resolve itself into committee of the whole on Bill relating to carriers,"

It was moved in amendment by the Hon. the Premier, seconded by Mr. Morine, that the question be amended by leaving out all the words after "that" in order to add the words "this House will on this day six months resolve itself into the said committee."

The amendment being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment nine, namely, Hon. the Premier, Mr. Morine, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Mr. Clift, Mr. Greene, Mr. Rolls, Mr. Morison, and Mr. Shea; and against it eight, namely, Mr. Murray, Mr. Fearn, Mr. Peyton, Mr. Whiteley, Mr. Hallaren, Mr. F. Morris, Mr. Woodford, and Mr. Fox; so it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered accordingly.

Pursuant to notice, and on motion of Mr. Murray, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on certain resolutions relating to lotteries.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

Be it resolved,—That it is expedient to apply the moneys received from such export duty in the following manner: first, to the repayment to the shipper of frozen herring in Newfoundland vessels of the amount

of duty paid by them upon such herring when taken into the United States; and, second, to the encouragement of the herring trade in those sections of the Colony in which United States vessels usually procure their voyages."

Mr. Morine also gave notice that, when the House is next moved into committee of the whole on ways and means, he will move the following amendment to the motion "that the Speaker do now leave the chair":—

"Whereas,—At the time when the Bait Act, so-called, was assented to by Her Majesty, a pledge was given by the Government of this Colony that the provisions of that Act should never be enforced so as to prevent Canadian fishermen from obtaining a full supply of bait in this Colony; and

Whereas,—It was never the intention of the Legislature of this Colony to prohibit a supply of bait to the fishermen of any country giving free entry to fish exported from this Colony, and competing fairly with us in foreign markets; and

Whereas,—The business of supplying bait, ice, and other fishery outfits to the fishing vessels of Canada has in the past been a lucrative one; and

Whereas,—The privilege of entering fish and fish-products of this Colony into Canada free of duty has in the past years given a ready and valuable outlet for surplus produce, the retention of which in this Colony, even for a short time, would have materially decreased the price of every quintal of codfish sold here, to the great disadvantage of the fishermen; and

Whereas,—The privilege of importing the products of Canada upon an equality as to the amount of duty with similar products from other countries has led to a vast and constantly increasing trade between this Colony and Canada, and has been especially advantageous to those fishermen who have resorted to Canada for the purpose of selling their fish and buying supplies; and

Whereas,—The trade between Canada and the west and southern coasts of this Colony has in consequence of steam and other communication assumed great importance, and is especially advantageous to the districts of St. Barbe, St. George's Bay, Burgeo and LaPoile, Fortune Bay, Burin, and Placentia and St. Mary's; and

Whereas,-By prohibiting Canadian fishermen from obtaining

bait in this Colony last year, the Government of this Colony broke a pledge binding upon the honor of this Colony, adopted and enforced a policy of violence never sanctioned by the Legislature, and destroyed a trade in bait, ice, &c., of great importance to the people; and

Whereas,—The enforcement of that prohibition led in the autumn of last year to the imposition by Canada of a duty upon the fish and fish products of this Colony entering Canadian ports; and

Whereas,—The imposition of that duty by Canada led to imposition by this Colony of a duty almost prohibitory upon certain products of Canada when entering this Colony; and

Whereas,—By the imposition of these duties great harm has been done to the people of this Colony, the cost of many necessaries of life being increased, and the natural course of trade being impeded; and

Whereas,—A continuance of the policy of retaliation may lead to a withdrawal of the privilege of bonding fish passing through Canada to foreign ports, wholly destroying a valuable trade; and

Whereas,—Very many fishermen yearly resorting to the waters of Canadian Labrador may be prevented from fishing therein by hampering regulations adopted as a part of the policy now being pursued;

Therefore resolved,—That in the opinion of this House it is desirable that efforts should at once be made to bring about a return to the status of 1889, whereby Canadian fishermen may obtain bait and other supplies in this Colony under suitable regulations and safeguards free of license fees; our fish and fish products may be admitted into Canada free of duty; and Canadian products may be admitted into this Colony upon an equality with those of other countries."

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Whereas,—During the fishing season of 1891 American fishing vessels were permitted to obtain full supplies of bait, ice, &c., in this Colony without paying license, tonnage, or other fees or dues whatever; and

Whereas,—The power of imposing an export duty upon frozen herring exported in foreign vessels, confided to the Governor in Council by an Act passed during the last session of the General Assembly, has not been exercised up to this time—

Be it resolved,—(1) That it is expedient to impose a tonnage due or license fee upon all vessels owned in the United States which obtain bait, ice, &c., in the ports of this Colony, until the United States permits the fish and fish products of this Colony to be entered free of duty; and (2) That it is also expedient to impose a duty upon all frozen herring exported from the Colony in vessels belonging to citizens of the United States equivalent to the import duty charged in the United States upon frozen herring when imported there in Newfoundland vessels; and

Be it further resolved,—(1) That it is expedient to apply the moneys received from such tonnage dues or license fees in the following manner: first, one-half towards the enforcement of the Bait Act;

second, the other half towards the encouragement of the herring fishery in those sections of the Colony injuriously affected by the enforcement of the Bait Act; and (2) That it is expedient to apply the moneys received from such export duty in the following manner: first, to the repayment to the shippers of frozen herring in Newfoundland vessels of the amount of duty paid by them upon such herring when taken into the United States; and, second, to the encouragement of the herring trade in the sections of the Colony referred to above."

The amendment being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment seven, namely, Mr. Morine, Mr. Rolls, Mr. Greene, Mr. Carty, Mr. Morison, Mr. Fearn, and Mr. Shea; and against it twenty-one, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, White, Whiteley, Dawe, Clift, Hallaren, F. Morris, Woodford, Fox, and Murray; so it passed in the negative.

Mr. Speaker being about to put the original question "that I do now leave the chair," it was moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, and seconded by Mr. Morison (with the unanimous consent of the House), that the words of the question after the word "that" be left out in order to add the words following, namely:

"Whereas,—At the time when the Bait Act, so-called, was assented to by Her Majesty, a pledge was given by the Government of this Colony that the provisions of that Act should never be enforced so as to prevent Canadian fishermen from obtaining a full supply of bait in this Colony; and

Tuesday, April 26, 1892.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary laid upon the table:

Statement shewing the population of each settlement in the Island, with ages, sexes, denominations, &c.;

General recapitulation of the last statement;

Recapitulation of totals of population and denominations, shewing increase and decrease as compared with the returns for 1884;

Statement of numbers of population, ages, and sexes;

Statement shewing approximate population of St. John's, within the limits of the Municipal Act;

Copy of report of census enumerator, section 1, St. George's.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Premier to lay on the table copies of—

- (1) 'The opinion expressed by the law officers of the Colony' in re the prohibition of bait to Canadians, referred to in the minute of Council now before the House, dated 18th June, 1891;
- (2) 'Telegraphic correspondence,' referred to as 'enclosed' in Edward Wingfield's letter, dated April 25th, 1891, to Sir Wm. V. Whiteway.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Financial Secretary to furnish the names and salaries classed under the head of "miscellaneous" salaries to the amount of \$42,313.47; and, also, of the names and salaries classed under the head of "special" salaries to the amount of \$50,706, as per Financial Secretary's consolidated statement recently printed and laid on the table of this House.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill relating to carriers by water was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act respecting the liabilities of carriers by water," and that the same be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting concurrence in its provisions.

Committee of the whole on ways and means standing first on the order of the day, and the question being put by Mr. Speaker "that I do now leave the chair," it was moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that all the words of the question after the word "that" be left out in order to insert the words following:

"Whereas in the fall of 1891, as the consequence of an imposition of duties upon fish of this Colony entering Canada, additional duties as provided by section 13 of the Revenue Act of 1891 were levied, collected, and paid upon certain products imported from Canada into this Colony;

And whereas the object had in view at the time of providing for such additional duties under certain circumstances was not the collection of revenue but the practical exclusion from our markets of certain articles coming from any country falling under the provisions of said section 13;

And whereas certain persons in the Colony purchased abroad and imported into this Colony certain articles upon which such additional duties were levied, collected, and paid, many of such persons being unaware, at the time of purchasing such articles, that such additional duties would be levied;

And whereas doubts have arisen as to whether the levying and collecting of such additional duties were lawful;

Be it resolved,—That in the opinion of this House it is agreeable with the object of the Revenue Act of 1891, consonant with justice, and expedient, that the additional duties levied, collected, and paid under and by virtue of section 13 of the Revenue Act should be repaid to the persons by whom they were paid."

The question being put that the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative of the question now put sixteen, namely, Hon. Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, Duff, Hallaren, Frank Morris, Woodford, Rothwell, and Tait; and for the negative nine, namely, Messrs. Morine, Morison, Greene, Carty, Rolls, Munn, Murray, Dawe, and Blandford; so it passed in the affirmative.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the matter to them referred, had made some progress and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that the said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again on Thursday next, and that same then stand first on the order of the day.

Ordered that committee of the whole on supply be deferred until to-morrow, then to stand first on the order.

Ordered that the following be deferred:

Second reading of Sunday seal-killing Bill;

Second reading of Public Health Bill.

A message was received from the Legislative Council, acquaint ing this House that the Council had passed the amendments made by the House of Assembly in and upon the amendments sent down from the Legislative Council in and upon the Bill sent up, entitled "An Act to regulate the prosecution of the seal-fishery" with an amendment, to which they request the concurrence of the Assembly.

With the unanimous assent of the House, the said amendment was read and adopted, and it was ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council acquainting them that this House has adopted the said amendment without amendment.

Hon. Receiver General laid on the table table of exports and imports for the year 1891.

The Chairman of the Board of Works gave notice that, on tomorrow he will move the House into committee of the whole on roads and bridges.

His Honor the Speaker informed the House that he had received from His Excellency the Governor a letter enclosing copy of despatch number 26, dated the 26th of March, 1892, acknowledging receipt of address of condolence with Her Majesty on the occasion of the death of the Duke of Clarence and Avondale.

The Hon. the Premier laid on the table copies of-

- (a) Letter R. H. Meade to him, dated August 3, 1891;
- (b) Despatch Secretary of State for Colonies to His Excellency the Governor, dated August 4, 1891 (No. 75);
 - (c) Despatch same to same, dated October 22, 1891 (No. 93);
- Copy of "A Bill to provide for carrying into effect Her Majesty's engagements with France respecting the fisheries off the coast of Newfoundland and for the judicial determination of questions arising with reference thereto."

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. Attorney General what steps the Government intend taking to collect the outstanding claim against Messrs. J. E. Simpson & Company, lessees of the dry dock; whether the lessees have any property in this Colony to respond to such claim on which lien for the amount can be laid, and if not, whether the Government intend to prosecute the claim elsewhere, and where, and what the prospects are of collecting the claim.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on the next day on which the House considers ways and means, he will move in amendment to the question to be put by Mr. Speaker "that I do now leave the chair," that

all the words of the question after the word "that" be left out in order to insert the following: "Whereas the Government of Canada has proposed that a modus viveudi for this year be agreed upon whereby (1) the right to free entry of our fish and fish products into Canada may be continued; (2) Canadian products may be admitted into the Colony upon an equality with similar products from other countries, and (3) Canadians may be allowed to procure bait in the harbours and bays of this Colony; Resolved that, in the opinion of this House, the said proposition should be accepted without delay."

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Wednesday, April 27, 1892.

The Hon. Receiver General presented a petition from Stephen Roach and others, of Beckford, for a bridge.

Mr. Woodford presented a petition from Rev. P. O'Donnell and others, of Harbour Main, for a lime-kiln.

Mr. Hallaren presented the following petitions on the subject of roads:

From John Martin, D. Dunphy and others, of Torbay; also from James Shea and others, George Earles, William Shea, John Butler, and H. Baldwin, all of Pouch Cove.

Ordered that the said petitions lie on the table.

A message was received from the Legislative Council, acquainting this House "that they have passed the accompanying rules and regula-"tions respecting the lobster, herring, and cod-fisheries sent up from the House of Assembly with some amendments, in which they request the concurrence of the Assembly;

Also acquainting this House "that they have adopted the follow"ing resolution: 'Resolved' that the Legislative Council hereby confirm
the rules and regulations respecting the lobster industry and the cod
and herring fisheries, made under and by virtue of section 16 of the
Act passed in the 52nd year of the reign of Her present Majesty, entitled 'An Act to provide for the formation of a Fisheries Commission,
and for other purposes,' with the amendments thereof made in committee of this House."

Committee of the whole on Supply Bill standing first on the order of the day, on the question being put by Mr. Speaker "that I do now leave the chair," it was moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Rolls, that all the words of the question after the word "that" be left out in order to insert the words following:

- "In the opinior of this House no sum over and above the \$2,000 already granted should be expended by the Government in aid of the exhibition proposed to be held in St. John's this year, and
- (2) That it is inexpedient that any sum whatever shall be expended for the purpose of an exhibition by this colony at the World's Fair to be held at Chicago."

The question being put that the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared in the affirmative twenty-one, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, Peyton, White, Duff, Dawe, Clift, Hallaren, F. Morris, Woodford, Blandford, Tait, and Murray; and in the negative seven, namely, Messrs. Morine, Rolls, Greene, Carty, Morison, Munn, and Fearn.

The question "that I do now leave the chair" being then put, it passed in the affirmative.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

And the House having sat after twelve of the clock, midnight,

Thursday, April 28, 1892.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, and had passed the same without amendment.

Ordered that the report be received and adopted.

Ordered that the said Bill be engrossed and read a third time tomorrow.

Ordered that the House do now resolve itself into committee of the whole on the amendments made by the Council in and upon the rules and regulations sent up by this House respecting the lobster, herring, and cod-fisheries.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Dr. Tait took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said amendments and had passed the same with an amendment.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that a message be sent to the Legislative Council acquainting them that this House has passed the said amendments with an amendment, and requesting their concurrence therein.

Ordered that the following be deferred:

Second reading of Sunday seal-killing Bill;

Second reading of Public Health Bill;

Notice of motion for committee on roads and bridges.

Hon. the Premier gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the House into committee to consider certain resolutions respecting the payment of the interest on certain loans raised under Acts of the Legislature to provide for the sewerage of the town of St. John's.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until the hour of four of the clock in the afternoon of this day.

Thursday, April 28, 1892.

The following petitions were presented, and it was ordered that the same be laid on the table:

By Mr. Clift,—From Rev. R. H. Taylor and others, of Brigus and Port-de Grave, for roads.

By Mr. Duff,—From Catherine Taylor, of Carbonear, praying for a grant of an annuity;

From Edward Janes and others, of Carbonear (south side), for roads.

By Mr. Thompson,—From James Blackler, of Back Harbour, Twillingate, and others, for a bridge.

By Mr. Peyton,—From Rev. Richard Walsh and others, of Fortune Harbour, for a public wharf.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Supply Bill was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty a sum of money for defraying the expenses of the civil government of this colony for the year ending the 31st day of December, 1892, and for other purposes," and that the same be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their concurrence therein.

Pursuant to order of the day, it was moved by Dr. Tait, seconded by Hon. E. P. Morris, that the Bill entitled "An Act to amend the Public Health Act, 1889, and the Acts in amendment thereof" be now read a second time.

And the question being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the motion fifteen, namely, Dr. Tait, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Peyton, White, Duff, Dawe, Hallaren, F. Morris, and Woodford; and against it four, namely, Mr. Carty, Mr. Morine, Mr. Munn, and Mr. Fearn. So it passed in the affirmative, and was so ordered.

The said Bill was then read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Ordered that the following be deferred, and that committee on ways and means stand first on to-morrow's order:—

Committee of the whole on ways and means;

Second reading of Sunday Seal-killing Bill;

The three notices standing on the order of to-day.

Hon. the Premier gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill respecting the Consolidated Statutes.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Friday, April 29, 1892.

The following petitions were presented, and it was ordered that the same be laid on the table, namely:—

By Mr. Carty,—From Israel Galpin and others, of Codroy, on the subject of a modus vivendi with Canada.

By Mr. Dawe,—From John Russell and others, of Coley's Point, for a wharf.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on ways and means.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Burgess took the chair of the committee.

And the House having sat after twelve of the clock, midnight,

Saturday, April 30, 1892.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered and adopted certain resolutions respecting ways and means, and he handed in the same at the Clerk's table where they were read as follows:—

"Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee that the table of duties upon goods, wares, and merchandize imported into Newfoundland and its dependencies as prescribed in an Act of the General Assembly passed in the 54th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter 3, entitled 'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this Colony and its dependencies,' be adopted, except as mentioned in the following resolutions:—

Resolved,—That the duties set forth and opposite the articles here-inafter mentioned shall be raised, levied, collected, and paid in lieu of the duties upon the said articles imposed by the said Act, namely,—on

Machinery-belting, of rubber, leather, or other material, 10 per cent. ad valorem;

Indian corn, six cents per bushel of fifty-seven pounds;

Hay, \$1.80 per ton of 2,240 pounds;

Straw, \$1.00 per ton of 2,240 pounds;

Cut nails and cut spikes of iron or steel, 20 per cent. ad valorem;

Pressed nails and pressed spikes of iron or steel, 20 per cent. ad val.; Wire nails of iron or steel, 20 per cent. ad valorem.

Resolved,—That the table of exemptions be amended by the addition thereto of the words following:

'Steel strips to be used in the manufacture of cut nails in this Colony; Chloro di nitro benzole; Nitrate of ammonia; Ceresene; Herring barrel hoop-iron or hoop-steel, splayed, punched or nosed, and cut in lengths, not to exceed sixty-eight inches;

Fire-clay and fire-brick; Rolling mills; Separators; Cranes;

Derricks; Rock-drills; When imported direct by parties engaged in mining, and not for sale.'

Resolved.—That when the duty on fish imported from this Colony into Greece shall be reduced by 75 per cent., the duty upon currants imported into this Colony shall be reduced by 75 per cent.

Resolved.—That in case of any country now imposing, or which may hereafter impose, an import duty on herrings exported from this Colony and imported into such country in vessels belonging to this Colony when such herring may be imported into such country in vessels belonging to the same free of such duty, the Governor in Council may, by proclamation impose an export duty equal to the amount of duty so imposed by such country aforesaid on herring exported from this Colony in vessels belonging to such country where such import duty is imposed.

Resolved,—That when it shall be made to appear to the Governor in Council that the duty on cod-fish, the product of this Colony, imported into Spain does not exceed five shillings and sixpence sterling per quintal of 112 pounds, the Governor may by proclamation reduce the duty hereinbefore imposed on Spanish wines to the following rates:

On Malaga and Montilla, costing at the port of shipment 80 cents a gallon, and any other above that price, 12½ per cent. ad valorem, and the gallon 40 cents.

Malaga and Montilla, costing at port of shipment under 80 cents a gallon, the gallon 14 cents.

Sherry, 121/2 per cent. ad valorem, and the gallon 40 cents.

Spanish Red, and all other Spanish wines, the gallon 14 cents.

Resolved,—That the following be substituted in lieu of section 13 of the said Act:—

'In addition to the duties by this Act provided to be raised, levied, collected, and paid on goods, wares, and merchandize, imported into this Colony and its dependencies, there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid on the goods, wares, and merchandise, herein-

after in this section mentioned, imported into this Colony and its dependencies from countries the fishermen of which have the privilege of taking cod-fish on all parts of the coasts of Newfoundland and its dependencies, and in which countries duties are or hereafter shall be levied upon fish, or the produce of the fisheries, exported from this Colony and its dependencies to such countries, the following duties, viz.:

Flour, the barrel
Pork, the barrel
Butter, the one hundred pounds o 75
Tobacco, the one hundred pounds 5 00
Kerosene oil, the gallon o o5
Corn meal, the barrel 0 25
Hay, the ton 5 00
Oats, the bushel o 10
Potatoes, the bushel 0 25
Turnips, the bushel 0 25
Cabbages, the dozen heads o 40
Unenumerated vegetablesthirty per cent. ad val

Provided always, that the Governor in Council may, at any time, when it shall be made to appear to be for the interest of this colony, by proclamation, to be published in the Royal Gazette, suspend the operation of this clause for a limited period, the duration of such period to be stated in the said proclamation, in respect of all or any of the above-mentioned articles.'

And whereas it is desirable to remove all doubts as to the legality of the duties imposed and collected, and as to the legality of all bonds taken for securing the payment of duties during the years one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one and one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, under and by virtue of section 13 of Act 54 Vic., cap. 3, entitled 'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this colony and its dependencies':

Resolved,—That all duties so collected and paid are declared to have been legally collected and paid, and all bonds taken for securing the payment of such duties are declared to be valid legal and binding upon the obligors giving such bonds, and that Her Majesty and all officers of Her Majesty are indemnified from all actions, suits and proceedings whatsoever, which are now or may hereafter be brought

for or in respect of such duties; and in all actions or suits now pending or hereafter brought against Her Majesty or such officers for or in respect of such duties, this section may be pleaded in and shall be a bar to such action, suit, or proceeding.

And whereas it is desirable to remove all doubts respecting the collection of license fees in the year 1890, by virtue of Act 51 Vic., cap. 9, entitled 'An Act to amend an Act passed in the 50th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, entitled 'An Act to regulate the exportation and sale of herring, caplin, squid, and other bait fishes;''

Resolved,—That all license fees so collected and paid to the Government of this colony are hereby declared to have been legally collected and paid, and that Her Majesty and all officers of Her Majesty are hereby indemnified against all actions, suits, and proceedings whatsoever which are now or may hereafter be brought for or in respect of such license fees; and in all actions or suits now pending, or hereafter brought against Her Majesty or her officers for or in respect of such license fees, this section may be pleaded in and shall be a bar to such action, suit, or proceeding.

Resolved,—That there shall be allowed and paid annually to the several officers of Her Majesty's Customs mentioned and referred to in the 23rd section of the Act, chapter 3, passed in the 54th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this colony and its dependencies," the sums severally set opposite the names of the said officers, save and except as hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

The sub-collector at Bonne Bay (in lieu of the sum mentioned in the said Act) six hundred dollars, with two and one-half per cent. on all duties collected: Provided that the amount of said salary and said percentage shall not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

Resolved,—That in addition to the sums paid to the several officers of Her Majesty's Customs in this colony mentioned in the said Act 54 Victoria, chapter 3, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this colony and its dependencies," there shall be paid to the following officers of Customs, hereinafter mentioned, to defray all expenses of remuneration for the collection of the Colonial revenue and charges incidental

thereto, the sums set opposite the names of the said officers, that is to say:

An Inspector of Outport Customs, twelve hundred dollars.

A tide surveyor, eleven hundred dollars.

A preventive officer at Pilley's Island, two hundred dollars, with ten per cent. on all duties collected: Provided that the amount of said salary and said percentage shall not exceed four hundred dollars."

Ordered that the said report be received.

On question put "that the said report be adopted," it was moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that the following be substituted for the eighth resolution and its preamble as adopted, namely:—

"Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether the additional duties levied, collected, and paid under and by virtue of section 13 of the Revenue Act of 1891 have been so levied, collected, and paid in accordance with the spirit or letter of the said Revenue Act;

And whereas certain persons have paid such additional duties under protest, and actions at law are now pending to recover the amount of additional duties paid by them;

And whereas it is still competent for persons who have paid such additional duties to bring action in the Supreme Court of Newfoundland for the purpose of testing the legality of the levying and collecting thereof;

And whereas it is now proposed that an Act should be passed to indemnify the Governor in Council for such alleged illegal levying and collecting, and to deprive all persons of a right to recover the amount of such additional duties by actions at law;

Be it therefore resolved that it is the opinion of this House that such ex post facto legislation would not be in accordance with precedent or sound practice, and should not be enacted."

The amendment being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment seven, namely, Messrs. Morine, Morison, Greene, Carty, Rolls, Fearn, and Murray; and against it seventeen, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, Peyton, Clift,

True at

Hallaren, F. Morris, Woodford, Rothwell, and Dr. Tait. So it passed in the negative.

It was then moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that the following be substituted for the ninth resolution and its preamble, as adopted, namely:—

"Resolved that the section legalizing the collection of license fees in 1890 should not be enacted, as prejudicing the rights of Her Majesty's subjects not resident in this colony, and being therefore a violation of the Governor's instructions."

The said amendment being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment seven, against it seventeen, the names being the same as upon the last division; and the original question being put that the said report be adopted, it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered that the said resolutions be adopted.

With the assent of the House, the question being put that the Revenue Bill be now read a first time, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative seventeen, for the negative seven, the names being the same as upon the last two divisions; and it was ordered accordingly.

The said Revenue Bill was then read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

On motion of the Hon. the Premier, a Bill respecting the Consolidated Statutes was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

The remaining matters on the order paper were deferred, except the notice of motion by Mr. Morine, which, on his motion, was ordered to be discharged.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House "that they have passed the amendment made by the Assembly on the amendments made by the Council on the rules and regulations made and prescribed by the Fisheries Commission as amended and adopted by the House of Assembly, April 22nd, 1892, without amendment."

Ordered that the said rules and regulations as amended and adopted do pass, and be engrossed, together with a joint resolution, and be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting their assent to such joint resolution.

Mr. Murray gave notice that he will ask the Hon. Attorney General if it is the case that the local option liquor law is now lapsed, or non est, and if so, what cause has brought about this condition as regards that law.

Mr. Morison gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Premier to lay on the table a copy of the estimate referred to by the Hon. A. W. Harvey in a letter to Lord Knutsford, dated January 7, 1892, in which he says that "the estimated direct loss to Newfoundland by not having the Newfoundland-United States convention ratified when agreed to in December, 1890, was an amount equal to one-third of the revenue" (of the colony).

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce the following Bill:—

A Bill relating to the disposal of money or merchandize by lot or hazard.

Also, that he will move the appointment of a select committee to audit the accounts of the Municipal Council for the past year.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until Monday next, at four of the clock p.m.

Mr. Murray gave notice that he will ask the Hon. the Premier why the report of the French Shore delegation, referred to in the opening speech, has not yet been presented to the House; whether said report has been signed, and if so, by whom; whether any meeting of the delegation has recently been held, and when, and to furnish a copy of the minutes of said meeting; also to state when the functions of the delegation finally cease.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the following preamble and resolutions:—

Whereas certain political differences have arisen between this colony and Canada, by reason of which differences certain additional import duties on the commercial products of the respective countries when imported into the other have come into operation;

And whereas the obstruction to commerce between the two countries caused by these increased duties bears hardly upon the peaceful industries of the people of both countries;

Aud whereas this unhappy disturbance of commercial relations has been brought about by an attempt to coerce Newfoundland into a surrender of her political rights as an independent colony;

And whereas pressure has been brought upon the Governments of the respective countries by the commercial classes of each, for the purpose of securing a removal of the additional duties, and a restoration of former peaceful relations between Canada and Newfoundland;

And whereas the Governments of both countries have also and equally been assured that, if either holds out its belligerent attitude long enough, the Government of the other country, acting under pressure from its own people, will be sure to give in;

And whereas the indefinite prolongation of this period of political

expectancy and commercial suspense is inflicting untold suffering and irritation upon the people of the two countries, without appearing to soften the acerbities of their respective Governments;

Therefore resolved (1),—It is the opinion of this House that, in the interests of natural commerce and neighbourly good-will, the olivebranch of peace should be held out by and between the respective countries of Canada and Newfoundland;

- (2),—That without assuming to define or declare what are the rights of these countries, or either of them, in relation to third parties, and without any interference with these rights on the part of either country towards the other, the mode adopted of finally settling such differences should be such as will not interfere with the freedom of commerce of the respective countries;
- (3),—That immediately on the withdrawal and abandonment of her attempts to restrain the freedom of commerce between Newfoundland and the United States, on the part of Canada, the former favourable commercial relations between this colony and the Dominion, which existed prior to the first of November last, will take place, and in the opinion of this House the sooner it takes place the better we shall be pleased.

Mr. Murray also gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will call the attention of the Hon. Colonial Secretary to an editorial article on the relations existing between this colony and Canada which appears in the Halifax *Herald* of April 22nd last.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Public Health Bill.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that the said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again on to-morrow.

It was moved by the Hon. Surveyor General, seconded by Mr. Murray, that the Bill to prohibit seal-killing on Sunday be now read a second time.

The question being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the second reading sixteen, namely, Hon. the Premier,

Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Surveyor General, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Webber, Peyton, White, Duff, Whiteley, Tait, Blandford, Rolls, Morine, Morison, and Murray; and against it fourteen, namely, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Clift, Hallaren, F. Morris, Woodford, Rothwell, Fox, Greene, Carty, and Fearn. So it passed in the affirmative, and was so ordered.

The said Bill was then read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Ordered that the second reading of factory employees Bill be deferred.

The question being put, pursuant to order of the day, "that the Revenue Bill be now read a second time," it was moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Murray, that all the words of the question after the word "that" be left out in order to insert the words following, namely:—

"Whereas in this Bill there is a section intended to indemnify the Governor in Council for levying and collecting extra duties under section 13 of the Revenue Act of 1891, contrary to the spirit and letter of that Act; and

Whereas the Bill also contains a section intended to indemnify the Governor in Council for collecting fees for bait licenses in 1890, contrary to the spirit and letter of the Bait Act, as expounded by a judgment of the Supreme Court; and

Whereas the Bill also contains a section imposing differential duties upon certain products when coming into this Colony; and

Whereas the presence of these sections of indemnity in the Revenue Act for 1892 is objectionable also because they have no proper relation to the subject of a revenue for this year, and is a violation of section 16 of the draft of instructions to the Governor of Newfoundland; and

Whereas the proposed indemnity in reference to bait licenses is a violation of sub-section 7 of section 17 of the said draft of instructions, as prejudicing the rights and property of British subjects not resident in this Colony; and

Whereas the section imposing differential duties is a violation of

sub-section 4 of section 17 of the said draft of instructions, which is aimed to prevent such differential duties:

Be it resolved,—That this Bill should not be read a second time, but should be withdrawn, and be replaced by a Bill dealing solely with the subject of a revenue for the colony."

The amendment being put, that the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative twenty-one, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Burgess, Webber, Peyton, White, Duff, Whiteley, Clift, Hallaren, F. Morris, Woodford, Rothwell, and Dr. Tait; and for the negative seven, namely, Messrs. Morine, Murray, Morison, Greene, Carty, Rolls, and Fearn.

The question that the Bill be now read a second time being put, it passed in the affirmative and was ordered accordingly.

The said Bill was then read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole on to-morrow.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill entitled "An Act for the publication of the Consolidated Statutes (second series)" was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole to-morrow.

Ordered that committee of the whole on roads and bridges, and committee of the whole on certain resolutions respecting the payment of interest on loans under sewerage Acts, be deferred.

Pursuant to notice, and on motion of Mr. Murray, a Bill relating to the disposal of money or merchandize by lot or hazard was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Murray, pursuant to notice, it was ordered that the following be a select committee to audit the accounts of the Municipal Council for the past year, namely: Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Murray, Greene, Carty, Rothwell, Hallaren, and Fox.

Hon. Colonial Secretary gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill to amend Title 28, cap. 105 of the Consolidated Statutes.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Tuesday, May 3, 1892.

The following petitions were presented by Mr. Murray for a modus vivendi with Canada in commercial matters, namely:—

From J. W. Keating and others, of Channel;

From James Frampton and others, of Ile aux Morts;

From William Poole and others, of Cape Ray;

From John Robinson and others, of Fox Roost;

Ordered that said petitions be laid on the table.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Public Health Bill.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill and had passed the same with amendments.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted.

Ordered that the said Bill be engrossed as amended and read a third time to-morrow.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Bill to prevent the killing of seals on Sunday.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

And the House having sat after twelve of the clock, midnight,

Wednesday, May 4, 1892.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman from the committee reported that they had considered the said Bill and had passed the same with an amendment, and he handed in the same at the Clerk's table, where it was read as follows:

"A Bill. An Act to prevent the killing of seals on Sunday. Be it enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council, and House of Assembly in legislative session convened, as follows:

1. Notwithstanding any contract to the contrary, no deduction shall be made from the share or wages of any member of the crew of any steamer or sailing vessel for or in respect of any refusal by him

to kill, haul, or take on board any seals between the hours of twelve o'clock on Saturday night and twelve o'clock on Sunday night."

Ordered that the said report be received.

On the question being put that the said report be adopted, it was moved in amendment by the Hon. Surveyor General, seconded by Mr. Murray, that all the words of the said Bill as reported after the words "as follows" be left out in order to insert the words following:—

"I. No seals shall be killed by the crew of any steamer or sailing vessel, or by any member thereof, on any Sunday (that is to say, from twelve o'clock on Saturday night until twelve o'clock on Sunday night) in any year, nor shall seals so killed be brought into any port in this colony or its dependencies in any year, under a penalty of \$6,000 to be recovered in a summary manner by any person who shall sue for the same before a stipendiary magistrate from the owner or other person on whose account such steamer or sailing vessel shall have been sent to the seal-fishery, or from the master of the said steamer or sailing vessel."

And the question being put that the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative fifteen, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Geran, Hallaren, F. Morris, Woodford, Rothwell, Fox, Greene, Carty, and Fearn; and for the negative fifteen, namely, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Surveyor General, Mr. Murray, Mr. Thompson, Mr. Burgess, Mr. Webber, Mr. Peyton, Mr. White, Mr. Whiteley, Mr. Dawe, Dr. Tait, Capt. Blandford, Mr. Rolls, Mr. Morine, Mr. Morison.

And there being an equality of votes, Mr. Speaker gave a casting vote in favour of the affirmative, and stated that he did so because such casting vote confirmed the report of the committee of the whole.

The question being put that the report of the said committee be adopted, it passed in the affirmative, and was ordered accordingly.

Ordered that the said Bill as amended be engrossed and read a third time to-morrow.

Ordered that committee of the whole on the Revenue Bill be deferred until Thursday next, then to stand first on the order of the day.

Ordered that the remaining matters on the order paper be deferred until after four o'clock to-day.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-day, he will move the following as an instruction to the committee of the whole on the Revenue Bill:

"Resolved,—That section 9 of the Revenue Bill, intended to indemnify the Governor in Council for collecting bait-license fees in 1890, ought never to have been placed therein, being contrary to section 16 and sub-section 7 of section 17 of the draft of instructions to the Governor of Newfoundland, and it is hereby made an instruction to the committee of the whole to strike out the said section 9."

Hon. the Premier gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill to provide for carrying into effect Her Majesty's engagements with France.

Mr. Morison gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill to amend the law relating to the limitation of personal actions at law, and for other purposes.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until the hour of four of the clock in the afternoon of this day, Wednesday, the fourth day of May.

Wednesday, May 4, 1892.

The House met at four o'clock, pursuant to adjournment.

The Clerk at the table informed the House of the unavoidable absence of Mr. Speaker.

The chairman of the committee on ways and means (Mr. Whiteley) took the chair as Deputy-Speaker.

The following petitions were presented, and it was ordered that they be laid on the table, namely:—

By Hon. Surveyor General,—From John Walsh, junior, of Western Bay, on the subject of roads.

By Mr. Murphy,—From James Cantwell and others, of Torbay, on the same subject.

By Mr. Hallaren,—From James Veater, on the same subject; Also, from James Walsh and others, of Shoe Cove, for a bridge.

By Mr. Rolls,—From Rev. A. Holmes and others, of Musgrave Harbor, for a ferry.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move that the terms of the *modus vivendi* recently proposed to the Government of this Colony by or on behalf of the Canadian Government be laid on the table of this House:

Also that, on to-morrow, he will move the adoption of the following resolution:

"Whereas a joint delegation was appointed by this House during last session to discharge certain functions in connection with the differences now existing in relation to the so-called 'French Shore';

And whereas no final report has yet been presented from that delegation to this House of the result of their labours;

And whereas it is a matter of supreme importance to the people of this Colony to know exactly the position we occupy as far as the discharge of the functions of the said delegation is concerned;

Therefore resolved,—That it be an instruction from this House to those members of the delegation appointed by it that they should submit an immediate and final report of their proceedings":

Also that, on to-morrow, he will move that a select committee be appointed by and on behalf of this House to search the records of the Hon. the Legislative Council to ascertain what action has been taken by that body in relation to a Bill sent up from this House entitled "An Act to amend Title 23, chapter 86, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled "Of Lotteries";

Also that, on to-morrow, he will move that a message be sent from this House to the Hon. the Legislative Council requesting permission to search the records of the Council in relation to the action of that body with reference to a Bill sent up from this House, entitled "An Act to amend Title 23, chapter 86, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled 'Of Lotteries.'"

Pursuant to order of the day, the Public Health Bill was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act to amend the Public Health Act, 1889, and the Acts in amendment thereof," and that the Clerk carry the same to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Third reading of the Bill to prevent the killing of seals on Sunday standing next on the order of the day, and the question being accordingly put, it was moved in amendment by Mr. Murray, seconded by the Hon. the Surveyor General, that the said Bill be now recommitted to a committee of the whole House.

The amendment being put, it passed in the negative.

The question that the said Bill be now read a third time being put, it was moved in amendment by the Hon. the Premier, seconded by Hon. E. P. Morris, that instead of the present title of the Bill, it be entitled "An Act respecting the shares or wages of crews of sealing vessels," and that the same, with the amended title, do pass.

It was moved in amendment by Hon. Surveyor General, seconded by Mr. Thompson, that the said Bill do pass this day six months.

The question of the amendment moved by Hon. Surveyor General being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the said amendment nine, and against it eleven; the votes for the amendment being Hon. Surveyor General, Messrs. Thompson, Peyton, Webber, Burgess, White, Dawe, Tait, and Murray; those against the amendment being Hon. Premier, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, Messrs. Duff, Geran, Hallaren, Greene, Morine, Morison, and Carty; so it passed in the negative.

The question being put that the title of the said Bill be amended as aforesaid, it passed in the affirmative and was ordered accordingly, and that the said Bill be now read a third time and do pass, and be entitled "An Act respecting the shares or wages of crews of sealing vessels."

The said Bill was read a third time accordingly, and it was ordered that the Clerk carry the same to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Bill respecting the Consolidated Statutes.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit agair.

Ordered that the said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Ordered that Factory Employees Bill be struck off the order paper, and that second reading of Bill relating to disposal of money by lot or hazard be deferred until Monday next.

On motion of the Chairman of the Board of Works, pursuant to notice, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on the subject of roads and bridges.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman from the said committee reported that they had considered and adopted certain resolutions, which he handed in at the Clerk's table, where they were read as follows:

"Resolved,—That there be granted to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, the sum of \$125,004.45 for making and repairing roads, streets, and bridges in this colony."

(The votes being subject to amendment when the House is in committee on the Bill, they will appear in the appendix of this Journal.)

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted.

In conformity to the said resolutions, a Bill for granting to Her Majesty a sum of money for making and repairing roads, streets, and bridges in this colony was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

On motion of the hon. the Premier, pursuant to notice, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole to consider certain resolutions respecting the payment of the interest on certain loans raised under Acts of the Legislature to provide for the sewerage of the town of St. John's.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the matter to them referred, and had adopted certain resolutions in relation thereto.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted.

In conformity to the said resolutions, and on motion of Hon. the Premier, a Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the payment of interest on loans of certain sums of money raised for the purpose of providing for the sewerage of the town of St. John's," was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

Pursuant to order, and on motion of Mr. Duff, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole to consider the petition of Catherine Taylor, of Carbonear, praying for an annuity.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker resumed the chair.

On motion of Mr. Duff, and with the assent of the House, it was ordered that an address do pass in the usual form to His Excellency the Governor in the matter of the said petition of Catherine Taylor, and that such address be presented by such members of this House as are of the Executive Council.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. Murray moved, seconded by Mr. Carty, the adoption of the following resolutions:

"Whereas certain political differences have arisen between this colony and Canada, by reason of which differences certain additional import duties on the commercial products of the respective countries when imported into the other have come into operation;

And whereas the obstruction to commerce between the two countries caused by these increased duties bears hardly upon the peaceful industries of the people of both countries;

And whereas this unhappy disturbance of commercial relations has been brought about by an attempt to coerce Newfoundland into a surrender of her political rights as an independent colony;

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Fox, seconded by Hon. E. P. Morris, that the House do now resolve itself into committee of the whole upon the resolutions now before the chair.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that all the words of the amendment after the word "that" be struck out in order to insert the words following:

"Whereas the Government of Canada has proposed that a modus vivendi for this year be agreed up, whereby (1) the right of free entry of our fish and fish-products into Canada may be continued; (2) Canadian products may be admitted into this colony upon an equality with similar products from other countries; and (3) Canadians may be allowed to procure bait in the harbors and bays of this colony; and

Whereas in addition to other bad results of a continuation of the present relations between Canada and this colony, our fishermen may be excluded from valuable privileges on Canadian Labrador;

Be it resolved,—That in the opinion of this House the said proposition should be accepted without delay." And

The question being put that the words of the original motion proposed by the first amendment to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative five, namely, Messrs. Murray, Carty, Thompson, Burgess, and Peyton; and for the negative seventeen, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, Messrs. Geran, Webber, Dawe. Hallaren, F. Morris, Rothwell, Fox, Tait, Rolls, Morine, and Morison. So it passed in the negative.

The question being put that the words of the first amendment proposed by the second amendment to be left out stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative nineteen, namely, Hon. Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, Peyton, White, Dawe, Hallaren, F. Morris, Rothwell, Tait, and Fox; and for the negative three, namely, Messrs. Morine, Morison, and Carty. So it passed in the affirmative.

The question as amended being then put, it was carried in the affirmative on the same division.

The question being put by the Deputy-Speaker "that I do now leave the chair," it passed in the affirmative on a like division, save that Mr. Rolls also voted for the negative, the numbers being affirmative 19, negative 4.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Deputy-Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the matter to them referred, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that said report be received, and that said committee have leave to sit again on Tuesday next.

Pursuant to notice, it was moved by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that the following resolution be adopted, and be an instruction to the committee of the whole on the Revenue Bill:

"Resolved that section 9 of the Revenue Bill, intended to indemnify the Governor in Council for collecting bait license fees in 1890,

ought never to have been placed therein, being contrary to section 16 and sub-section 7 of section 17 of the draft of instructions to the Governor of Newfoundland; and it is hereby made an instruction to the committee of the whole to strike out the said section 9."

The question being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative four, namely, Messrs. Morine, Morison, Carty, and Rolls; and for the negative twelve, namely, Hon. Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, Messrs. Thompson, Webber, White, Hallaren, F. Morris, Fox, and Murray. So it passed in the negative, and was so ordered.

It was moved by Hon. the Premier, pursuant to notice, and it was seconded by Hon. E. P. Morris, that a Bill to provide for carrying into effect Her Majesty's engagements with France respecting the fisheries off the coast of Newfoundland, and the judicial determination of questions arising with reference thereto, be now read a first time.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Murray, seconded by Mr. Carty, that the said Bill be not read a first time until a report by the delegates appointed by this House during last session in the French treaties question be laid upon the table of this House.

The amendment being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment five, namely, Messrs. Murray, Carty, Rolls, Morine, and Morison; and against it twenty-one, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, Peyton, White, Duff, Hallaren, F. Morris, Rothwell, Fox, Tait, and Blandford. So it passed in the negative.

The question being then put that the said Bill be now read a first time, it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered accordingly.

The said Bill was then read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading on to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Morison, pursuant to notice, a Bill to amend the law relating to the limitation of personal actions at law, and for other purposes, was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading on to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Colonial Secretary, pursuant to notice, a

Bill to amend chapter 105 of the Consolidated Statutes was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Morison gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay on the table a copy of all correspondence between the Government and the Commissioners for proposed industrial exhibition.

Mr. Morine presented a report signed by three of the delegates appointed in the last session on French treaties question.

Ordered that said report be laid on the table.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill to amend the License Act of 1875 was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act to amend the License Act, 1875," and that the Clerk carry the same to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill relating to corporations raising loans the interest whereof is guaranteed by the Government was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act respecting corporations the interest upon whose stock is guaranteed by the Government," and that the Clerk carry the same to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill relating to the Labrador fishery was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act relating to the Labrador fishery," and that the Clerk carry the same to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole upon the Bill relating to the municipal affairs of St. John's.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had made some progress with the said Bill, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that the said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Ordered that committee of the whole on the Council's amendments on the Bill relating to agriculture be deferred.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on the Council's amendments on Bill relating to carriers by water.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said amendments, and had passed the same without amendment.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that the said amendments do pass without amendment, and that a message be sent to the Legislative Council acquainting them accordingly.

It was moved by the Hon. the Premier, seconded by Mr. Webber, that the Bill to provide for carrying into effect Her Majesty's engagements with France be now read a second time.

It was moved in amendment by the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the following resolutions be adopted:—

"Whereas the Legislature of this colony did, on the 24th day of March, 1891, appoint five of its members as a delegation to proceed to England to lay before the British Parliament and people the reasons of this colony for opposing the legislation brought forward by the Imperial Government in reference to the French treaties question;

And whereas it was resolved by this Legislature that when a majority of the said delegates should agree to any basis of arrangement and settlement, the said delegation should recommend it to the Legislature, and that each member of the delegation should be bound by the decision of a majority;

And whereas a difference of opinion has arisen between the said delegates, and the Legislature has had a majority and minority report presented for its consideration;

And whereas the Bill now before the House is not acceptable to this House;

And whereas the Legislature did, on the 30th day of May last, pass a temporary Bill to enable Her Majesty's Government to carry into effect engagements with France respecting fisheries in Newfoundland during the period of negotiations for the settlement of difficulties concerning the treaty shore;

And whereas it is provided that the said Act shall continue in force only until the end of 1893, and no longer;

And whereas the said negotiations may occupy a longer period than at first anticipated:

Be it resolved that this House undertakes to extend the operation of the Act entitled 'An Act for the purpose of carrying into effect engagements with France respecting fisheries in Newfoundland' for

a further period of two years from the expiration thereof, so as to afford time for further negotiations;

Be it also resolved that the further consideration of the French treaties question be referred to a joint select committee of both Houses, with a view to aiding Her Majesty's Government in procuring a satisfactory solution of all existing difficulties."

Ordered that the consideration of the matter now before the House be deferred until to-morrow, and that second reading of the French Treaties Bill stand first on the order of the day.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Friday, May 13, 1892.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resumed consideration of the second reading of the Bill to provide for carrying into effect Her Majesty's engagements with France.

It was moved by Mr. Murray, seconded by Mr. Murphy, in amendment to the resolutions yesterday moved by the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, that the following resolution be adopted:—

"Whereas a delegation was appointed by this Legislature at its last session to visit great Britain and represent the views and interests of this Colony in relation to the settlement of the so-called 'French Shore' question;

And whereas an agreement was entered into with the delegation by the Legislature at the time it was constituted, under the terms of which agreement the Legislature bound itself to confirm and give effect to the recommendation of a majority of the delegation;

And whereas in terms of that agreement and in accordance with the recommendation of the delegation, a temporary Bill to provide for carrying into effect Her Majesty's engagements with France was accepted and passed by this Legislature, and is now in force;

And whereas the operation of that Bill will not expire until the end of the year 1893;

And whereas another and permanent Bill of the same nature and effect has since been presented to this House and urged upon its acceptance, the second reading of which Bill is now proposed;

And whereas a majority of the delegation has reported against the acceptance of this permanent Bill:

Therefore resolved that, as our acceptance of this Bill would be a violation of our agreement with our delegates in relation to this matter, and as no necessity exists for the enactment of another measure by this House at present to give efficacy to the acts of Her Majesty for carrying out her treaty engagements with France, this House would be recreant to its duty in the interests of Newfoundland to pass the permanent Bill now before us; and that said Bill be read a second time this day six months."

The Hon. Colonial Secretary moved, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the first of the resolutions moved by him yesterday be amended so as to read as follows:—

"Be it resolved that this House undertakes to extend the operation of the Act entitled 'An Act for the purpose of carrying into effect engagements with France respecting fisheries in Newfoundland' for a further period of two years from the expiration thereof, so as to afford time for fuller negotiations":

And he also moved, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the fourth paragraph of the preamble to said resolutions moved by him yesterday be struck out and the following inserted in lieu thereof:—

"And whereas the Bill now before the House does not provide for the payment by Great Britain of compensation due to persons who may suffer by the enforcement of the treaties, the *modus vivendi*, and the arbitration award, provision for which compensation was insisted upon by the Marquis of Salisbury, when speaking in the House of Lords on the 29th day of May, 1891, to be a condition precedent to the enactment of any permanent Act by this Legislature;

And whereas the Bill now before the House is not acceptable to the House in other respects."

Ordered that the said resolution and preamble stand amended accordingly.

And the House having sat after twelve of the clock, midnight,

Saturday, May 14, 1892.

The question being put by Mr. Speaker that the words proposed to be struck out of the main question stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative eight, namely: Hon. the Premier, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Webber, Duff, Dawe, Rothwell, and Fox; and for the negative twenty-three, namely: Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Peyton, White, Whiteley, Clift, Hallaren, Tait, Woodford, Blandford, Greene, Carty, Rolls, Morine, Morison, Murray, and Shea.

So it passed in the negative.

The question being then put by Mr. Speaker that the words proposed by the amendment to the amendment to be struck out of the amendment stand part of the question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative twenty-one, namely: Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Peyton, White, Whiteley, Clift, Hallaren, Woodford, Tait, Blandford, Greene, Carty, Rolls, Morine, Morison, and Shea; and for the negative ten, namely: Hon. the Premier, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Murphy, Webber, Duff, Dawe, Rothwell, Fox, and Murray.

So it passed in the affirmative.

The question being then put by Mr. Speaker that the words of the amendment be added to the remaining words of the original question, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative twenty-two, namely: Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Peyton, White, Whiteley, Clift, Hallaren, Woodford, Tait, Blandford, Greene, Carty, Rolls, Morine, Morison, and Shea; and for the negative nine, namely: Hon. the Premier, The Chairman of the Board of Works, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Webber, Duff, Dawe, Rothwell, Fox, and Murray.

So it passed in the affirmative.

The original question as amended being then put by Mr. Speaker, it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered accordingly.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Bill relating to the municipal affairs of Saint John's.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Ordered that the remainder of the order be deferred until tomorrow.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until Monday next at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Monday, May 16, 1892.

It was moved by the Hon. Colonial Secretary, seconded by Mr. Morine, that an address be presented to His Excellency the Governor requesting that he will be pleased to forward by telegraph to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, for the information of Her Majesty's Government, a copy of the resolutions adopted on Saturday last in reference to the Bill then before the House relating to the French treaties question, and that a copy of such resolutions be therewith forwarded to His Excellency; and it was ordered accordingly.

The following were appointed a select committee of this House in conformity to the said resolutions, and it was ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council acquainting the Council of the appointment of such select committee, and requesting that they will appoint a select committee of that body to co-operate with the select committee appointed by this House, namely; Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Mr. Morine, Dr. Tait, Mr. Duff, Mr. Carty, and Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Premier to lay on the table a copy of all correspondence between Canada and this Colony and between the Secretary of State for the Colonies and the Governor relative to the relations of this Colony and Canada upon fishery and other questions, not yet submitted to the House.

Hon. Colonial Secretary laid on the table,—

Recapitulation table II., Newfoundland census, 1891 (fisheries, property, and produce); also table III. (mines and factories).

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move that it be an instruction to the select committee appointed on the 16th instant by this House in reference to "French Shore" matters that they shall not be empowered on behalf of this Legislature to assent to the terms of any further Act on the subject of matters relating to the "French Shore" or the "French treaties question" without first submitting the terms of said Act to this Legislature.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the following resolution:—

"Whereas preparations are now being made by many of our fishermen to prosecute the fisheries upon the coast of Canadian Labrador; and

Whereas it has been intimated that the valuable privileges heretofore enjoyed on the coast aforesaid by our fishermen may be withdrawn or seriously curtailed by the Government of Canada; and

Whereas the danger that such privileges may be withdrawn or curtailed arises from the fact that Canadian fishermen are still refused the privilege of purchasing bait in this Colony; and

Whereas the Government of Canada has proposed that a modus vivendi be entered into for this year, whereby the status of affairs in 1889 may be returned to:

Be it resolved,—That, in the opinion of this House, such a modus vivendi should be arranged, and that, in view of the imminence of the commencement of the fishing season, it is expedient that the arrangement should be made forthwith."

The following messages were received from the Legislative Council:—

- a. That they had passed, without amendment, the Bill sent up entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, "wares, and merchandize imported into this colony and its dependencies"; also, the Bill sent up entitled "An Act for the publication of the Consolidated Statutes (second series)," and
- b. That they had passed the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to "amend the law relating to the limitation of personal actions at law, "and for other purposes" with an amendment, wherein they request the concurrence of the Assembly.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Bill relating to the municipal affairs of Saint John's.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had made some progress in the matter to them referred, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that the said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Ordered that the following be deferred:-

Committee on Council's amendments on Agricultural Bill;

Second reading of Bill to amend the Crown Lands Acts.

Ordered that the Bill to amend 52 Vic., cap. 6, and the Bill to amend cap. 90, of the Consolidated Statutes, be discharged from the order of the day.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Morris, pursuant to notice, a Bill to incorporate the St. John's Electric Tramway Company (limited) was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

Hon. the Premier gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill to amend and consolidate the Acts relating to education.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Tuesday, May 17, 1892.

The following petitions were presented, and it was ordered that they be laid on the table, namely:—

By Mr. Murphy,—From the following, on the subject of roads:— James Rodgers and William Hickey, of Torbay, also from Philip Furlong, of Pouch Cove, and from Peter Churchill, of Portugal Cove.

Mr. Murray, from select committee appointed to search the records of the Legislative Council in the matter of the Lotteries Bill, presented the following report, which was received and adopted:—

"The select committee appointed by this House to search the records of the Hon. the Legislative Council in order to ascertain what action had been taken by the Council in relation to the Bill sent up

from this House for the approval of the Council to amend title 23, chapter 86, "Of Lotteries," beg to report that they have searched the records of the Council in relation to this matter, and find from the said records that the Bill in question was received by the Council and read a first time, and that, on the motion to read the said Bill a second time, it was proposed by way of amendment that the Bill be read a second time on this day six months; when, on the amendment being put, there appeared for the said amendment three votes, namely, the Hon. Messrs. Talbot, Monroe, and Harris, and against the amendment two votes, Hon. Messrs. Harvey and Skelton; when the amendment to read the Bill this day six months was carried by a majority of one vote, and ordered accordingly.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that the said report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Ordered that second reading of Bill to amend the Crown Lands Act, 1884, be deferred.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill to incorporate the St. John's Electric Tramway Company (limited) was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be referred to a select committee, pursuant to rule 303 of this House, together with the petition therefor.

Ordered that the following form the select committee upon the said Bill and petition, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. Mr. Morris, and Messrs. Morison, Clift, Hallaren, Murray, and Shea.

On motion of Hon. the Premier, pursuant to notice, a Bill to amend and consolidate the Acts for the encouragement of education was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading on to-morrow.

Ordered that notice of motion by Mr. Murray with reference to the committee appointed on the French treaties question be discharged.

Ordered that notice of motion by Mr. Morine to move a resolution for a *modus vivendi* with Canada be deferred.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the adoption of the following resolution:—

"Resolved,—That it be an instruction from the House to the select committee on the "French" Shore question appointed by this House on the 16th day of May instant, by way of defining and limiting the scope of the powers of said committee;

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move an address to His Excellency the Governor for a copy of all correspondence relative to the relations of this Colony with Canada not yet laid before this House.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that the said Bill as amended be engrossed and read a third time to-morrow.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on the amendments made by the Legislative Council on Agricultural Bill.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Geran took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

Ordered that second reading of Bill to amend the Crown Lands Acts be deferred.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill relating to education was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole on to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. the Premier, seconded by Hon. Mr. Morris, pursuant to notice, it was ordered that the following be a select committee to whom be referred the said Bill relating to education: Hon. the Premier, Hon. E. P. Morris, Dr. Tait, Mr. Morine, Mr. Greene, Mr. Webber, Hon. the Surveyor General, Mr. Murphy, Mr. Thompson; with instructions to enquire into and report thereon.

Messages were received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that they had passed without amendment the following Bills:—

And that they had passed the following Bills with some amendments wherein they request the concurrence of this House:

The Bill relating to marriage;

The Bill relating to the Labrador fishery;

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on the Council's amendments on the said three Bills.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Geran took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the several amendments to them referred, and had adopted without amendment the Council's amendments on the Bill relating to marriage; that they had passed, with amendments, the Council's amendments upon the Bill relating to the Labrador fishery, and upon the Bill relating to the public health.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that a message be sent to the Legislative Council accordingly.

Ordered that notice of Mr. Morine, to move a resolution relating to a modus vivendi with Canada, be deferred.

Ordered that notice of Mr. Murray, to move a resolution relating to French treaties matter, be deferred.

Ordered that notice of Mr. Morine, to move an address for correspondence with Canada, be deferred.

It was moved by Mr. Greene, seconded by Mr. F. Morris, that the House do now resolve itself into committee of the whole on petition of R. G. Randall and the report of the select committee thereon.

The question being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative three, namely, Messrs. Greene, F. Morris, and Geran; and for the negative fourteen, namely, Hon. the Premier, Hon. the Colonial Secretary, Hon. the Receiver General, Hon. the Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Murphy, Thompson, Webber, Duff, Clift, Hallaren, Tait, Blandford, and Munn. So it passed in the negative, and was ordered accordingly.

On motion of Mr. F. Morris, pursuant to notice, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole to consider the petition of John Dunphy praying for increase of salary, and the report of select committee thereon.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the matter to them referred, and had passed a resolution that an address be presented to His Excellency the Governor, requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to take the said petition into his favorable consideration and will make such order thereon as may appear reasonable.

Ordered that said report be received and adopted, and that the address as aforesaid do pass and be engrossed and be presented to His Excellency by such members of this House as are of the Executive Council.

On motion of Hon. Premier, pursuant to notice, it was ordered

that the rules of the House be suspended in relation to the consideration of the Bill relating to education.

Mr. Greene, chairman of select committee on petition of P. Buckmaster, presented the report of such committee, which is as follows:

"The select committee appointed to consider the petition of Patrick Buckmaster beg to report that they have given their attention to the subject-matter of the said petition, and are of opinion that the petitioner is entitled to receive from the funds of this colony an amount of one cent and a half per pound upon all fresh meat supplied to public institutions by him from the time of the imposition of increased duties on fresh meat in the year 1890 to the end of said year, that is to say, on 40,000 pounds of meat the sum of \$600, the payment of which is recommended by your committee.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill relating to the sale of oleomargarine and similar articles.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Premier to lay on the table (1) a copy of the instructions given to James P. Fox, Esquire, when he visited St. Pierre in the year 1891 in the interest of the Government; (2) a copy of the report of Mr. Fox on the subject-matter of his visit.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Municipal Bill was read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act to consolidate, with amendments, the Acts relating to the Saint John's Municipal Council, and the municipal affairs of the town of St. John's"; and that the Clerk carry the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Ordered that notice of Mr. Morison for copy of instructions to Mr. Fox and Mr. Fox's report be deferred.

On motion of Mr. Morine, pursuant to notice, it was ordered that an address do pass, and be presented to His Excellency the Governor, for a copy of all correspondence relative to the relations of this Colony with Canada not yet laid before this House, and that such address be presented to His Excellency the Governor by such members of this House as are of His Excellency's Council.

On motion of Hon. the Premier, a Bill respecting foreign fishing vessels was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that they had adopted without amendment the amendments made by the Assembly in and upon the amendments made by the Council in and upon the following Bills:—

An Act respecting the Labrador fishery;

An Act to amend "The Public Health Act, 1889."

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that they had passed the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to amend the License Act, 1875," with some amendments, in which they request the concurrence of the House of Assembly.

Pursuant to notice, and on motion of Hon. Receiver General, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on resolutions in indemnity.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Hallaren took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had passed the following resolutions:—

On motion of Mr. Morine, pursuant to notice, a Bill relating to the sale of oleomargarine and similar articles was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading on to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Morris, pursuant to notice, a Bill to regulate the traffic, in this colony, of hawkers and pedlars, being foreigners and not domiciled in this country, was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading on to-morrow.

Ordered that motion of the Hon. Mr. Morris, for suspension of rules in relation to the Bill to incorporate the Saint John's Electric Tramway Company (limited) be deferred, and that motion of Mr. Greene for committee on the petition of Patrick Buckmaster be also deferred.

On motion of Mr. Rothwell, it was ordered that Mr. Hallaren be appointed a member of the committee on contingencies in lieu of Mr. Dawe.

Mr. Burgess gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask leave to introduce a Bill entitled "An Act to amend 51 Vic., cap. 26, entitled 'An Act respecting pilots and pilotage for ports in this Island other than St. John's."

Hon. the Premier gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the suspension of the rules in relation to all Bills now before the House.

Ordered that second reading of Bill to amend the Crown Lands Acts be deferred.

Ordered that motion of Mr. Morine for a resolution in reference to a *modus vivendi* with Canada be deferred.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Friday, May 20, 1892.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House in reply to message of this House of the 17th instant, with reference to the further consideration of the French treaties question, that they have appointed four of their body, namely: Hon'bles Messrs. Monroe, Skelton, Rendell, and Harris, a committee to co-operate with the committee appointed by this House.

It was ordered that notice of Mr. Murray to ask for a copy of telegrams referring to the transactions of May 14, relating to French Treaties Bill, be deferred.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole to consider the Council's amendments on License Bill.

So it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered accordingly.

The said Bill was then read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House presently.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, and had passed the same with some amendments.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that the said Bill be engrossed and read a third time presently as amended.

The said Bill was then read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act respecting foreign fishing vessels," and that the same be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting concurrence in its provisions.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Indemnity Bill was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House presently.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, and had passed the same without amendment.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that the said Bill, being engrossed, be read a third time presently.

The said Bill was then read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act to indemnify His Excellency the Governor of Newfoundland for certain sums of money advanced by him out of the public treasury for the service of the colony," and that the same be sent to the Council with a message requesting concurrence in its provisions.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill relating to the sale of oleomargarine was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole House presently.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, and had passed the same with some amendments.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that the said Bill as amended be engrossed and read a third time presently.

Pursuant to order of the day, the Bill relating to traffic in this colony by hawkers and pedlars was read a second time, and it was ordered that the same be committed to committee of the whole presently.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, and had passed the same with some amendments.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted, and that the said Bill be engrossed and read a third time presently.

The said Bill was then read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act respecting hawkers and pedlars, being foreigners, and not domiciled in this colony," and that the said Bill be sent to the Legislative Council with a message requesting concurrence in its provisions.

Ordered that notice of Mr. Morine, to move a resolution as to a modus vivendi with Canada, be withdrawn.

On motion of Mr. Burgess, pursuant to notice, a Bill to amend 51 Vic., cap. 26 (the Pilots and Pilotage Act of 1888), was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until Monday next at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Monday, May 23, 1892.

Dr. Tait presented a petition from Rev. W. J. Bartlett and others, of Burin, on the subject of roads.

Hon. Mr. Morris presented a petition from Messrs. J. & W. Stewart and others, of St. John's, on the subject of the Allan contract.

Ordered that the said petitions be laid on the table.

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole to consider the report of the select committee upon the petition of P. Buckmaster.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the matter to them referred, and had passed a resolution that an address in the usual form be presented to His Excellency the Governor in the matter of the said petition.

Ordered that said report be received and adopted, and that an address to His Excellency do pass, requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to take the petition of the said P. It was moved in amendment by Mr. F. Morris, seconded by Mr. Greene, that the said Bill and amendments be committed to committee of the whole on this day six months.

The amendment being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment sixteen, namely, Mr. F. Morris, Mr. Greene, Hon. Premier, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Burgess, Geran, Webber, Whiteley, Clift, Hallaren, Fox, Tait, Carty, and Shea; and against it five, namely, Messrs. Murray, Morison, Hon. Surveyor General, Messrs. Morine, and Fearn.

So it passed in the affirmative, and it was ordered accordingly.

On motion of the Hon. E. P. Morris, pursuant to notice, it was ordered that an address to His Excellency the Governor do pass upon the petition of Messrs. J. & W. Stewart and others, in reference to the Allan mail contract, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to take the said petition into his favourable consideration and will make such order therein as may appear reasonable; and that such address be engrossed and presented to His Excellency by such members of this House as are of His Excellency's Council.

Hon. E. P. Morris, from committee appointed to consider and report upon a Bill relating to patents, presented the report of the committee with Bill annexed, which report was received.

Pursuant to order, and on motion of Hon. Mr. Morris, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on the said Bill.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Whiteley took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill as reported, and had passed the same without amendment.

Ordered that the said report be received and adopted.

Pursuant to order, the said Bill was then read a third time, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and be entitled "An Act to amend title 15, chapter 54, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled 'Of Patents,'" and that the Clerk carry the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence.

Hon. Mr. Morris gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move that the select committee appointed to consider the petition of Martin Murphy have leave to sit and take evidence during recess, and report to this House on the said petition and evidence in its next session.

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the adoption of the following resolution:—

"Whereas statements have been made and contradicted affecting the honour and veracity of members of this House and the truth of statements made to the House by members thereof, partially upon the authority of the Rev'd. Dr. Pilot, Inspector of Church of England Schools:

Resolved,—That this House do, on to-morrow, resolve itself into a committee of privilege to take evidence touching the matter, and that the Speaker's summons do issue to the Rev'd. Dr. Pilot to appear at the bar of this House to-morrow to give evidence upon oath to the committee."

Mr. Morine gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the adoption of the following resolution:—

"Whereas it has long been customary for the Legislature to be summoned for the despatch of business in or about the middle of February in each year, and not to prorogue until late in the spring;

And whereas much valuable time in each session has been unemployed because reports, accounts, and proposed enactments have not been ready for submission at the beginning of the session;

And whereas the experience of the members of this House leads them to believe that the expense, loss, and inconvenience of these practices can be avoided with great advantage to the colony:

Be it resolved,—That it is the opinion of this House that (1) the Legislature should be assembled not later than the fifteenth of January

in each year; (2) that the fiscal accounts should be closed on the 30th June in each year, and be placed on the table of this House at its opening each session; (3) that measures which the Government intend to introduce should be ready for submission at the commencement of each session; and (4) that sessions should not ordinarily be extended beyond the 15th day of March in each year.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until to-morrow, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Wednesday, May 25, 1892.

The following petitions were presented and laid on the table, namely:—

By Hon. Mr. Morris,—From John Lacey, of St. John's, for remuneration;

By Dr. Tait,—From Rev. John Hewett and others, of Burin, on subject of a modus vivendi with Canada.

The following messages were received from the Legislative Council:—

- (a) That they concur in and have passed the resolution sent up confirming the rules and regulations recommended by the Fisheries Commission as amended by the Legislature;
- (b) That they have passed the Bill sent up entitled "An Act for the encouragement of education" and the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to amend 51 Vic., cap. 26," without amendment;
- (c) That they have passed, with some amendments, the Bill sent up entitled "An Act relating to the sale of oleomargarine and similar compounds," and the Bill sent up entitled "An Act respecting foreign fishing vessels," in which amendments they request the concurrence of this House.

Pursuant to order, the amendments made by the Council in and upon the said Bills relating to the sale of oleomargarine, and foreign fishing vessels, respectively, were read a first and second time.

Mr. Speaker stated that, because the said amendments propose in each case a tax upon the people, they are to that extent a breach of the privileges of this House.

On motion of the Hon. the Premier, seconded by Hon. Colonial Secretary, it was ordered that a message be sent to the Council desiring a conference on the subject-matter of the said amendments on the said Bills relating to foreign fishing vessels and to the sale of oleomargarine, for the purpose of stating to the Council the reasons why this House objects to the said amendments; and that Hon. the Premier, Hon. Colonial Secretary, and Messrs. Murray and Shea be the managers of said conference on behalf of this House; and that such message request the Council to appoint some of their body to act at such conference, and that the Council will appoint a time and place for such conference.

It was moved by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that the resolution for this House going into committee of privilege, of which he gave notice yesterday, be adopted with the preamble thereto.

Mr. Speaker ruled that, unless the unanimous assent of the House be given thereto, the said motion is not in order.

It was moved by Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Morison, that the said ruling of Mr. Speaker be not sustained by the House.

The question being put that the Speaker's ruling be not sustained, the House divided thereon, when there appeared in favour of the Speaker's ruling thirteen, namely, Hon. Colonial Secretary, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, The Financial Secretary, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Webber, Clift, Hallaren, F. Morris, and Tait; and against the Speaker's ruling six, namely, Messrs. Morine, Morison, Greene, Carty, Fearn, and Murray.

Ordered that Mr. Speaker's ruling be sustained.

It was moved by Hon. E. P. Morris, seconded by Mr. Geran, that the select committee appointed to consider the petition of Martin Murphy have leave to sit out of session and take evidence, and report the same in the next session.

Mr. Morine asked Mr. Speaker's ruling whether such motion could be acceded to, and whether it was not *ultra vires* of this House to give such powers to a select committee.

Mr. Speaker ruled that the practice of this House for more than 25 years established the power of the House to accede to the said motion; and it was ordered as moved by Hon. Mr. Morris.

It was moved by Mr. Fearn (in the absence of Mr. Morine), seconded by Mr. Murray, that the resolution and its preambles relating to time and duration of the session of the Legislature, the closing of fiscal accounts, and conduct of the business of the Legislature (of which Mr. Morine gave notice yesterday) be adopted.

The question of the adoption of the same being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the affirmative two, namely, Messrs. Fearn and Murray; and for the negative nine, namely, Hon. Premier, Hon. Receiver General, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Thompson, Burgess, Geran, Hallaren, and F. Morris.

So it passed in the negative, and was ordered accordingly.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Premier on what date the extra duties on produce imported from the Dominion of Canada will cease and said produce come into Newfoundland at the old rates of duties.

Hon. the Premier gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will move the suspension of all rules of this House in relation to the contingent expenses of the Legislature and Bill to provide for the same.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until Friday next, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Friday, May 27, 1892.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House, in reply to message of this House of the 25th instant respecting the resolution on the subject of the Council's amendments on the Bills entitled "An Act respecting foreign fishing vessels" and "An Act relating to the sale of oleomargarine and similar substances," that they have assented to the conference requested, and have appointed the Honourables Messrs. Harvey and Monroe managers on behalf of the Council, and that the conference would take place in the committee room of the Legislative Council, to-day, at half-past four o'clock.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that they had passed the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to consolidate with amendments the Acts relating to the Saint

John's Municipal Council and the municipal affairs of the town of St. John's," with some amendments, in which they request the concurrence of the House of Assembly.

The said amendments were read a first and a second time, and the House resolved itself into committee of the whole thereon.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Carty took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had made some progress in the consideration of the matter to them referred, and asked leave to sit again.

Ordered that the report be received, and that the committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Mr. Carty gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Premier what action (if any) has been taken by the Government on the report of Mr. Justice Pinsent, the commissioner appointed to examine and report upon the claims of certain inhabitants of Saint George's Bay, on account of losses alleged to have been sustained by them during the years 1889, 1890 and 1891.

At half-past four of the clock, the time appointed for the conference upon the Bills relating to foreign fishing vessels and the sale of obcomargarine and similar compounds, the names of the managers were called over and they repaired to the conference chamber.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that the Council recede from their amendments on the Bill entitled "An Act respecting foreign fishing vessels," and that the Council request that the House of Assembly may be pleased to return the said Bill to the Legislative Council.

Ordered that the Clerk carry the said Bill to the Legislative Council.

The Hon. the Premier reported to the House the result of the conference this day had with the Legislative Council upon the Bills relating to foreign fishing vessels and the sale of oleomargarine, repectively, namely: that the Council did not presume to infringe upon

the privileges of this House, and withdrew their proposed amendments to the said Bills.

On motion of Mr. Morine, seconded by Mr. Greene, and pursuant to order, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole upon the amendment made by the Council in and upon the Bill relating to the sale of oleomargarine.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Thompson took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said amendment, and had adopted an amendment thereon, namely: that all the words of the amendment after the word "operation" in the first line thereof be struck out so that the amendment read as follows: "6. This Act shall come into operation on the first day of July, 1892."

Ordered that the report be received and adopted, and that a message be sent to the Legislative Council requesting that they will concur in the amendment upon their said amendment.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that they have passed the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to amend title 15, chapter 54, of the Consolidated Statutes; entitled 'Of Patents,'" with an amendment, in which they request the concurrence of the Assembly.

Pursuant to order, the said amendment was read a first and second time, and the House resolved itself into committee of the whole thereon.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Fox took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said amendment, and had passed the same with an amendment, erasing the word "three" from the Council's amendment, and substituting the word "six."

Ordered that the report be received.

On motion that the report be adopted, it was moved in amend-

ment by Mr. Murray, seconded by Mr. Morine, that the Bill as amended be read this day six months.

The question being put, the House divided thereon, when there appeared for the amendment one, namely, Mr. Murray; and against the amendment thirteen, namely, Hon. Premier, Hon. Surveyor General, Hon. E. P. Morris, Messrs. Thompson, Geran, Clift, Hallaren, Tait, Greene, Morine, Fearn, Morison, and Fox.

So it passed in the negative.

The question that the report be adopted being put, it passed in the affirmative and was ordered accordingly.

Ordered that a message be sent to the Council with the amendment, as reported, requesting their concurrence.

Ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council requesting that they furnish to this House an account of their contingent expenses of the present session.

By leave of the House, and on motion of Mr. Morine, a Bill relating to the engrossing of Bills and other public documents was read a first time, and it was ordered that the same stand for second reading to-morrow.

Ordered that motion for suspension of the rules in relation to Contingencies Bill be deferred.

Pursuant to order, the House adjourned until Monday next, at four of the clock in the afternoon.

Monday, May 30, 1892.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that they had passed without amendment the amendment made by the Assembly on the amendment made by the Council in and upon the Bill'sent up from the Assembly entitled "An Act to amend title 15, chapter 54, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled 'Of Patents.'"

Pursuant to order of the day, the House resolved itself into committee of the whole on Municipal Bill and Council's amendments thereon.

Mr. Speaker left the chair.

Mr. Studdy took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the said Bill, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again presently.

Ordered that the said report be received.

Ordered that the Bill relating to engrossing of Bills be withdrawn.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Hallaren, it was ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council desiring a conference upon the subject of the amendments made in and upon the Municipal Bill, for the purpose of stating to the Council the reasons why this House does not assent to certain of the said amendments, and of considering the same; that the Hon. the Premier, Hon. E. P. Morris, and Mr. Speaker be the managers of such conference on behalf of this House; that such message request the Council to appoint a time and place for such conference, and that they will appoint some of their body to act thereat.

Mr. Murray gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will ask the Hon. the Premier (1) whether the Government is aware or has been formally apprised of the retirement of Mr. Middleton from the firm of Messrs. Reid and Middleton, railway contractors with this colony for the construction of a line of railway to Hall's Bay; (2) whether the said change in the firm of contractors has been accepted by the Government in connection with their contract; (3) whether the necessary securities in the hands of the Government have been affected by the change; (4) whether sufficient security is now in the hands of the Government for the purposes of the contract; (5) where such securities are now deposited, and of what they consist.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House (in reply to message of to-day) that they have appointed the Hons. Messrs. Mr. Geran took the chair of the committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The chairman reported that the committee had considered the matter to them referred, and had adopted the said report with some amendments, and he handed in the same at the Clerk's table, where they were read as follows, with resolutions adopted by the said committee of the whole:—

A message was received from the Legislative Council that they have passed the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to provide for the contingent expenses of the Legislature" with the amendments requested to be inserted by this House.

Pursuant to order, the said amendments were read and adopted, and it was ordered that the same do pass, and that a message accordingly be sent to the Legislative Council.

Ordered that said report be received and adopted.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House that "in accordance with the agreement at the conference on the subject of the Bill respecting the municipal affairs of the town of St. John's, they recede from their amendment made in the 163rd section fourth line strike out the words 'for any sum exceeding fifty dollars fifth line of the Bill expunging the words 'and the Surveyor General shall be a third' and also from the amendment introducing the words 'and these two shall appoint a third' and also in the ninth line 'or the arbitrators neglect to appoint a third.'"

Ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council acquainting them that this House has adopted the amendments made by the Legislative Council in and upon the Bill sent up entitled "An Act to consolidate, with amendments, the Acts relating to the St. John's Municipal Council and the municipal affairs of the town of Saint John's" with some amendments, wherein it requests the concurrence of the Legislative Council; also requesting that the Legislative Council will assent to amend the 50th section of the said Bill by striking therefrom all the words therein which follow the words "in the said town."

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House "that they have passed the amendments made by the Assembly on the amendments made by the Legislative Council in and upon the Bill relating to the municipal affairs of the town of St. John's without amendment, and that they assent to amend and have amended the 50th section of the said Bill, as requested by the House of Assembly."

Pursuant to order, the said amendment in the said 50th section was read and adopted.

Ordered that the said several documents be laid on the table.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received a communication from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary intimating that His Excellency the Governor would close the present session of the Assembly on to-morrow at two of the clock in the afternoon.

Pursuant to order, the House then adjourned until to-morrow, at one of the clock in the afternoon.

Wednesday, June 1, 1892.

The House met at one o'clock, pursuant to adjournment.

A message was received from the Legislative Council acquainting this House, in reply to the message from the Assembly of yesterday, that the Legislative Council concur in and have passed the amendments made by the Assembly in the Bill relating to foreign fishing vessels.

At two of the clock a message from His Excellency the Governor was delivered by W. F. Rennie, Esquire, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency the Governor in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker, at the Bar of the Council, addressed His Excellency as follows:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

The House of Assembly of Newfoundland have voted the supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the civil service. In the name of the House of Assembly I present the following Bills for your Excellency's assent:—

- 1. A Bill entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this colony and its dependencies."
- 2. A Bill entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty a sum of money for defraying the expenses of the civil government of this colony for the year ending on the 31st day of December, 1892, and for other purposes."
- 3. A Bill entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty a sum of money for constructing and repairing roads, streets, and bridges, and other public works within this colony, and to make provision for the protection and preservation of the same."
- 4. A Bill entitled "An Act to indemnify His Excellency the Governor for certain sums of money advanced by him from the colonial treasury for the service of the colony."
- 5. A Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the payment of interest on loans of certain sums of money raised for the purpose of providing for the sewerage of the town of St. John's."

6. A Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the contingent expenses of the Legislature":—

To which Bills His Excellency was pleased to give his assent, with proviso that in the Revenue Bill the suspending clause related to section eight of said Bill.

The following Bills also received His Excellency's assent. Bills entitled respectively,—

- 7. "An Act to regulate the prosecution of the seal-fishery."
- 8. "An Act to amend title 15, chapter 54, of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled 'Of Patents.'"
 - 9. "An Act to declare and amend the law of partnership."
 - 10. "An Act respecting the liabilities of carriers by water."
- 11. "An Act to amend the Public Health Act of 1889, and the Acts in amendment thereof."
- 12. "An Act for the publication of the Consolidated Statutes (second series)."
- 13. "An Act to amend the law relating to the solemnization of marriage."
- 14. "An Act to amend the law relating to the limitation of personal actions at law, and for other purposes."
- 15. "An Act respecting corporations the interest of whose stock is guaranteed by the Government."
 - 16. "An Act respecting the Labrador fishery."
- 17. "An Act to amend and consolidate the Acts for the encouragement of education."
 - 18. "An Act respecting foreign fishing vessels."
- 19. "An Act respecting hawkers and pedlars, being foreigners and not domiciled in this colony."
- 20. "An Act to amend 51 Victoria, chapter 26, entitled 'An Act respecting pilots and pilotage for ports in this Island other than St. John's."
- 21. "An Act to consolidate with amendments the Acts relating to the St. John's Municipal Council and the municipal affairs of the town of St. John's."

His Excellency was pleased to make the following speech to both branches of the Legislature:—

"Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

It will no doubt be satisfactory to you to be relieved from the onerous duties of the session.

I have much pleasure in observing that, amongst the several measures of importance to which I have given my assent, there is a Bill which deals with the subject of education and establishes a pension fund for teachers. The liberal addition made to the educational grants and allotted to the augmentation of teachers' salaries, together with the supplementary vote for general educational purposes contained in the measure to which you have this session devoted so much care and assiduity will, I feel assured, be correctly appreciated by this country, and secure improvements in our educational institutions.

Legislation having become imperative through action emanating from here, England last year, solely on the earnest representations of delegates from this Legislature, stayed the passing of the Bill required to carry out her treaty obligations with France and to protect her officers when employed on fishery duty, confiding to you the enactment of this necessary measure. It is therefore with extreme regret that I find the House of Assembly has thrown out the Bill presented to it for this purpose, and I can only now trust that this action may not be prejudicial to the interests of the colony—interests which I can assure you I have deeply at heart.

It is exceedingly gratifying to observe that the seal-fishery, which so largely affects our general interests, has been most successful, and I trust that our other fisheries, our agriculture, and our general industries may in the ensuing year equally shew such happy results.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I thank you for the liberality with which you have provided for the public service. Your grants shall be applied with careful regard to the intentions which directed the appropriations.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:
