MR. WELLS: Mr. Speaker, I move that this House do now adjourn and that when it adjourns today it will stand adjourned until Thursday, November 11 at three o'clock in the afternoon provided always that if it appears to the satisfaction of Mr. Speaker or in the case of his absence from the Province the Chairman of Committees after consultation with Her Majesty's ministers meet at an earlier time than the adjournment or in his absence the Chairman of Committees may give notice that he is so satisfied and thereupon the House shall meet at the time stated by such notice and shall transact its business as if it had been duly adjourned to that date and that this House do now adjourn. MP. SPEAKEP: The hon. Leader of the Opposition. MR. POBERTS: Mr. Speaker, before we adjourn perhaps I might be permitted to say a word or two on behalf of I am sure all of us on this side of the House to say how much we have appreciated, Sir, and admired the way in which this session has been carried out. Your Honour and Your Honour's colleagues in the Chair, particularly the gentleman from St. John's South (Dr. Collins) and the gentleman from Harbour Crace (Mr. Young) I think have conducted yourselves if it is not presumptuous of me to say so, Sir, in an admirable fashion under sometimes trying circumstances. And I say that, Sir, as somebody who at times has been involved in those trying circumstances in what I consider to be the discharge of my duties.

But I do feel, Sir, that the conduct of the Chair in this session, Sir, has been of the highest traditions of this House and of the partliamentary system and has enhanced those traditions. I would not want to let the session go without taking the opportunity to say so.

I would also like to say, Sir, - and I know I speak particularly for my colleague, our House Leader, the member for Trinity Bay de Verde (Mr. F. Rowe) - we have very much appreciated the way in which the government approached the business of the House. I hope we can improve it still further and I would hope that the Standing Committee will meet over the Summer and have a look at some of the

problems that have emerged in an effort to see if we can improve the functioning of this House.

Let me also say a word of appreciation on behalf of my colleagues to the Minister of Public Works and his colleagues for the way in which they have arranged adequate accommodation. There are those who feel that it is more than adequate although I am not one of those. But I think I speak for all of the private members on both sides, members supporting the government and members supporting the Opposition, Sir, when I say that they are deeply grateful. It will enable members better to discharge their duties and thus better to serve the people who have sent them here and that surely is the important thing, Sir. I think this is the first time in the history of this Legislature of the 150 years that this House has been in existence that the needs of private members have been adequately recognized and I want to pay a well-deserved tribute, Sir, to the minister, to his colleague, the Minister of Forestry and Agriculture who acted in the minister's absence and to their officials. Sir, I think they have served us well.

MR. SPEAKER: The hon, member for Twillingate.

<u>MR. SMALLWOOD:</u> Mr. Speaker, I should like to adopt the words of the Leader of the Opposition as my own and I certainly endorse them and I agree thoroughly. I would like to add the observation that my own experience of this House which goes back a long time, long before Confederation, long before, long before Commission of Covernment, my own experience of the House tells me that at no time perhaps in the present century has the Chair as occupied by Your Honour and by the Deputy Speaker and by the assistant Deputy Speaker if that is his correct title, the hon. gentleman from Harbour Grace (Mr. Young) been more honourably and acceptably conducted. The Leader of the Opposition says it is in the highest tradition. It is almost higher than the highest tradition because the highest tradition in the past has not

been all that high on occasion with some of the occupants of the Chair.

But as I forecast on opening day in this session you, Your Honour, have established a very, very high standard indeed and the other two hon. members who are your deputies have been exemplary in every way. I think as a House whatever foolish things we do and all Houses do foolish things including the Mother of Parliaments - M. SMALLWOOD: houses do foolish things including the Mother of Parliaments.

MR. NEAPY: We have not swung the mace at anybody yet. MR. SMALLWOOD: No one yet has seized that beautiful mace and brandished it over his head. No matter what foolish things a House does, and we all do foolish things, this session has been conducted in perhaps the most orderly way that I have ever known it to be done and the congratulations of the House are due you, Your Honour, and your two deputies and to all of us. I think we all deserve a little praise and a little commendation for our very good behaviour. We have acted as good boys in this sassion. I hope we will continue to do so.

<u>MP. NEAPY:</u> Mr. Speaker, I would not want the House to close without saying a word of appreciation to the gentlemen who sit in the centre of the floor of the House, the day Clerk, and the Clerks of the House -

NEARY:</u> - who in my opinion, Sir, this session have done a magnificent job and I would also like to pay tribute to the Editor of Debates and the staff of the Hansard Office who work a tremendous amount of overtime when the House is sitting, "r. And not forgetting our two friends the policemen who have stood by us in thick and thin outside of the door, and the gentleman who turns on the switch in the control booth that turns on the microphones who have been with us night and day. And, Mr. Speaker, it never ceases to amaze me how the stamine that the hon. Sergeant-at-Arms in this House has.

SOME HON. MEMBERS: Hear, hear!

<u>MR. NEARY:</u> It does not make any difference what hour in the day or night, Sir, the Sergeant-at-Arms is the only gentleman in this

Sir, before I take my seat I hope, Mr. Speaker that the people the have had to work all the overtime in this hon. They have come in for their share of criticism as usual from certain hon, members who felt that they were done an injustice by the press. But I have nothing but words of praise for the members of the working press who, in my opinion, Sir, are overworked and underpaid. And I want to say a great big thank you to the press because without them, Mr. Speaker, the people of this Province would not know what is happening in the people's House, what goes on, the information would not get out to the people and I want to say a great big thank you to the members of the working press who have been so loyal and with us since the beginning of this session, SONT HON. <u>MR. SPEAKER:</u> The hon. Minister without Portfolio. <u>MR. WELLS:</u> Mr. Speaker, I have to firstly amend my motion of adjournment to the twelfth rather than the eleventh. I had forgotten but the eleventh is one of the few statutory holiday that is actually observed on the day itself.

SPFAKER:</u> On my own behalf and on behalf of the other hon. members who have presided over meetings of the House and the Committee I wish to thank hon. members for their kind words and to thank them as well for their co-operation during this session and I know the officers and stalf of the House, the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Clerk and his associates, Hansard and all who are involved in the work of the Legislature would wish me to thank, on their behalf, hon members for their appreciation, their co-operation and their kind words today.

The motion before the Chair is that it is moved and seconded that when this House adjourns today it will stand adjourned until Friday, November 12th. at 3:00 P.M., provided always that if it appears to the satisfaction of the Speaker, or in the case of his absence from the Province the Chairman of Cormittees, after consultation with Her Majery's Ministers, advisable to meet at an earlier time than that of adjournment, the House shall meet at the time stated by such notice and shall transact its business as if it had been duly adjourned to that time.
