1. Overview

The St. John's Land Development Advisory Authority (the Authority) was created to review applications regarding development within the St. John's Urban Region Agricultural Development Area (ADA) as per **the St. John's Urban Region Agriculture Development Area Regulations** (the Regulations) under the **Lands Act** (the Act).

There are approximately 12,152 hectares of land within the ADA that fall within seven municipalities on the North East Avalon: St. John's, Conception Bay South, Logy Bay-Middle Cove-Outer Cove, Portugal Cove-St. Phillip's, Flatrock, Torbay and Pouch Cove.

Subsection 3(3) and 3(4) of the Regulations provides for the appointment of the Authority by the Minister of FFA (the Minister).

The number and timing of applications received will dictate the meeting schedule of the Authority, however the board typically meets six times per year.

The Authority is made up of at least five members, including a Chairperson and a Secretary. Members of the Authority are made up from various provincial government departments that have a role in land use planning. All members are regionally located within the North East Avalon with the exception of the Chairperson. Finally, appointments are made using a merit-based process; however, gender balance is considered during the appointment process and efforts are made to ensure the Authority is representative of the population it serves.

2. Mandate

The Authority has a mandate to:

- (a) Review applications to carry out development on land within the St. John's Urban Region Agriculture Development Area;
- (b) Inform municipalities of decisions made;
- (c) Monitor activities within the St. John's Urban Region Agriculture Development Area; and
- (d) Ensure awareness of the St. John's Urban Region Agriculture Development Area and associated regulations.

3. Lines of Business

The Authority has not identified separate Lines of Business as this would be repetitive of its mandate.

4. Primary Clients

The clients of the Authority are individuals or organizations who apply through the municipal councils of the City of St. John's, Town of Portugal Cove-St. Philips, Town of Pouch Cove, Town of Flatrock, Town of Torbay, Town of Logy Bay-Middle Cove-Outer Cove and the Town of Conception Bay South to carry out development on land in the St. John's Urban Region ADA.

5. Vision

Through assessment of applications for development activities on land in the St. John's Urban Region ADA, the Authority contributes to the vision of FFA, that of sustainable renewable resources that are responsibly developed for the social, cultural, ecological

and economic well-being of the province.

6. Issue

The Authority reviews applications for all proposed developments within the boundaries of the St. John's Urban Region ADA in accordance to the regulations. Applications are submitted to the local municipality and forwarded to the authority. All applications are given due consideration under the Regulations and are either approved or refused according to the level of agricultural impact. The decision is forwarded to the municipality who then notifies the applicant. In the case of a refusal by the Authority, the applicant may appeal in writing to the Board within 30 days after the applicant is notified by the municipality of the decision by the Authority.

As the focus of Authority will remain the same for the entire plan, the Authority will report on the same objective and indicators in all three years of the planning period.

Issue: Sustainable Agricultural Development in the St. Johns Urban Region ADA

Objective: By March 31, 2024, the St. John's Land Development Advisory Authority will have worked to ensure development activities in the St. John's Urban Region Agriculture Development Area are compliant with the Act and Regulations, thus supporting ongoing, sustainable agricultural development in the area.

Indicators:

- Reviewed all applications and rendered decisions.
- Maintained records of decisions.
- Monitored development activities for compliance with Regulations.
