THURSDAY, August 16th, 1917.

This being the day appointed for the meeting of the Legislature,

The House met.

At three o'clock, p.m., His Excellency the Governor, Sir Walter Edward Davidson, Knight

Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, having arrived at the Council Chamber, and being seated on the Throne, commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, through the Honourable the President of the Legislative Council, to let the House of Assembly know:

"It is His Excellency the Governor's pleasure they attend him immediately in this House;"

Who, being come thereto with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:

Nr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I have called you together in this special session in order that proposals may be submitted to you, which will remove the possibility of the recurrence of the difference of opinion between the two branches of the Legislature, which arose at your last meeting. Proposals will be laid before you to define the relations between your two Houses, in order to secure the undivided authority of the House of Assembly over financial matters.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

In order to provide additional Revenue for the war requirements of the Colony, you will be invit-

ed to consider a measure for the importation of a tax on business profits.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I trust, that in the consideration of these important measures, Divine wisdom may influence you to results advantageous to the Colony and its people.

Then the House of Assembly withdrew.

His Excellency was pleased to retire.

The Hon. the President reported His Excellency's speech, and the same was read by the Clerk.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Blandford, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Ellis.

Ordered,—That a Select Committee be appointed to draft an Address to His Excellency the Governor in reply to his gracious Speech at the opening of the present Session of the Legislature, and

Ordered,—That the Hons. Messrs. Blandford, Ellis, Milley, Anderson and Power be a Committee for that purpose.

The Hon. Colonial Secretary gives notice that he will, on to-morrow, move the suspension of the 33rd Rule and all other Rules of this House with regard to all Bills, amendments, addresses and all other matters that are now, or may come before this House, for the remainder of the Session.

On motion made the House adjourned until Monday next, August 20th, at half-past four o'clock, p.m.
