Overview

The Buildings Accessibility Appeal Tribunal (the Tribunal) is an independent, quasi-judicial body responsible for hearing and adjudicating appeals made under section 23 of the **Buildings Accessibility Act** (the Act). The Tribunal, after hearing an appeal, may confirm, revoke or vary the action taken by the Director of Engineering and Inspection Services (as appointed under subsection 8(1) of the Act) with respect to the administration of the Act and Regulations. The Tribunal is appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council under the authority of section 20 of the Act. It is comprised of five members including a chairperson, a vice-chairperson and three persons, one of whom shall be a representative of persons with disabilities. Mandate

The Tribunal's mandate is to hear and adjudicate appeals of notices, decisions, directions or orders confirmed or varied by the Director (as appointed under subsection 8(1) of the Act) with respect to buildings accessibility. Decisions of the Tribunal are based on a review of written and oral submissions and documents and may be appealed to the courts. The Tribunal convenes only when an appeal has been filed.

Vision

The Tribunal works to ensure the fair and equitable application of its mandate as outlined in the legislation.

Revenues and Expenditures

The Tribunal has no revenues. It is funded through the operating budget of the Department of Digital Government and Service NL.

Report on Performance

This document outlines the Tribunal's activities from April 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022, including the goals and objectives achieved as outlined in the 2020-23 Activity Plan.

The Tribunal meets only when an appeal has been filed pursuant to section 23 of the Act.

Objective: By March 31, 2021, 2022 and 2023, the Buildings Accessibility Appeal Tribunal will have processed all appeals it has received in accordance with the requirements of the **Buildings Accessibility Act**.

Indicators:

- Number of appeal hearings commenced not later than 30 days after receipt of written notice of appeal.
- Number appeal decisions provided to appellant in writing within 45 days of hearing appeal.

No appeals were filed with the tribunal during the 2021-22 fiscal year, and the Tribunal heard no appeals over the same time period.

Opportunities and Challenges Ahead

- COVID-19 issues have presented a unique challenge for all sectors of the
 economy affected by buildings accessibility. Improvements to buildings (i.e.,
 accessibility) have been delayed or halted. This is expected to remain a challenge
 for these sectors and may continue to be a challenge for the Tribunal.
- The province recently signed a harmonization agreement to adopt the National Building Code, which would eventually align many construction practices across all Canadian jurisdictions. This move toward regulatory cooperation may lead to an increase in appeals in the coming years.

Financial Statements

The Tribunal is not required to submit audited financial statements.
