EDUCATION DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The Education Director's report contains statistical data compiled by the Department of Education as well as other performance indicators available for the district's schools. Above all, though, it describes the achievements of the CSFP and its staff with respect to the strategic planning priority development areas and provides an overview of key action items for the upcoming school year.

A. ACTIVITY REPORT

CSFP planning for 2003-2006 contained six priority development areas.

1. DEFINITION OF FRENCH-LANGUAGE SCHOOL

Achievements in 2004-2005

The mission, vision and values of the Conseil scolaire were printed and posted in every school.

The information kit for parents was reviewed and reprinted.

An executive summary of the strategic plan was prepared and printed.

Models of partnerships among French-language organizations and the CSFP were developed for use in managing the Centre scolaire et communautaire de Saint-Jean.

Meetings were held with branches of provincial French-language organizations to identify shared strategic planning components.

Each school's educational projects were evaluated and updated based on the evaluation results.

Action items for 2005-2006

Continue to define the Conseil scolaire's expectations regarding quality of education in CSFP schools.

Ensure the ongoing participation of the Grands-Vents and Ste-Anne schools in the Department of Education's school development process.

Conduct an internal evaluation of the Grands-Vents and Ste-Anne schools.

Negotiate an agreement with the ACFSJ for the operation and administration of the CSC des Grands-Vents.

Assess the extent to which the strategic plan objectives have been achieved and prepare an annual action plan.

Conduct an annual evaluation of each school's education project and update it accordingly.

2. ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE

2.1 EMPLOYEE RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

Achievements in 2004-2005

Three days of training were provided for teachers on September 8, 9 and 10, 2004, in co-operation with the Department of Education. The main theme was teaching members of minority groups.

The principal of the Grands-Vents school (Serge Gagnon) was appointed.

Jacques Landry again took part in the Laval University and Moncton University career fairs.

Preparations continue to be made for legal action on the certification problem.

Guidelines were prepared concerning statements of proper conduct prior to hiring an employee.

An occupational health and safety committee was instituted in each school.

An evaluation policy was adopted for CSFP office employees and support staff.

Action items for 2005-2006

Continue to take part in career fairs held by Canadian French-language universities.

Report of the Director of Education 8th Annual General Meeting of the CSFP

Provide the required training for occupational health and safety committee members.

Organize a training session for janitors.

Prepare an educational development plan for 2005-2006.

Select a new executive for the CSFP.

2.2 ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

Achievements in 2004-2005

A proposal was submitted to the Department of Education as part of the OLEP agreement renewal.

A new accounting plan was developed for schools.

Guidelines were prepared with respect to ordering, approving invoices and receiving goods in schools.

A formula for the funding and administration of the Centre scolaire et communautaire de Saint-Jean was prepared and submitted to the departments in question.

Action items for 2005-2006

Submit a new proposal for the renewal of the OLEP agreement.

Implement the new accounting plan in schools and provide related training for secretaries.

Prepare a funding formula for the CSCGV and negotiate a long-term lease with the tenants.

2.3 FACILITIES AND BUILDINGS

Achievements in 2004–2005

The school and community components moved into the newly constructed Centre scolaire et communautaire des Grands-Vents. The Centre was officially and publicly inaugurated in an April 2005 ceremony in the presence of a number of provincial, national and international officials.

A new policy on the use of school rooms and facilities by the community was adopted.

Action items for 2005-2006

Repair the roofs of the Centre éducatif l'ENVOL and Centre scolaire et communautaire Ste-Anne (projects deferred from 2004–2005).

Negotiate service agreements for the CSC des Grands-Vents:

- Cafeteria
- Resource centre
- Reception area
- Computer services

2.4 TRANSPORTATION

Action items for 2005-2006

Renew annual school bus transportation contracts and agreements.

Develop a general school bus transportation policy (safety measures and procedures to follow in case of an accident).

2.5 COMPUTER SYSTEMS

Achievements in 2004–2005

The Web pages of the Grands-Vents school board and school were reviewed and improved.

A new computer system was installed at the CSC des Grands-Vents.

An Internet access policy for schools was adopted.

Action items for 2005-2006

Install a high-speed computer system in west-coast schools.

Set up a videoconferencing system among CSFP schools.

Install computers in every CSFP classroom.

Improve the Web pages of west-coast schools and the Centre éducatif l'ENVOL.

3. STUDENT RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

Achievements in 2004-2005

The Conseil's promotional tools regarding French-language education in NL (parents' kit, pamphlets) were reviewed and reprinted.

A Centre scolaire et communautaire de Saint-Jean promotional campaign was conducted.

Guidelines were developed for school administration concerning student departures and transfers.

Partnerships were established with English-language schools in Labrador to exchange services.

The CSFP renewed the agreement with the Commission Scolaire du Littoral to enable students from the Labrador Strait to attend the Mgr Scheffer de Lourdes school in Blanc Sablon.

A favourable legal opinion was obtained regarding the interpretation of the grandfathering clause.

Action items for 2005-2006

Organize a promotional campaign for west-coast schools.

Provide training for each of our school councils to enable them to develop a regional promotion plan.

Take part in the appeal of the Anse au Clair decision.

Publish an exit profile of students who attended French-language school until 9th grade or later (project deferred from 2004–2005).

4. DEFINITION OF SCHOOL CURRICULUM

Achievements in 2004–2005

The Bon départ/Kinderstart program was translated and adapted to provide Frenchlanguage intervention tools to promote learning among preschoolers.

A project was initiated to develop a teaching materials kit for implementing francization measures in schools.

Training was provided for distance educators on the use of communications software.

Distance learning courses were continued and extended; an evaluation of distance learning courses was conducted in each of the schools in question.

The responsibilities and tasks of distance learning educators and teaching assistants were defined.

Training on documentary services was provided for all educators.

A formative evaluation of school adjustment staff was developed and conducted.

Training was provided during the fiscal year for a new group of monitors to help them develop new skills.

A new textbook, *Histoire de Terre-Neuve-et-Labrador*: 500 ans de présence française, developed by the CSFP and the Department of Education for 8th-grade students, was put into use in schools.

CSFP students took regular provincial examinations.

Action items for 2005-2006

Support educators in implementing pedagogy of actualization (minority pedagogy) principles.

Produce a teaching guide, finalize a CD-ROM and bring the eighth-grade History program into line with the *Histoire de Terre-Neuve-et-Labrador*: 500 ans de présence française textbook.

Continue preparing students and staff for the new structure and high school diploma requirements.

Identify the causes of poor student performance in provincial examinations and put a plan in place to rectify the problem.

Set up a day care in the CSC des Grands-Vents.

Expand the Bon depart program to all CSFP schools.

Complete the computerization of 11th- and 12th-grade mathematics courses as part of the provincial agreement.

Provide training for school adjustment staff on developing pathways and remedial plans and administering remedial instruction tests.

Report of the Director of Education 8th Annual General Meeting of the CSFP

Set up an educational counselling documentation centre in each school.

Take an inventory of the various bursaries available for French-language school graduates and provide information on them for students and parents in our schools (project deferred from 2003–2004).

5. COMMUNICATION

Achievements in 2004-2005

As it has previously, over the course of the past year the CSFP was featured in a number of reports and interviews in the local and national French- and Englishlanguage media.

CSFP members and staff took an active role in school board networking at the provincial (NLSBA), regional (regroupement des directeurs de l'Éducation de l'Atlantique) and national (FNCSF) levels.

A monthly newsletter was distributed in schools and provincial community organizations.

Articles on CSFP school activities were published regularly in Le Gaboteur.

A communication evaluation questionnaire was sent to internal and external CSFP stakeholders.

Action items for 2005-2006

Provide school council members with training on their roles and responsibilities.

Organize a meeting to clarify the roles of the school council versus those of the St. John's parents' committee.

Finalize the partnership with the FPFTNL, particularly in the matters of early childhood, promotion and recruitment.

Take an active role in the recent restructuring of the NLSBA.

Host the Regroupement national des directions générales de l'Éducation (RNDGÉ) for their meeting in early August 2005.

Create a Web-based discussion tool for CSFP educators.

6. GROWTH OF FRENCH LANGUAGE AND CULTURE

Achievements in 2004–2005

All CSFP schools took an active role in various activities to promote La francophonie: Activités 2005, Rendez-vous de la francophonie, Journée provinciale de la francophonie [Provincial Francophone Day], semaine du français [French Week], student exchanges, literary contests, etc.

All the schools included objectives and activities associated with the promotion of French pride in their education projects.

A provincial committee created last year with representatives from Canadian Heritage, the FFTNL, the FPFTNL, Franco-Jeunes and the CSFP continued its work with a view to defining a provincial vision and orientation for promoting arts and culture.

Action items for 2005-2006

Carry out another cultural integration project in west-coast schools as part of the Génie-Arts program.

Create a French-language component of the *Génie-Arts* program that applies to all CSFP schools.

Develop the new cultural activities plan and justify our request for funding in the OLEP proposal.

Promote the organization of annual cultural activities in every school.

Take part for another year in setting up the Réseau Atlantique de spectacles en milieu scolaire (RASMS) in co-operation with RADARTS.

Notes to the Financial Statements Year Ended June 30, 2005

1. Significant Accounting Policies:

The accompanying financial statement have been prepared on a fund accounting basis which is generally accepted for School Districts. Fund accounting can be defined as "accounting procedures in which a self balancing group of accounts is provided for each fund". It is customary for School Districts to account separately for the current and capital funds.

A summary of significant accounting policies adopted by the District, relating to their use of fund accounting, is as follows:

- Grants received by the District are recorded in either the current or capital funds
 depending on their source. Grants from the Department of Education are treated as
 current revenues while those from the EIC (Education Investment Corporation) are
 recorded as capital revenues.
- Fixed asset additions are recorded at full cost in the capital fund.
- Effective July 1, 2003, the District commenced the amortization of its capital assets. A retroactive
 calculation was performed based on the straight-line method based on the following number of
 years.

School buildings - 40 years Furniture - 10 years Equipment - 10 years Computers - 4 years

- 4. Funding relating to capital assets is deferred and amortized according to the same method used for the assets to which its relates.
- 5. The School board has acquired, in certain cases, land for its buildings without cost. In other cases, the board obtained authorization to use the land without ownership, as long as the properties are used for educational purposes. In the case where the land is board property, value determinations were not possible, meaning that the fair market value was not recorded.

5. Accrued Severance Leave

The amount of \$25,672 for teachers' severance costs and the amount of \$442 for non-teaching staff severance costs are included in expenses. The amount of \$140,259 for teachers' severance costs and the amount of \$35,698 for non-teaching staff severance costs for a total of \$179,957 are included in the liabilities.

The adjustment for teachers' severance pay is required by the Department of Education of the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and has no impact on the operation of the School Board. No account receivable is included in the accounts to offset this liability.

The accrued severance leave for non-teaching personnel is funded out of the board's regular operating grants.

Notes to the financial statements As at June 30, 2005

1. General

The Conseil scolaire francophone has the same powers as English school boards. In addition, its mandate is to promote the French language and culture among French speakers in Newfoundland and Labrador.

2. Accounting principles

The attached financial statements were prepared using fund accounting that is generally accepted for school districts. Fund accounting can be defined as accounting procedures using a self-balancing group of accounts for each fund. It is normal for school districts to account separately for the activities of their operating fund and capital fund.

Here is a summary of the accounting principles adopted by the District with respect to fund accounting:

- a) The allocations received by the District were recorded either in the operating fund or the school capital fund, depending on their origin. Allocations from the Department of Education were treated as operating revenue, while those from the Education Investment Corporation (EIC) were recorded as capital revenue.
- b) Capital assets are indicated at cost price and are amortized over their useful life.
- c) The amortization of capital assets is calculated using a linear method based on the following number of fiscal years:

Buildings – schools 40 years
Furniture 10 years
Equipment 10 years
Computers 4 years

d) Government allocations pertaining to capital assets are deferred and amortized using the same method employed for the property to which they pertain.

e) The preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted Canadian accounting principles requires that the management of the corporation prepares estimates and assumptions that influence the amounts indicated in the financial statements and related notes. Actual results may differ from such estimates.

f) In some cases, the Conseil scolaire has acquired land for its buildings at no cost. In other cases, the Conseil has obtained authorization to use the land without ownership for as long as the land is being used for educational purposes. In cases where the land is owned by the Conseil, assessments of market value were not possible, meaning that the actual market value has not been accounted for.

In accordance with the treatment recommended by the Treasury Board of the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador, school buildings contributed under the control of the Conseil at a cost of \$11,051,437 were accounted for as capital assets. The amount of these assets was included as a contribution to capital asset-related funding.

4. Severance pay

Following a directive issued by the Department of Education, the Conseil scolaire has included in its outflows severance pay for its staff. This liability is made up of the following amounts:

The actual payment of severance pay for teaching staff will be funded separately by the Department of Education, while payment of severance pay for non-teaching staff will come from the Conseil's annual operating revenue.

5. Deferred revenue pertaining to capital assets
